# **Prepare Now for Grass Fires** That Could Strike Our Area

The California wildfires bring to mind the grass fires that struck northeast Oklahoma around Thanksgiving 2005.

More and more people are making their homes in woodland settings – in or near forests, rural areas or remote sites. There, homeowners enjoy the beauty of the environment but face the very real danger of wildfire.

Reduce your risk by preparing now - before wildfire tion. strikes. Meet with your family to decide what to do and where to go if wildfires threaten your area.

# **Practice Wildfire Safety**

Contact your local fire department or forestry office for information on fire laws. Make sure that fire vehicles can get to your home.

Clearly mark all driveway entrances and display your name and proved safety cans.

Report hazardous conditions that could cause a wildfire.

Teach children about fire safety. Keep matches out of their

Post fire emergency telephone numbers.

Plan several escape routes away from your home – by car and rake, axe, hand/chainsaw, bucket and shovel. by foot.

Talk to your neighbors about wildfire safety. Plan how the neighborhood could work together after a wildfire. Make a list of a small pond, well, swimming pool or hydrant. your neighbors' skills, such as medical or technical. Consider how you could help neighbors who have special needs, such as home and other structures on the property. elderly or disabled persons. Make plans to take care of children who may be on their own if parents can't get home.

# **Protect Your Home**

Design and landscape your home with wildfire safety in mind.

Select materials and plants that can help contain fire rather than fuel it. Use fire-resistant or noncombustible materials on the roof and exterior structure of the dwelling. Plant fire-resistant shrubs and trees. For example, hardwood trees are less flammable than pine, evergreen, eucalyptus or fir trees.

Regularly clean roof and gutters.

Inspect chimneys at least twice a year. Clean them at least once

Install a smoke alarm on each level of your home. Test monthly and change the batteries two times each year.

Teach family members how to use the fire extinguisher.

Rake leaves, dead limbs and twigs. Clear all flammable vegeta-

Remove dead branches that extend over the roof.

Prune tree branches and shrubs within 15 feet of a stovepipe or chimney outlet.

Ask the power company to clear branches from power lines.

Mow grass regularly.

Store gasoline, oily rags and other flammable materials in ap-

Stack firewood at least 100 feet away and uphill from your

Consider installing protective shutters or heavy fire-resistant drapes.

Keep handy household items that can be used as fire tools: a

## Plan Your Water Needs

Identify and maintain an adequate outside water source such as

Have a garden hose that is long enough to reach any area of the

Install freeze-proof exterior water outlets on at least two sides of the home and near other structures on the property. Install additional outlets at least 50 feet from the

Consider obtaining a portable gasoline-powered pump in case electrical power is cut off.

# When Wildfire Threatens

If you are warned that a wildfire is threatening your area, listen to your battery-operated radio for reports and evacuation information. Follow the instructions of local officials.

Back your car into the garage or park it in an open space facing the direction of escape. Shut doors and roll up windows. Leave the key in the ignition. Close garage windows and doors, but leave them unlocked. Disconnect automatic garage door openers.

Confine pets to one room. Make plans to care for your pets in case you must evacuate.

Arrange temporary housing at a friend or relative's home outside the threatened area.

# If advised to evacuate, do so immediately.

Choose a route away from fire hazards. Watch for changes in the speed and direction of fire and smoke.

If you're sure you have time, take steps to protect your home:

# Inside

Close windows, vents, doors, Venetian blinds and heavy drapes. Remove lightweight curtains.

Shut off gas at the meter. Turn off pilot lights.

Open fireplace damper. Close fireplace screens.

Move flammable furniture into the center of the home away from windows and sliding-glass doors.

Turn on a light in each room to increase the visibility of your home in heavy smoke.

# **Outside**

Seal attic and ground vents with pre-cut plywood or commercial seals.

Turn off propane tanks.

Place combustible patio furniture inside.

Connect the garden hose to outside taps.

Set up the portable gasoline-powered pump.

Place lawn sprinklers on the roof and near above-ground fuel tanks. Wet the roof.

# Why Garlic Is Good for You

Garlic Relaxes Blood Vessels, Increases Blood Flow

The health benefits of garlic have been touted for centuries, but now researchers may have pinpointed at least one reason why.

A new study shows red blood cells process compounds from digested garlic and turn them into the cell messenger hydrogen sulfide (H2S), which relaxes blood vessels and increases blood flow. Therefore, eating garlic may increase our natural supply of this vital chemical and play a role in reducing the risk of heart disease.

Previous studies on garlic's health effects have produced mixed results. For example, some studies of garlic have found few benefits, but others have been shown to lower the risk of heart disease.

But researchers say if further studies confirm these findings, testing the ability to produce hydrogen sulfide may be used to standardize garlic supplements to produce greater health benefits.

# Finding Garlic's Effect

In the study, researcher Gloria Benavides, of the University of Alabama at Birmingham, and colleagues analyzed the effects of juice extracted from supermarket garlic on human red blood cells in the lab.

They found the red blood cells immediately began producing hydrogen sulfide after getting a tiny dose of garlic. The amount of garlic tested in the lab was roughly equal to two garlic cloves for a typical adult.

Further tests showed the key chemical reaction occurred at the membranes of the red blood cells, but a small amount of hydrogen sulfide was also produced inside the cells.

Few plants other than garlic contain the building blocks of hydrogen sulfide to provide these health benefits, and researchers say garlic is the only one commonly used in the human diet.

Their results appear in the *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences*.



The commuter train was still idling at the station as I approached it from behind. I could hear the bell sounding, indicating that the train would be pulling away soon. I picked up my pace and moved closer to the tracks so I could be clearly seen in the driver's rear-view mirror. Surely he or she would wait the 10 seconds it was going to take me to reach the train door closest to me. Surely he or she would.

Ör not.

I was within 20 feet of the train when it started to pull away from the station.

"No!" I shouted as I broke into a full gallop – or at least, as full of a gallop as these tired old legs can deliver. "Wait!"

I waved frantically, hoping the operator would see me and take pity on me. But it was no use. The train, as they say, had left the station – and left me standing there on the platform, panting and perspiring and fuming.

"Ten seconds!" I muttered angrily at the operator, who I figured was laughing at the chubby old guy he had stranded. "Ten blasted seconds!"

Only I didn't say "blasted."

Thankfully, no one was close enough to hear my private little train tantrum. The closest person to me was a young woman who was likewise running to catch the train, only she was about 20 yards behind me. I'm sure she saw me waving at the train as it was pulling away, but I don't think she heard . . . you know . . . "blasted."

"Oh, man, that's frustrating," I said, huffing and puffing with exertion and exasperation as the young woman approached.
"I know," she said, smiling a frustrated little smile. "If I had been just a minute faster I could have been on that train."

"Well, yeah," I said. "Or if the train operator had waited just a few seconds . . ."

She shrugged her shoulders. "Well, he's got a schedule to keep," she said without an ounce of animosity. "He can't wait for every straggler. It's his job to leave on time. It's my job to be here on time."

But before we get too wrapped up in our anger, we probably ought to take a good, hard look at ourselves. Most of the time we'll find that there are contributing circumstances over which we have some control.

In other words, we're probably part of the "blasted" problem. And our timing isn't as perfect as we thought it was.





It was our problem. Our issue. Our business. But somebody – a total stranger, if you can believe it – decided to stick their nose into it. And I'd just like to say thanks.

We were traveling as a family group – my wife, Anita, her parents and her brother and his wife – and were trying to find a place to sit during a long layover at a busy airport. Brent (Anita's brother), who logs more business flight time than Superman, was leading us to an area where he figured we could find a bench or two for us and our luggage. We dutifully followed him down the airport escalator, with me – as always – bringing up the rear (I don't know why I am always last in line; I think it has something to do with being the youngest of eight children and always being told by my mother that "last is best of all the game" – whatever that means).

We were gliding toward the bottom of the long escalator when I noticed a commotion ahead. As Brent reached the floor below, his sandal somehow became wedged in the collapsible escalator stairs. He struggled to pull away from the mechanical teeth that were chewing up his sandal, and in his struggle he lost his balance and fell back onto his father, who was standing right behind him on the still-moving escalator. Immediately my father-in-law was involved in the same struggle against the suddenly menacing metallic monster, which now was chomping on one of his shoes as well as Brent's sandal, and he fell back against his wife.

The moment is still frozen vividly in my mind. Here at the tail end of a wonderful trip together, we were about to be eaten alive by a mechanical conveyance. Everything seemed to move in horrifyingly slow motion as we all tried to quickly understand what was happening and determine an appropriate response. Should we jump over the handrail to the floor 20 feet below? Should we leap down the escalator and try to free Brent and his father and risk making things worse (I have this big, clumsy body and no mechanical ability – believe me, I know all about making things worse)? Should we start running against the crowd back up the escalator?

I was still working numbly through the possibilities – the perfect response finally hit me about 15 minutes later – when a sound caught my attention. At first I thought it was the toothy, motorized beast snarling as it continued to chew away at shoes and pull a full load of dazed travelers inextricably toward its brutal steel jaws. Then I realized it was a cry – not a full-blown scream, but clearly a call for

help – coming from my mother-in-law, who was absorbing the brunt of the predicament, stretched out as she was on the escalator

I reached out for Anita, who was next in line behind her mother and was about to be drawn into the rapidly escalating (if you'll pardon the expression) crisis, just as the escalator stopped. We moved quickly to get everyone up and off the machine. For the next hour we dealt with the aftermath — filling out reports, working with technicians to free one sandal and one shoe from the escalator's "jaws of death," and a muchneeded visit with airport paramedics for Anita's mother. Things were just beginning to calm down when I asked my father-in-law, who understands all things mechanical, if the jammed footwear had forced the escalator to shut down.

An emergency "off" button? I had seen them on other escalators before, but I hadn't noticed one on this particular escalator.

God is always watching out for His children. He provides for our needs and takes care of the monsters for us.





## INVENTIONS

## **History of Ambulance**

During the Crusades of the 11<sup>th</sup> Century, the Knights of St. John received instruction in first-aid treatment from Arab and Greek doctors. The Knights of St. John then acted as the first emergency workers, treating soldiers on both sides of the war of the battlefield and bringing in the wounded to nearby tents for further treatment. The concept of ambulance service started in Europe with the Knights of St. John, at the same time it had also become common practice for small Rewards to be paid to soldiers who carried the wounded bodies of other soldiers in for medical treatment.

The Surgeon-in-Chief of the French Grand Army, "Baron Dominiquie Larrey" created the first official army medical corp. in 1792. Trained attendants with equipment moved out from the field hospitals to give first-aid to the wounded on the battlefield and/or carried them back by stretcher, hand-carts and wagons to the field hospitals.

Motorized ambulance vehicles have been in use since the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. In the 1950's the United States pioneered helicopter-ambulances during the Korean War. In 1968, St. Vincent's Hospital in New York City started the first mobile coronary care unit.

## **History of Fuel Cells**

Hydrogen Fuel Cells Innovation For The 21<sup>st</sup> Century

In 1839, the first fuel cell was conceived by Sir William Robert Grove, a Welsh judge, inventor and physicist. He mixed hydrogen and oxygen in the presence of an electrolyte, and produced electricity and water. The invention, which later became known as a fuel cell, didn't produce enough electricity to be useful.

In 1889, the term "cell" was first coined by Ludwig Mond and Charles Langer, who attempted to build a working fuel cell using air and industrial coal gas. Another source states that it was William White Jaques who first coined the term "fuel cell." Jaques was also the first researcher to use phosphoric acid in the electrolyte bath.

In the 1920's, fuel cell research in Germany paved the way to the development of the carbonate cycle and solid oxide

fuel cells today. In 1932, engineer began his vital research into fuels cells.

Early cell designers used porous platinum electrodes and sulfuric acid as the electrolyte bath. Using platinum was expansive and using sulfuric acid was corrosive. Bacon improved on the expensive platinum catalysts with a hydrogen and oxygen cell using a less corrosive alkaline electrolyte and inexpensive nickel electrodes.

It took Bacon until 1959 to perfect his design, when he demonstrated a five-kilowatt fuel cell that could power an welding machine. Francis T. Barcon, a direct descendent of the other well known Fancis Bacon, named his famous fuel cell design the "Bacon Cell."

In October of 1959, Harry Karl Ihrig, an engineer for the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company, demonstrated 20horsepower tractor that was the first vehicle ever powered by a fuel cell.

During the early 1960's, General Electric produced the fuel-cell-based electrical power system for NASA's Apollo space capsule. General Electric used principles found in the "Bacon Cell" as the basis of it's this today, the electricity is provided by fuel cells, and the same fuel cells provide drinking water for crew.

NASA decided that using nuclear reactors was too high a risk, and using batteries or solar power was too bulky use in space vehicles. NASA had funded more than 200 research contracts exploring fuel-cell technology, bringing the technology to a level now viable for the private sector.

The first bus powered by a fuel cell was completed in 1993, and several fuel-cell cars are now being built in European and in the United States. Daimler Benz and Toyota launched prototype fuel-cell powered cars in 1997.


