



# Take Precautions To Prevent Heat Emergencies

Now that the rain has ended, temperatures are in the 90s. The American Red Cross encourages everyone to take extra precautions to prevent heat emergencies.

Heat can affect anyone but is most likely to affect young children, elderly people, people with health problems and those who work outdoors.

**Heat cramps** are muscular pains and spasms due to heavy exertion.

Heat exhaustion typically occurs when people exercise heavily or work in a warm, humid place where body fluids are lost through heavy sweating.

Heat stroke is the most serious heat emergency. It is life-threatening. The victim's temperature-control system, which produces sweating to cool the body, stops working. The body temperature can

rise so high that brain damage and death may result if the body is not cooled quickly.

Some tips to protect yourself and your family:

- **Slow down.** Avoid strenuous activity. If you must do strenuous activity, do it during the coolest part of the day, which is usually in the morning between 4 a.m. and 7 a.m.
- Stay indoors as much as possible. If air conditioning is not available, stay on the lowest floor out of the sunshine.

Wear lightweight, light-colored clothing to reflect away some of the sun's energy.

- Drink plenty of water regularly and often.
- Drink plenty of fluids even if you do not feel thirsty.

- Water is the safest liquid to drink during heat emergencies. Avoid drinks with alcohol or caffeine in them. They can make you feel good briefly but make the heat's effects on your body worse. This is especially true about beer, which dehydrates the body.
- Eat small meals and eat more often. Avoid foods that are high in protein, which increase metabolic heat.
- Avoid using salt tablets unless directed to do so by a physician.

#### GOD LIVES UNDER THE BED

I envy Kevin . My brother Kevin thinks God lives under his bed. At least that's what I heard him say one night.

He was praying out loud in his dark bedroom, and I stopped to listen, "Are you there, God?" he said. "Where are you? Oh, I see. Under the bed..."

I giggled softly and tiptoed off to my own room. Kevin 's unique perspectives are often a source of amusement. But that night something else lingered long after the humor. I realized for the first time the very different world Kevin lives in.

He was born 30 years ago, mentally disabled as a result of difficulties during labor. Apart from his size (he's 6-foot-2), there are few ways in which he i! s an ad ult.

He reasons and communicates with the capabilities of a 7-year-old, and he always will. He will probably always believe that God lives under his bed, that Santa Claus is the one who fills the space under our tree every Christmas and that airplanes stay up in the sky because angels carry them.

I remember wondering if Kevin realizes he is different. Is he ever dissatisfied with his monotonous life?

Up before dawn each day, off to work at a workshop for the disabled, home to walk our cocker spaniel, return to eat his favorite macaroni-and-cheese for dinner, and later to bed.

The only variation in the entire scheme is laundry, when he hovers excitedly over the washing machine like a mother with her newborn child.

He does not seem dissatisfied.

He lopes out to the bus every morning at 7:05, eager for a day of simple work.

He wrings his hands excitedly while the water boils on the stove before

dinner, and he stays up late twice a week to gather our dirty laundry for his next day's laundry chores.

And Saturdays-oh, the bliss of Saturdays! That's the day my Dad takes Kevin to the airport to have a soft drink, watch the planes land, and speculate loudly on the destination of each passenger inside. "That one's goin' to Chi-cargo!" Kevin shouts as he claps his hands.

His anticipation is so great he can hardly sleep on Friday nights.

And so goes his world of daily rituals and weekend field trips. He doesn't know what it means to be discontent.

His life is simple.

He will never know the entanglements of wealth of power, and he does not care what brand of clothing he wears or what kind of food he eats. His needs have always been met, and he never worries that one day they may not be.

His hands are diligent. Kevin is never so happy as when he is working. When he unloads the dishwasher or vacuums the carpet, his heart is completely in it.

He does not shrink from a job when it is begun, and he does not leave a job until it is finished. But when his tasks are done, Kevin knows how to re-

He is not obsessed with his work or the work of others. His heart is pure. He still believes everyone tells the truth, promises must be kept, and when you are wrong, you apologize instead of argue.

Free from pride and unconcerned with appearances, Kevin is not afraid to cry when he is hurt, angry or sorry. He is always transparent, always sincere. And he trusts God.

Not confined by intellectual reasoning, when he comes to Christ , he comes as a child. Kevin seems to know God - to really be friends with Him in a way that is difficult for an "educated" person to grasp. God seems like his closest companion.

In my moments of doubt and frustrations with my Christianity I envy the security Kevin has in his simple faith.

It is then that I am most willing to admit that he has some divine knowledge that rises above my mortal questions

It is then I realize that perhaps he is not the one with the handicap . I am. My obligations, my fear, my pride, my circumstances - they all become disabilities when I do not trust them to God's care

Who knows if Kevin comprehends things I can never learn? After all, he has spent his whole life in that kind of innocence, praying after dark and soaking up the goodness and love of God.

And one day, when the mysteries of heaven are opened, and we are all amazed at how close God really is to our hearts, I'll realize that God heard the simple prayers of a boy who believed that God lived under his bed.

Kevin won't be surprised at all!

#### **No-Prick Blood Sugar Tests Unveiled**

#### Fewer Finger Pricks With Future Blood Sugar Tests

New devices for people with diabetes may make their lives a little easier.

Researchers say using light beams to measure blood sugar through the skin will mean needing finger pricks only for calibration.

Diabetes means your body has trouble controlling the amount of sugar in your blood. The key to diabetes treatment is blood sugar control.

That's why people with diabetes -- particularly those who need insulin -- have to check their blood sugar levels several times during the day. This means getting a drop of blood by pricking a finger.

The discomfort and inconvenience of finger pricking is one reason people with diabetes don't check their blood sugar as often as they should.

Moreover, continuous blood sugar monitoring ideally would be better than checking blood sugar only at intervals. And such monitors could be hooked up to insulin pumps to ensure people get insulin when they need it, 24 hours a day. But current devices use a thin needle inserted beneath the skin.

Several companies are competing to bring patients blood sugar monitors that all but eliminate blood letting. One is the GlucoLight Corp. Another is OrSense Ltd. Both reported progress at the American Diabetes Association's 67th Annual Scientific Sessions, held June 22-26 in Chicago.

The two companies' devices are very different. The OrSense device uses a finger cuff that periodically restricts blood flow -- much like a blood pressure test -- and then uses a sensor to detect blood-specific signals from infrared light transmitted through the finger.

A bulky version is already approved for sale in Europe. And a new model would strap to the wrist like a large watch, with a small wire connecting it to a ring on the index finger.

The GlucoLight uses a sensor to scan the skin using infrared light. The sensor is attached to a monitor that, in the current version, is too big to carry around. It's currently being

tested in intensive care wards, where constant blood sugar monitoring is essential for many patients. A much smaller, wearable device is in the works but still years away.

Both devices still need blood for calibration -- once when first connected, and then at regular intervals. The OrSense device can go about 12 hours without calibration, Gideon Fostick, OrSense chief operating officer, tells WebMD.

"Our goal is to extend this duration," Fostick says. "Right now, it can cover a day or a night."

The GlucoLight, once calibrated, is good for four days, according to the company's presentation.







#### **Latest Drug in Middle School**

Latest Drug in Middle School -Dusting First, I'm going to tell you a little about me and my family. My name is Jeff. I am a Police Officer for a city which is known nationwide for it's crime rate. We have a lot of gangs and drugs. At one point we were # 2 in the nation in homicides per capita. I also have a police K-9 named Thor. He was certified in drugs and general duty. He retired at 3 years old because he was shot in the line of duty. He lives with us now and I still train with him because he likes it. I always liked the fact that there was no way to bring drugs into my house. Thor wouldn't allow it. He would tell on you. The reason I say this is so you understand that I know about drugs.

have taught in schools about drugs. My wife asks all our kids at least once a week if they used any drugs. Makes them promise they won't.

I like building computers occasionally and started building a new one in February 2005. I also was working on some of my older computers. They were full of dust so on one of my trips to the computer store I bought a 3 pack of DUST OFF. Dust Off is a can of compressed air to blow dust off a computer. A few weeks later when I went to use one of them they were all used. I talked to my kids and my two sons both said they had used them on their computer and messing around with them. I yelled at them for wasting the 10 dollars I paid for them.

On February 28 I went back to the computer store. They didn't have the 3 pack which I had bought on sale so I bought a single jumbo can of Dust Off. I went home and set it down beside my computer.

On March 1st, I left for work at 10 PM. Just before midnight my wife went down and kissed Kyle goodnight. At 5:30 am the next morning Kathy went downstairs to wake Kyle up for school, before she left for work. He was propped up in bed with his legs crossed and his head leaning over. She called to him a few times to get up. He didn't move. He would sometimes tease her like this and pretend he fell back asleep. He was never easy to get up. She went in and shook his arm. He fell over. He was pale white and had the straw from the Dust Off can coming out of his mouth. He had the new can of Dust Off in his hands. Kyle was dead.

I am a police officer and I had never heard of this. My wife is a nurse and she had never heard of this. We later found out from the coroner, after the autopsy, that only the propellant from the can of Dust off was in his system. No other drugs. Kyle had died between midnight and 1

I found out that using Dust Off is being done mostly by kids ages 9 through 15. They even have a name for it. It's called dusting. A take off from the Dust Off name. It gives them a slight high for about 10 seconds. It makes them dizzy. A boy who lives down the street from us showed Kyle how to do this about a month before. Kyle showed his best friend. Told him it was cool and it couldn't hurt you. It's just compressed air. It can't hurt you.. His best friend said so.

Kyle was wrong. It's not just compressed air. It also contains a propellant called R2. It's a refrigerant like what is used in your refrigerator. It is a heavy gas. Heavier than air. When you inhale it, it fills your lungs and keeps the good air, with oxygen, out That's why you feel dizzy, buzzed. It decreases the oxygen to your brain, to your heart. Kyle was right. It can't hurt you. IT KILLS YOU.

The horrible part about this is there is no warning. There is no level that kills you. It's not cumulative or an overdose; it can just go randomly, terribly wrong. Roll the dice and if your number comes up you die IT'S NOT AN OVERDOSE . It's Russian Roulette. You don't die later. Or not feel good and say I've had too much. You usually die as you're breathing it in. If not you die within 2 seconds of finishing "the hit." That 's why the straw was still in Kyle's mouth when he died. Why his eyes were still open. The experts want to call this huffing. The kids don't believe its huffing. As adults we tend to lump many things together. But it doesn't fit here. And that's why its more accepted. There is no chemical reaction, no strong odor. It doesn't follow the huffing signals. Kyle complained a few days before he died of his tongue hurting. It probably did. The propellant causes frostbite. If I had only known.

It's easy to say hey, it's my life and I'll do what I want . But it isn't.

Others are always affected. This has forever changed our family's life. I have a hole in my heart and soul that can never be fixed. The pain is so immense I can't describe it. There's nowhere to run from it. I cry all the time and I don't ever cry. I do what I'm supposed to do but I don't really care. My kids are messed up. One won't talk about it. The other will only sleep in our room at night. And my wife, I can't even describe how bad she is taking this. I thought we were safe because of Thor. I thought we were safe because we knew about drugs and talked to our kids about them. After Kyle died another story came out. A probation Officer went to the school system next to ours to speak with a student. While there he found a student using Dust Off in the bathroom. This student told him about another student who also had some in his locker. This is a rather affluent school system. They will tell you they don't have a drug problem there. They don't even have a dare or plus program there. So rather than tell everyone about this "new" way of getting high they found, they hid it. The probation officer told the media after Kyle's death and they, the school, then admitted to it. I know that if they would have told the media and I had heard, it wouldn't have been in my house.

We need to get this out of our homes and school computer labs. Using Dust Off isn't new and some "professionals" do know about. It just isn't talked about much, except by the kids. They all seem to know about it. April 2nd was 1 month since Kyle died. April 5th would have been his 15th birthday. And every weekday I catch myself sitting on the living room couch at 2:30 in the afternoon and waiting to see him get off the bus. I know Kyle is in heaven but I can't help but wonder If I've died and went to Hell.



George enlisted in the War of 1812 at Pendleton Court House, South Carolina on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of November 1814. His length of service was 4 years and 348 days. At the same time George enlisted in the War of 1812, his older brother, Thomas Woodall, enlisted, and we believe another brother named William Woodall enlisted as well.

From George's Discharge Papers: George Woodall, a Private of Captain George W. Melvins Company, Fourth Regiment of Infantry, is eighteen years of age, five feet four inches and half high, light complexion, grey eyes, light hair, and by occupation when enlisted a farmer. Was honorably discharge at Ft. Crawford, Alabama on the 19<sup>th</sup> day of November, 1819, stated he was 18 years of age when discharged. "I as musician was at the taking of Pensacola & St. Marks and many other places during the Campaign of 1818." Signed by: William Lean, Lt. 4<sup>th</sup> Regt. US Inft., Comd. Company.

George Woodall, and Ellen Moore, a Cherokee Indian, were married on the 10<sup>th</sup> of November, 1827 in Georgia. George and Ellen Woodall are listed on the Old Settler's Roll of the Cherokees. Eleven children were born to this union

George folded his tent for the last time on 01 June, 1880, at the residence of his son J. T. Woodall, in Delaware District, Cherokee Nation. The funeral of Mr. Woodall was preached at Honey Creek Church, Delaware District, Cherokee Nation. George and Ellen Woodall were originally buried in the old Spavinaw Cemetery. Their remains were removed to their present location at the Strang-Spavinaw Cemetery around 1924. The old Spavinaw Cemetery was moved to provide space for a lake and water source for the City of Tulsa.

After Mrs. Faulkner's dedication of the marker, both she and Mrs. Vire placed a wreath on the grave. The ceremony concluded with a reading by Kathryn Albertson, "Farewell Peace," a popular American song at the time of the War of 1812, the singing of the "Star-Spangled Banner", written during the War of 1812 by Francis Scott Key and the Retiring of the Colors by the Adair Boy Scout's.



# Fruit Kebabs on Sugar Cane Skewers with Lime Honey



1 (10-inch) sugar cane cut into 4 (1/4-inch) sticks (or 4 (10-inch) bamboo skewers soaked for 1 hour) 1/4 pineapple, cored and cut into 8 (1-inch) cubes 1 banana, peeled and cut into 8 equal portions 1 Gala, Fugi or Red Delicious apple, cored and cut into 1-inch pieces

1 mango, pitted, skinned and cut into 8 (1-inch pieces)

2 tablespoons honey

1/2 teaspoon lime zest

Thread each sugar cane skewer with a slice of pineapple, banana, apple and mango, and repeat with the same fruit in the same sequence. Follow this procedure with the remaining 3 skewers. Combine the honey and lime zest in a small bowl and set aside until ready to use.

Preheat a grill to medium. Place the kebabs on the grill and cook, until lightly charred, about 3 minutes. Turn the kebabs over to the opposite side and cook for another 3 minutes, brushing with half of the lime-honey. Turn over again and cook for 1 minute while you brush the remainder of the honey on the second side of the kebab. Turn once more and cook for 1 minute longer on the second side. Remove the kebabs from the grill and serve immediately.





#### Keep Food Poisoning Off Summer Menu

Don't Forget Food Safety at Summer Food Festivals, Family Reunions

Food poisoning sent at least 10 people to the hospital and sickened more than 100 others at this year's Taste of Chicago food festival.

All of those people ate at the Pars Cove Persian Cuisine booth at the Taste of Chicago festival, which was held in Chicago from June 29 to July 2.

At least nine festival-goers who ate at that booth were infected with salmonella, which are bacteria that typically cause fever, abdominal cramps, and diarrhea, which may be bloody.

Most people recover from salmonella infection within a week. But some cases may be severe and even life-threatening. Babies, the elderly, and people with weak immune systems are more likely to experience severe illness from salmonella infection.

The *Chicago Sun-Times* reports that tahini -- a sesame seed paste used to make hummus -- may be linked to the salmonella outbreak. The restaurant's owners say their facility is clean and that they practice food safety.

However, food poisoning doesn't just happen at restaurants. Home cooking can also harbor health hazards -- even at family reunions, as a new CDC report points out.

Family Reunion Food Poisoning

Talk about a family reunion gone wrong -- so wrong that it's featured in this week's edition of the CDC's *Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report*.

The family reunion, held last October in West Virginia, included 53 relatives from Florida, Maryland, New York, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and West Virginia.

More than half of the attendees came down with diarrhea or vomiting, and six of them sought medical care for their symptoms.

Four other people who weren't at the reunion but live with reunion attendees also got sick.

A norovirus outbreak linked to the family reunion caused the illnesses. Noroviruses are America's leading cause of upset stomachs, according to the CDC.

After interviewing 48 reunion attendees, health officials zeroed in on three menu items that appeared to be related to the outbreak. Those three foods were chicken, scalloped potatoes, and a chocolate cheese ball.

The CDC, which hasn't named the family in question, doesn't mention whether those foods were all made by the same person, whether the foods weren't stored safely, or whether people were passing food around without having washed their hands first.

Food Safety Tips

Even if you're not going to a food festival or family reunion this summer, it never hurts to brush up on your food safety know-how.

Basically, it boils down to four steps:

Clean your hands, cooking surfaces, countertops, and utensils in hot, soapy water before and after preparing each food item. Rinse produce in running water.

Separate raw meat from cooked foods. Clean plates, utensils, and cutting boards that have touched raw meat.

Cook foods thoroughly. Use a (clean!) cooking thermometer to make sure meat and poultry is done.

Refrigerate meat or poultry as it defrosts; don't let it thaw on the countertop. Store foods promptly; don't let them linger on the table.



#### OUR BEAT UP OLD PIANO

I wasn't trying to take advantage of Chris.

Honest, I wasn't.

Not only was he a close and trusted work associate, but he was a friend. We did things together socially. We had some great times together (except when he was trying to convert me to British farce comedy, which I could never really appreciate no matter how many times Chris made me watch Monty Python). Why would I want to risk ruining that?

Especially over a beat up old piano?

But Chris and his wife were in the middle of an ugly divorce (which is not to say there is such a thing as a beautiful divorce, but only to suggest that this one was particularly nasty), and Chris was getting rid of stuff.

"Hey, you want a piano?" he asked me one day at work. It was an intriguing idea. Anita and I had talked about the value of music in the home, and we loved the idea of piano lessons for our young children. But things were tight for us, and there wasn't a lot of room in the budget for lessons – much less, a piano.

"How much?" I asked.
"I don't know," Chris said. "How much can you afford?"

I really had no idea how much a piano is worth. Honest, I didn't. So I said the first number that popped into my mind - an amount that sounded like a lot of money to me at the time, but was still relatively doable for us financially.

"Fifty dollars," I said.

Once we had it tuned it became a focal point for family musical growth and appreciation. All five of our children have taken piano lessons on it (if you count Joe Jr.'s three-month exercise in pain and suffering as piano lessons) and we have all used it for musical expression through the years.

Today that beat up old piano is still positioned prominently in our front room - older and more beat up than it was when we bought it from Chris. It rarely gets played anymore except by our granddaughters, who delight in pounding on the keys whenever they visit. But it is part of us, part of our history, part of our home.

And I've always felt a little guilty about it, especially after I found out how much a good piano is actually worth. 



## SOMETHING WORTH LOSING EVERYTHING FOR

Hundreds of American flags line the street where Nathan lived for most of his 23 years. Yellow ribbons are tied around mailboxes, trees, street signs and fence posts. Taped to his boyhood home is a hand-lettered sign: "Returning home with honor."

And he is.

Sometime during the next week or so his family will gather to welcome Nathan home – and to bury him. According to the Department of Defense, he was killed "in Rushdi Mullah, Iraq, of wounds suffered when his unit was attacked by insurgents using small arms fire." Additional information suggests that he was hit as members of his unit were unloading from the helicopter that had flown them into battle.

And just like that, another promising life is over.

I didn't really know Nathan, not like I know his Dad and his elder brother Tim. But I knew who he was. He was a good kid – a lively, energetic, happy boy who I saw running around the neighborhood all the time. And "running around" isn't just a figure of speech in this case. He was always running – literally. The boy seemed to always be in a hurry to get somewhere.

And at age 19, "somewhere" was the military. His family has a long history of military service, and Nathan was anxious to be part of that tradition.

"He just felt like he wanted to do it," his father said. "He understood it takes a soldier's sacrifice to ensure peace and freedom."

Four years later he was serving his first tour of duty in Iraq. Only he was doing it his way: with energy, discipline, courage and compassion. For example, he was always volunteering for assignments and missions because, as he told his Dad, "I don't like to sit around." And he often wrote to his family about his love and concern for the children of Iraq. He talked about once being in a situation where he had to spend some time in a basement with three little Iraqi boys.

"He got out his flashlight and made shadow puppets on the wall," Tim said. "He liked to make them laugh."

I know – that isn't exactly consistent with the military bullies that are often portrayed in the media these days. But it is completely consistent with who Nathan actually was. He was a good kid, a great friend, an outstanding son and brother, and his passing leaves a hole in many hearts and lives. And I can't help but wonder what this terrific young man might have accomplished during the next 40 or so years of his life if only . . .

If only . . .

The harshest reality of war is that young people like Nathan are lost on both sides of the conflict, with each casualty depriving mankind of a full measure of untapped potential. Every lost soldier represents the ultimate sacrifice, and the ultimate anguish for family and friends.

And so we mourn, and we pray for an end to the mourning. But we also celebrate the energy of their commitment to honor, duty and country. Whether or not you agree with our national policy in Iraq, you have to respect people like Nathan who are willing to risk everything for a cause in which they believe.

Near the end of the film "The Wind and the Lion," a nomadic desert character played by Sean Connery is reminded of the heavy losses his people sustained in a battle to retain their land and their lifestyle. He speaks of it philosophically, as if the toll isn't really all that burdensome.

"But you've lost everything," a colleague reminds him emphatically. "Everything!"

"But isn't it wonderful," Connery's character asks, "to have something that is worth losing everything for?"

That's the way Nathan saw it. And that's the way his friends and family see it as they prepare to lay their hero to rest. Despite the sorrow they feel at his death, there is peace in knowing that he gave his life for something he believed in – something greater than self.

And that is what makes Nathan a hero to me. It's not the fact that he died, but the fact that he lived as he believed – even at the cost of comfort, convenience and, eventually, his own life. It's about principle. It's about integrity.

And it's about returning home – with honor.

#### The History of Apple Computer

On April Fool's Day, 1976, The released the Apple I computer and started Apple Computers. The Apple I was a first with a single circuit board used in a computer.

The first home computer with a GUI or graphical user interface was the Apple Lisa. The very first graphical user interface was developed by the Xerox Corporation at their Palo Alto Research Center (PARC) in the 1970's. Steve Jobs, visited PARC in 1979 (after buying out Xerox stock) and was impressed and influenced by the Xerox Alto, the computer ever with a graphical user interface. Jobs designed the new Apple Lisa based on the technology he said Xerox.

With the 1984 Apple Macintosh Steve Jobs made sure developers created software for the new Macintosh Computer. Jobs figured that software was the way to win the consumer over.

#### **History of Pen**

The Parker Pen Company was established in 1888. George S. Parker improved on the feeds of the time and in 1892 he applied for a patent on the Lucky Curve feed. This feed allowed a pen to be carried in a pocket and then work properly when used. This invention along with aggressive advertising made Parker one of the leading pen makers in the world.

Early models are both functional and in many cases quite attractive. These include the gold overlays with mother of pearl as well as the legendary Snakes. The George W. Heath company produced the overlays for Parker from 1900 until 1915. These overlays are frequently marked with Heath's hallmark which is an H in a square box.

In 1921 Parker introduced the Duofold. This model was the first of many innovative designs that have kept the company as a leader.


