Williams contributes \$25,000 to Tulsa Area Chapter of American Red Cross





American Red Cross Health and Safety Items for the Month of September

September is National Preparedness Month. In recognition, the Rogers/Mayes County Service Center of the American Red Cross has two featured Health and Safety items throughout September.

"No one wants or expects a disaster such as a tornado or an emergency such as a power outage to occur, but they do happen, unfortunately, too often. Being prepared is the key. The worst time to realize that you need a first aid kit is when the emergency is happening. If you don't have a first aid kit, please consider getting one. If you already have one, please review it to make sure it's stocked and up-to-date," said Savannah Haddock, Community Relations Coordinator at the Rogers/ Mayes County Service Center.

The Family First Aid kit has separate compartments organized into severe bleeding, medium cuts and scrapes, small cuts and scrapes, and additional items and supplies. It is in a nylon pouch with convenient carrying straps. This kit is designed for easy use with first aid instructions printed on the kit. This safety preparedness tool should be in every home, car and RV. ...On sale \$20.

5 Simple Steps Could Save 100,000 Lives

Preventive Actions Like Cancer Screening Could Prevent Thousands of Deaths

If more Americans followed just five simple preventive health care practices, 100,000 deaths each year could be prevented.

A new study shows that getting adults to follow simple steps like getting help to quit smoking or being screened for cancer could save tens of thousands of lives every year.

According to the study, the top five underutilized health care • services with the biggest benefits

- Daily aspirin therapy to prevent heart disease.
- Smoking cessation. An additional 42,000 lives would be saved each year by increasing to 90% the portion of smokers who are advised by a health care professional to quit and are offered assistance. Currently, only 28% of smokers receive such services.
- Colorectal cancer screening. Another 14,000 additional lives would be saved each year

by increasing to 90% the portion of adults aged 50 and older who are up to date with any recommended screening for colorectal cancer. Today, fewer than 50% of adults are up to date with screening.

- Flu vaccination. An additional 12,000 additional lives would be saved each year by increasing the portion of adults aged 50 and older who got an annual flu vaccination to 90%. Only 37% of adults currently get an annual flu vaccination.
- Breast cancer screening. An additional 3,700 lives would be saved each year by increasing to 90% the portion of women ages 40 and older who have been screened for breast cancer in the past 2 years. Today, 67% of women have been screened in the past 2 years.

Disparities in Preventive Health Care

"A lot of Americans are not getting lifesaving preventive services, particularly racial and ethnic minorities. As a result, too many people are dying prematurely or living with diseases that could have been prevented," says Eduardo Sanchez, MD, MPH, in a news release. Sanchez is chair of the National Commission on Prevention Priorities, which conducted the study. "We could get much better value for our health care dollar by focusing upstream on prevention."

The study shows minorities consistently use preventive health care services less often than whites. For example, Hispanic smokers are 55% less likely to get assistance in quitting smoking than whites.

Overall, among the top 12 preventive health care services examined by the report, seven are used by about half or less of the people who should be using them.

American Red Cross offers Five Dollar Fridays to prepare everyone for emergencies

September is National Preparedness Month, and the American Red Cross wants everyone to be ready in the event of a large-scale disaster or a health emergency that affects a single person.

In Rogers and Mayes County, people can start getting prepared by taking a CPR certification classes for only \$5.

Classes will be held at the Rogers/Mayes County Service Center, 400 W. Will Rogers Blvd., Claremore.

Adult CPR: 8:00 a.m.-noon, Friday, September 7th and 21st Infant/Child CPR: 12:30 p.m.-5:00p.m., Friday, September 7th and 21st

Call (918) 343-1803 to register for a class.

"We don't want anyone to witness an emergency and not know what to do," said Mark Ogle, director of the Rogers/ Mayes County Service Center. "The American Red Cross wants people to feel confident that they know how to step in and help their family members, neighbors or even total strangers during an emergency."

Learning CPR is an important first step in becoming prepared, but there are several other ways, as well.

The American Red Cross also encourages residents to:

- Develop a fire and disaster plan with their families and practice it at least twice a year.
- Collect a disaster supplies kit, including water, canned food, medications, important documents, flashlight and batterypowered radio.
- Give blood so that an adequate supply will be available in case of a large-scale disaster.
- Volunteer with the American Red Cross so that plenty of people will be trained and ready to help during a local or national disaster.

In addition, the public is invited to visit a free online education module available at www.redcross.org/BeRedCrossReady that walks visitors through three simple ac-

tions to "Be Red Cross Ready" for a disaster: 1) get a kit, 2) make a plan, and 3) be informed. The "Be Red Cross Ready" actions, also available in podcast format, offer a basic preparedness strategy everyone can follow to respond to a variety of disasters and emergencies.

Letter to the Editor

Watson says accept descendents of non-Indians as members of your Indian tribe or she will move to cut funding to thousands of Indian people.

U.S. Congresswoman Diane Watson says accept descendents of non-Indians as members of your Indian tribe that were living in your tribes jurisdictional territory in 1866 or we will cut your funding and terminate recognition. Put aside all the rhetoric surrounding Watson's proposed house bill and This is what her bill delivers. This action is nothing more or less then the practice of imperialistic colonialism of years past that decimated indigenous people's rights and survival in this country.

The truth of the matter is that if U.S. Congresswoman Diane Watson can do this to one tribe it will open the door to a resurgence of anti-Indian advocates wooing congress to end recognition of all federally recognized tribes in America.

Watson's pending house bill seeks to stop funding to thousands of our Native American elders, our children and our families who depend on those funds daily so that non-Indians can be members of our Indian tribe. These non-Indians do not citizenship criteria and cannot acquire a certificate of Degree of Indian Blood (CDIB) card from the BIA to prove they are Indian peoples. It may be of interest that you know that our tribal membership has always and will continue to include descendents of Freedmen as well other ethnicities because many have met membership requirements which require at least (1) Cherokee Indian ancestor listed on the Cherokee Indian Dawes Commission Roll from 1904 - 1906. This has been the membership criteria practiced for the last (3) decades.

Most good people would agree that any individual who would use their power to recklessly endanger thousands of peoples jobs, livelihoods, needed services, health care and survival in general cannot be of a good mind and heart. What kind of people could even possibly consider such an action? Yet this same action has been pro-Watson? Congressman The action says that if we don't allow non-Indians to be members of our Indian tribe Congresswoman Watson will carelessly and thoughtlessly put into harms way thousands of Native Amerielders, and Indian children, families infirmed who are members of the Cherokee Nation. Where is the reasoning here? How can this be justified?

I am saddened by even the thought of this inhumanity to mankind. The indigenous people of this country have been used and abused for more than 500 years, and it appears it will continue anytime a tribe has something of perceived value that want. Our lands in were taken, then those wanting the gold on our land in Georgia forced the Trail of Tears, then it was the Curtis Act of 1898 after oil was discovered on our lands in Oklahoma and today, just as we have began to recover from the adversity of a hundred years of abject poverty to realize a little prosperity, finally getting on our feet and sending our children to college, providing housing and thousands of needed jobs, we are yet again subjected to outsiders wanting what little prosperity we now have, coveting our tribal identity and our cul-There was no one suing our tribe membership when we were all living in abject poverty.

Chinese Hot and Spicy Chicken

(Serves 4)

Ingredients:

2 lb. Chicken Breasts, chopped into bite-size pieces

1 Tbs. fresh Ginger, grated

1 Tbs. Sherry

3 Tbs. Soy Sauce, divided

1 Scallion or Green Onion

2 to 3 Hot Peppers, your choice

1/4 cup Olive Oil

2 Tbs. Rice Wine Vinegar

2 tsp. Anise Pepper

1 Tbs. Granulated Sugar

1/2 tsp. Salt

1/2 cup Chicken Broth

1 Tbs. Cornstarch

Marinate the prepared and cut chicken for 15 to 20 minutes in a mixture of fresh ginger, sherry, and two tablespoons of the soy sauce.

Meanwhile, cut the scallion and hot peppers diagonally into 1-inch pieces.

Grind the anise pepper to a powder with a mortar and pestle; reserve.

In a large skillet over medium-high heat, sauté the prepared scallion and peppers in the olive oil for a few minutes to soften.

Add the chicken with its marinade to the skillet and begin to brown it with the vegetables, stir-fry style. When partially cooked, add the rice wine vinegar, sugar, salt, and anise pepper. Continue to stir-fry a few minutes more.

Add the chicken broth and mix well. Cover the skillet and continue to cook over a low heat setting until the chicken is tender, about 20 to 30 minutes.

Blend the cornstarch with a bit of water and the rest of the soy sauce, and add to the skillet. Stir gently until thickened, about 10 minutes more. Serve warm. Great with plain rice or oriental noodles.



INVENTIONS

History B.C. Before Computers

In 1874 Frank Baldwin, Inventor of an improved Calculator, tried to sell one to the Pennsylvania Railroad. He received this response from a manager: "If I could have had a machine like that a year ago,

It would have been invaluable. I have had a series to tables prepared, giving rates on quantities from 1 to 2,000 Pounds, carried 1 to 550 miles, making over a million computations.

Each sheets has been checked by seven different clerks, and I have just had them lithographed for distribution to the agents." Baldwin checked the figures with his calculator.

He found dozens of errors and made the sale. The head of the freight division wrote him: "It does the work of at least three men with a certainty of correctness and greater rapidity.

For Railroad Companies, calculating mileages and tonnages, it is, I consider, invaluable." Railroads, like other business firms, came to depend on mechanical calculators in the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.

Businesses used them to figure everything from freight costs to insurance rates to accounting, to determine what they were earning or losing. Scientists and engineers used similar machines to process data and to test theories, as well as for practical applications such as calculating tides or preparing astronomical charts or analyzing structures. But mechanical aids to computation were only a small part of the information processing revolution in the century or so before the invention of the computer. More important were new ways to organizing business so that information could be gathered and put to use.

Information processing machines were designed to fit into the way businesses were run. When computers came along after World War II, they slipped easily into the standards and styles of business and science.

Mechanical Calculators

The first calculators were tools for keeping track of numbers. The earliest may have been in ancient Babylon, where piles of stones that represented numbers evolved first into a system that had place values (ones, tens, and hundreds),

And then into the abacus, a calculating device with movable counters, which saw wide use throughout the throughout the ancient world. Other early civilizations made use of knotted strings, such as the Inca *quipu*, the biblical "line of flax," or Chinese knotted cords, to keep track of numbers. The Hindu-Arabic system of arithmetic, with its zero and its place-value system, was introduced to Europe in the ninth century.

Over the course of the next five hundred years, it replaced Roman numerals in Europe. The earliest mathematical devices were the quadrant and the astrolabe, used in astronomy and navigation.



It's complex gearing showed (or predicted) the phases of the moon and the sun's passage through the zodiac.


Similar geared calendar/astronomical clocks were made by Arabic scientists starting in the tenth century. Medieval Europe saw the invention and spread of clocks, including astronomical clooks that used complicated systems of gearing to show calendrical events. In the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries scientists and instrument makers invented a variety of tools to make calculation easier. These included charts and instruments for navigation—what was called "arithmetical sailing"—as well as general-purpose devices. Perhaps the first "adding machine" was John Napier's 1617 "rods," a device that allowed rapid multiplication and division. The slide rule, a mechanical system that used Napier's 1614 invention of logarithms to allow rapid division and multiplication, was invented by William Oughtred in 1621. Mechanical devices using gears and levers followed.

The first, known only from a picture, was a calculating clock" invented by Wilhelm Schickard, a German matchmatician and linguist, in 1623, to make astronomical calculation easier. This combined a mechanized version of Napier's rods with a mechanical adder. (The machine was lost, and became known only when Schickard's note to the astronomer Johannes Kepler about the machine was discovered in the 1930s.)

In 1642 Blaise Pascal invented an adding machine to help his father, a tax collector, with his work. Charles Vion Dalibray, a friend of Pascal's, composed a sonnet celebrating the machine: One reason why Babbage lost interest in the difference engine was that he had an even more extravagant idea, a device he called the analytical engine. He first conceived of the new machine in 1833, and worked on it until his death in 1871, producing thousands of pages of notes and hundreds of drawings and charts outlining its operation. The analytical engine, Babbage wrote, wouldn't just add and subtract; it would be "a machine of the most general nature," able to calculate any formula given it. It would be programmable using punch cards, and would have the ability to compare number and decide what operation to do next, depending on the result.

Babbage's never-to-be built analytical engine was the first hint of the modern-day computer to today has a lot of Memory and for cheap price rage, and next the every thing in one device in the near future.
