

After a Cruel Start, Flora Blossoms



When ASPCA volunteer Sarina T. and her boyfriend Alex S. decided to foster a pit bull puppy named Flora, they knew little about the young dog's background, except that she had a heart infection, which was being treated with antibiotics.

"She has some scars and patches without hair, but beyond that you would never know she was anything but a healthy puppy," recalls Sarina.

Just four months earlier, on November 14, Flora arrived at a New York City veterinary hospital with her previous owner who reported a wound on one of her back feet.

But emergency veterinarians could immediately see Flora's condition was far worse. The five-month-old puppy was so emaciated that she looked like a walking skeleton, weighing only 9.9 pounds.

Upon further examination, veterinarians noted Flora's body temperature was 12 degrees below normal for a dog—90.1 degrees Fahrenheit—and her gums were pale. She had a heart murmur, low blood pressure, a weak pulse and anemia—the result of bleeding ulcers in her gastrointestinal tract. Open wounds on the back of her left heel and a deep, scabbed, chronic wound over the back of her left hip contributed to her blood loss. She was in shock and severely dehydrated, and melena in Flora's mouth was evidence she had ingested her own feces.

Initial blood work did not reveal any underlying disease or illness to explain Flora's emaciated body condition and severely compromised medical condition, but she was so starved that she had used her own fat, muscle and organ tissue for nutritional needs and would have died without urgent medical intervention.

Immediate Care

Veterinarians immediately set about providing aggressive, supportive care that included intravenous fluids, antibiotics and vitamin supplements. They also contacted the NYPD, which launched an investigation. Flora's owner

was eventually arrested and pled guilty to animal cruelty charges.

The next day, Dr. Laura Niestat, an ASPCA Forensic Veterinarian, examined Flora.

"When I met Flora, she could only stand with support," recalls Dr. Niestat. "I've seen many emaciated animals, but Flora was one of the most severe cases ever."

Careful Re-Feeding

Flora was fed according to a specific protocol to prevent re-feeding related illness, a potentially fatal complication which can happen if an undernourished animal is overfed immediately following a time of prolonged inadequate nutrition.

"A dog's body needs time to transition back to a normal metabolism," says Dr. Niestat. "The goal during this time is for the dog's body to 'relearn' how to use food."

Flora's re-feeding continued over the next two weeks while she remained hospitalized and veterinary staff continued her supportive care.

A Slow Crawl Back to Health

Initially, Flora ate well and slowly improved, but days later, she developed a cough and her condition rapidly deteriorated. She had a fever and was lethargic, refusing to eat. An echocardiogram revealed changes consistent with bacterial endocarditis, an infection of the inner lining and valves of the heart. Additional antibiotics were initiated to treat this infection.

"Flora's severely compromised health and poor condition contributed to her development of endocarditis," explains Dr. Niestat.

On November 27, a now 13 lb. Flora was transported to the ASPCA Animal Hospital (AAH) for continued care and monitoring under Dr. Niestat.

Over the next few months, Flora flourished, recording astonishing month-to-month weight gains. Whereas most puppies Flora's size would experience a six to 13 percent weight gain, Flora's weight climbed by 86 percent during one period.

"Flora made up for lost time by gaining weight faster than would be expected," says Dr. Niestat. "It really was amazing."

Finding A Foster


Because Flora's heart infection required several months of antibiotics, ASPCA staff found her a foster home so she could continue to heal.

"Flora had come so far, and continued to exceed expec-

tations on her recheck echocardiograms," explains Dr. Lindsay Thorson, veterinarian and Medical Supervisor of the ASPCA Animal Recovery Center (ARC), where Flora spent more than two months recovering.

Enter Sarina and Alex, who began fostering Flora in March.

"We were thinking about fitting a dog into our life," Sarina explains. "We thought fostering would be a good way to try it out."

Sarina says Flora was cautious around them when they first brought her home. "It's like she wanted to interact with us but just didn't know how," Sarina recalls.

But Flora's personality and confidence soon blossomed. She made friends with her new neighbors, both animal and human, especially children. "Within a month, she was snuggling up to us—always wanting to be held and sitting on our laps," says Sarina.

A Home at Last

At Flora's re-check on June 6, there was no further sign of endocarditis, revealing a good long-term prognosis, and Sarina and Alex officially adopted her.

Flora eagerly plays with other dogs at her local dog park, trying to get them to chase her. She loves tennis balls and has learned commands like sit, down, roll over, spin, touch and shake. She also likes to look out the windows of her Chelsea home, which overlooks a nearby playground.

"She spends a lot of time observing things," says Sarina.

Now a stout 45 lb., Flora is a long way from her cruel past, both physically and emotionally.

"I think it's incredible that Flora doesn't have any animosity or distrust," says Sarina. "She is so sweet and resilient. We're fortunate to have her in our lives."

Australian Police Rescue Drowning Kangaroo



Two police officers rushed into the water to save a drowning kangaroo that had got into difficulty off the Australian coast.

Sergeants Christopher Russo and Kirby Tonkin pulled the unconscious animal to shore and performed chest compressions to revive it.

"He had less than a minute... he went under and as he came up you could see foam coming out of his nose. He was drowning," Sgt Russo said.

"I grabbed his tail and Kirby cradled his head and dragged him onto the beach and cleared his lungs to get the water out of him. Then we just started to push on his chest and he started breathing again and I could feel a heartbeat."

The kangaroo is now "in good spirits" and recovering at the local Animalia Wildlife Shelter.

Video of the rescue was filmed by a beachgoer and shared by Victoria Police on Facebook.

Inspector General to Investigate USDA's Oversight of Dog Breeders



This week, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Office of Inspector General (USDA OIG)—the agency's internal watchdog—announced its Annual Plan for 2019. Included in the plan is a long overdue investigation into USDA's lack of oversight of commercial dog breeders.

The OIG released a scathing report in 2010 detailing the failures of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) to properly enforce Animal Welfare Act (AWA) standards for commercial breeders. In the eight years since, APHIS enforcement and accountability of the AWA has only worsened. According to the agency's own reports, enforcement actions this year plummeted to a new low. Coupled with its disastrous decision to purge its database of meaningful information, the USDA has been keeping consumers, advocates and the general public in the dark about what's really going on in our nation's puppy mills.

Congress took notice of USDA's enforcement failings last year. Reps. Mark Pocan (D-WI) and Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA) issued a joint, bipartisan letter calling on the OIG to initiate a new investigation.

The ASPCA has long advocated for an updated audit to understand the impact of USDA's actions, or lack thereof, on the welfare of the animals it is charged with protecting. We commend Reps. Pocan and Fitzpatrick for standing up for animals and calling for this audit, and we hope the OIG conducts a swift and thorough investigation that will lead to lasting change for the welfare of dogs in puppy mills across the country.



Since 1974, Every Sunday This Doctor And His Team Treat 700-1200 Patients Free Of Cost



Dr. Ramana Rao has been providing free health care services to the poor for the past 44 years through his free clinic in Bangalore, India.

Dr. Rao opened his free clinic in 1974 and it functions on Sundays. When he started, he saw only a handful of people a day.

Now, people begin lining up on Saturday nights.

"Every Sunday, the number of patients varies from 700 to 1200, and we do not miss a single Sunday," Dr. Rao told The Logical Indian.





To make sure each patient is seen, Dr. Rao has a team of 35 people which includes his wife and two sons (who are also doctors), ten dentists, six nurses, and one skin specialist. Some of the staff at the clinic are former patients of Dr Rao.

"I came here for the first time eight years ago with my mother. I started volunteering seven years ago because I was impressed and I wanted to help," says volunteer Baba Jan.

hough the cost of medical services has escalated - primarily the cost of medicines - it has not been a deterrent for Dr. Rao.

The clinic is funded primarily by donations through Milaap, India's largest corwdfunding website. The funds raised are used to buy medicines, nebulizers, and injections for the clinic.

Since opening in 1974, Dr. Rao and his team have attended to more than 2 million patients, free of cost.

"The reason I became a doctor was to serve my community," says Dr. Rao. "The Sunday Village Clinic is dedicated to help the section of society who have no means or access to quality health care."

"I talked to school several times and told them about the kid but u know that never gets far," Fontenot wrote on Instragam.

But it kept happening. And things came to a head when the bully stole Jordan's phone.

Fontenot also set up a meeting between the boy and Jordan.

"They each got to talk and then I said, 'From here, this is nothing. Shake hands and from now on you are brothers and you protect each other'."

The boys are now friends and play video games together in Fontenot's tattoo parlor.

Fontenot also launched a GoFundMe for the boy's family, which exceeded its \$7,000 goal to raise more than \$32,000.

Helicopter Upsets Tennis Player With PTSD, Teammate Abandons Game to Comfort Him Using A Song

Thousands of spectators witnessed an extraordinary moment of teamwork and human compassion during a tennis match at the 2018 Invictus Games, an international sporting event for injured and disabled veterans.

UK competitor Paul Guest was comforted by Dutch teammate Edwin Vermetten after a helicopter flew overhead, triggering Guest's PTSD.

Vermetten noticed that Guest was visibly upset and immediately abandoned play so he could rush over and console him. They remained in an embrace as they spoke to each other. The raw moment left spectators and supporters in tears.

Guest regrouped to deliver the match-winning serve.



Speaking with reporters after the game, Vermetten revealed it was the theme song to Frozen that broke the tension from the helicopter noise.

"I took him by the face and said 'Look at me. We are a team so let it go'," said Vermetten. "Look into my eyes and sing the Frozen song, and we did. For him, this was the moment he let go, and he did, he literally let it all go."

Horse Slaughter Is Not Euthanasia

Every year, more than 75,000 American horses are trucked over our borders to be slaughtered for human consumption. Until this practice is banned and Congress passes a law against slaughter here in the U.S., no horse is safe.



The term "horse slaughter" refers exclusively to the killing and processing of horses for human consumption. Horse slaughter is NOT humane euthanasia. While "euthanasia" is defined as a gentle, painless death provided in order to prevent suffering, slaughter is a brutal and terrifying end for horses.

Horses bound for slaughter (who may include pregnant mares, foals and horses who are injured or blind) are commonly shipped for more than 24 hours at a time in crowded trucks without food, water or rest. The methods used to kill horses rarely result in quick, painless deaths for these animals and sometimes they even remain conscious during dismemberment.

Horse Slaughter in the United States



The last three U.S. slaughterhouses—two in Texas and one in Illinois, all foreign-owned—were shuttered in 2007. In 2006, these facilities killed and processed more than 104,000 horses for human consumption, shipping the meat overseas.

Slaughterhouses are not clean or green enterprises and these facilities have proved to be environmentally damaging as well as economically draining to the communities that have housed them. It is clear that states with experience hosting horse slaughter facilities do not want them back: Texas and Illinois have implemented laws that specifically ban selling, giving and possessing horse meat intended for human consumption.

Horse Slaughter Abroad

Looking at data from 2012 to 2016, an average of 137,000 American horses were trucked over our borders each year to slaughter facilities in Mexico and Canada. In 2017, that number dipped to just under 80,000. Reopening slaughterhouses in America is not the answer to ending this form of cruelty.

In fact, even when horse slaughter facilities operated in the United States, tens of thousands of American horses were still exported to other countries for slaughter.

Additionally, long-distance transport is an inherent aspect of this industry. Given the vast geography of the U.S., any transport of American horses to slaughter—within or outside the U.S.—will be long and brutal.

The Future

Until a ban is in place, every American horse is at risk of meeting this fate. Fortunately, in January 2017 the Safeguard American Food Exports (SAFE) Act (H.R.113/S.1706) was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives. The bill would prohibit the slaughter of horses for human consumption in the United States and ban their export abroad for that purpose—but we need your help to ensure Congress passes this important legislation.

How One Couple Saved 50 Children From the Nazis

On a chilly evening in early January 1939, Eleanor Kraus looked around her dining room and carefully inspected the gleaming china dishes, polished silverware, and sparkling crystal wineglasses that had been neatly laid out on the table. Her husband, Gil, had not yet come home from his law office in downtown Philadelphia, but Eleanor was already dressed for the evening. Their niece was bringing her fiancé to dinner, and Eleanor, as always, wanted everything to shine.

A few minutes later, Gil walked through the front door of the couple's spacious home, removing his overcoat and setting down his worn leather briefcase. "There is something I need to discuss with you," he said. Eleanor followed him upstairs and sat down beside him as he shaved and dressed for dinner.

She listened quietly as Gil began describing what sounded like a farfetched idea. The newspapers had been filled with articles about the increasingly brutal conditions for Jews living under Adolf Hitler's regime. Less than two months earlier, in the horrific rampage known as Kristallnacht—the Night of Broken Glass—hundreds of synagogues in Germany and Austria had been desecrated and burned to the ground. Jewish-owned businesses had been looted and destroyed. Thousands of Jewish men had been summarily arrested and sent off to concentration camps.


Gil was determined to do something to help, even if it meant disrupting his comfortable life and putting himself in danger.

Earlier that afternoon, he and his friend Louis Levine had begun hatching a plan: to rescue Jewish children trapped inside Nazi Germany. Both men were leaders of Brith Sholom, a national Jewish fraternal organization that had recently built a summer camp outside Philadelphia, including a large stone house with 25 bedrooms. Wouldn't it be wonderful, Gil said, if they could fill it with children—two to a room—who would otherwise face a terrifying future in Hitler's Germany.

As he finished dressing, Gil turned to his wife and told her he intended to go to Germany to carry out the mission. He asked her if she would accompany him. "No one in his right mind would go into Nazi Germany," Eleanor protested. "I'd be too scared to set foot in that country, assuming the storm troopers would even let us in." Her thoughts turned to her children, 13-year-old Steven and nine-year-old Ellen. She and Gil had never been away from them at the same time.

But Eleanor knew how stubborn her husband could be, so she was not surprised when Gil told her he had already made plans to go to Washington, DC, to propose the rescue to U.S. government officials, in particular George Messersmith, a former U.S. minister to Austria who was now serving as assistant secretary of state. Messersmith had worked at the American embassy in Berlin and was acutely aware of the mounting Nazi threat.

following days, Gil immersed himself in the United States' rigid

immigration policy. Despite the desperate situation facing Jews in Europe—and the fact that, at that point, Hitler was allowing them to leave—the United States imposed strict quotas on refugees. To make matters worse, throughout the 1930s, a number of State Department officials had done little to conceal their anti-Jewish attitudes. For instance, James Wilkinson, who worked in the visa division, once warned that easing the nation's immigration laws would create "a grave risk that Jews would flood the United States."

But Gil remained fixed on the plan to rescue children. While reviewing immigration records, he discovered that approved visas sometimes went unclaimed. Would it be possible, he wondered, to set aside unused visas for Jewish children whose parents were already on waiting lists to come here?

Messersmith, always the diplomat, said it was an "intriguing" idea. Within days, Gil sent a letter to Messersmith, detailing his proposed mission and stating that there were "ample private funds to provide transportation of the children from Germany to Philadelphia and for their support, maintenance, and education." Finally, Gil said that he and Eleanor were prepared to go to Germany themselves to select the children and escort them back to the United States.

By now, Eleanor shared her husband's commitment. She threw herself into the job of obtaining affidavits from friends and others willing to guarantee support of the children, despite the awkwardness of asking them to reveal their bank balances. By early spring, she had completed 54 documents—four extra, just in case.

Right before the couple were to sail, however, a State Department aide warned Eleanor not to accompany her husband: War was imminent in Europe. Despondent over going on his own, Gil persuaded Dr. Robert Schless, a family friend who was their children's pediatrician, to join him. "I shed a few tears very quietly," Eleanor said later. "I prayed for their safe return."

Several days after arriving in Europe, the men made their way to Vienna. A year earlier, in March 1938, Hitler had swallowed Austria into the Third Reich and immediately began a campaign to rid the country of its roughly 200,000 Jews. Jewish leaders in Vienna had been working feverishly to help families leave, and Gil had been advised by American embassy officials to select children for the rescue mission from that city, where conditions were deteriorating at an alarming pace.

Once he got to Vienna, Gil placed an urgent telephone call to Eleanor. In spite of the State Department warnings, he asked her to join him as soon as she could. "There is so much work to do here and very little time," he told her. "I need you to come."

Eleanor booked passage on the next ship to Europe.







Cryptogram Puzzles Instructions

WHAT ARE CRYPTOGRAMS? There are many ways you could write a secret code, and indeed some very complicated schemes for encrypting information are used all of the time. But we are here to have fun, so all of our cryptograms are simple substitution ciphers.

In a substitution cipher, each of the letters in the original message is systematically replaced by another letter. So for example, all of the A's in the original message might be replaced by M's in the encrypted message. Anywhere there is an M in the encrypted message, you would replace it with an A to return to the original message.

HOW TO SOLVE CRYPTOGRAMS

Here are a few tips that should help you get started if you are unfamiliar with this sort of puzzle. If you were to just start doing the puzzles, you would find yourself naturally discovering these and other strategies as your code cracking skills improved.

- **Pencil in a possibility.** Fill in all examples of that letter in the puzzle, then see if you have created a dead end and need to go back. For example, say you have decided that the letter Z is an I, but then you discover that one of the encrypted words reads XZZ. You know that there is no word in the English language that ends with two I's, so you need to find a different substitute for the Z.
- Consider letter frequency. Typically, the most common letters used in English are: E, T, A, O, I, and N. These will be the letters you are most likely to find in most cryptograms.
- Solve any single letter words first. In English the only single letter words are A and I.
- Look for common, small words next. The most commonly used words in the English language in order of frequency are: the, of, and, to, in, a, is, that, be, it, by, are, for, was, as, he, with, on, his, at, which, but, from, has, this, will, one, have, not, were, or, all, their, an, I, there, been, many, more, so, when, had, may.
- Look for contractions and possessives. There are only a small number of letters that might appear after an apostrophe and some have a recognizable pattern. For example if you saw the encrypted word QD'NN, you would know that the N is an L, because there is no other possibility in English.

CRYPTOQUOTES

The term cryptoquote simply refers to a quote that has been encrypted.







WRITING ON THE WALL

When Mom was 94 years old, I set up a computer in my mother's home so she could see and talk to my sister 45 miles away. The first time she and my sister talked, my sister reached out her arms to hug Mom through the computer monitor and blew air kisses that

Mom reached out to receive.

When Mom was growing up in the 1920s, there was only one telephone in the Kelso, Oklahoma, rural community and it was hanging on the wall at the store. Yet here she was at age 94, seeing and talking with her daughter on the computer.

I put a program on that computer to access it remotely. One evening I started a word document and typed in large letters, "Hello, Mother, How are you tonight? I love you, Lavon."

Mom immediately picked up the phone and called me. "Did you make my computer write those words?"

It reminded me of the Bible story of Daniel and the writing on the wall

A thousand lords and ladies in Babylon were drinking from the golden cups which had been dedicated to God, but taken from the temple of God by Belshazzar's father Nebuchadnezzar when he defeated Judah.

Suddenly the fingers of a man's hand appeared writing on the wall at the King Belshazzar's party. When he saw it, he was frozen with fear. He called for the wise men to interpret the writing but no one could. Someone suggested they call Daniel, "a man in whom is the Spirit of the Holy God."

Daniel read the words, "MENE: God has numbered your kingdom, and finished it. TEKEL: You have been weighed in the balance and found wanting. PERES: Your kingdom has been divided and given to the Medes and Persians." Daniel 5:25-28. That night Belshazzar's kingdom was overthrown and he died.
