

#### **EPA's Betrayal of Oklahoma Scenic Rivers and Lake Tenkiller**



The Environmental Protection Agency under former Administrator Scott Pruitt betrayed Oklahoma's Illinois River and Tenkiller Lake twice in two years. Only recently we learned that in 2017 EPA allowed Arkansas to evade critical water quality studies needed to protect the Illinois River. In a letter to EPA, STIR has called the EPA's actions "lamentable" and "likely illegal". We have asked for documentation supporting the decision that gives Arkansas cover to evade Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) studies of pollution from farms and cities. As we have explained before, a TMDL is much like a pollution diet, setting out how much polluters must reduce their degradation of the Illinois.

The under the radar action by EPA comes on the heels of EPA's failure to perform TMDLs for the Illinois River and Tenkiller. Instead, EPA's nearly \$5-million expenditure produced a computer model that Arkansas and Oklahoma can use if they want. EPA dumped the TMDL studies into the laps of the states which have failed to meet their duty to do TMDLs for decades.

Despite STIR's urging, Oklahoma will not do a TMDL study of the Illinois River. Instead, Oklahoma Secretary of Energy and Environment Michael Teague is negotiating another agreement with Arkansas to meet

our water quality standards adopted in 2003 (.037 ppm total phosphorus). Today, Arkansas is violating Oklahoma's phosphorus limit by over 90-percent. The good news is that phosphorus is declining in the Illinois River watershed.

Dear Mr. Garcia,

Save the Illinois River, Inc. (STIR) finds EPA's unusual decision to approve the 2016 Arkansas 303(d) list of Impaired waters lamentable and likely illegal. We ask you to reevaluate your action (EPA Region 6 letter to Ms. Becky Keogh, ADEQ, July 19, 2017). We request an explanation of how this action can be approved under 40CFR 130.7 since no change in total phosphorus has been demonstrated for Osage Creek, Spring Creek and the Illinois River and no other pollution control requirements exist.

EPA's decision to allow these tributaries of the Illi-

nois River to be reclassified as 4(b) instead of category 5 may mislead Arkansas to evade development of TMDLs for these streams and the Illinois River. However, because the Illinois River is impaired at the Arkansas-Oklahoma State line, then it would seem logical that, regardless of the status in Arkansas, TMDL(s) would still be required.

Very simply Mr. Garcia, how can EPA Region 6 justify reclassification of these streams after years of insisting they be listed by Arkansas as impaired by phosphorus? In our view, nothing has physically changed in these waters. Proposed water quality management plans and well-intended bistate agreements to improved water quality alone don't justify reclassification to 4(b). We would hope that EPA would be more diligent in what it requires for such a dramatic change in the Arkansas 303 (d) list.

Please provide STIR with the water quality monitoring and assessment data you used to approve the removal of Osage Creek and Spring Creek from the Category 5 designation of the 2016 Arkansas 303(d) list.

EPA's decision to approve the 2016 Arkansas 303(d) list was a surprise to Oklahoma and to Illinois River stakeholders and prevented an immediate objection. STIR has objected to previous attempts by Arkansas to declassify Illinois River tributaries and river segments by not listing them as impaired for phosphorus. We are grateful that EPA, in those previous instances, agreed that the changes were not justified and EPA added these waters bodies to the Arkansas 303(d) list. STIR requests that, in the future, we be notified when EPA considers changes proposed by Arkansas for any waterbodies within the Illinois River watershed in the Arkansas.

## Poultry Farms on a Rampage in Oklahoma's Green Country



People along the Highway 412 corridor in northeastern Oklahoma are alarmed by the influx of new poultry farms. These new farms have been approved by the Oklahoma Agriculture Department without notice to adjoining land owners. The new farms are not in the Illinois River watershed. Currently regulations do not provide for hearings that would give adjoining landowners due process. What's driving the expansion of poultry farms is a large new chicken processing plant at Gentry, Arkansas. Simmons Poultry Company is building the plant and no doubt loaning construction money to contract growers.

Data shows that the Department of Agriculture has approved 11 applications for new or expanding Simmons Co. poultry farms in Delaware County. These farms will have 76 large poultry houses with a capacity of nearly four-million chickens. You can read more in Tulsa World. ## Save the Illinois River, Inc.: Lake Frances Whitewater Park



Here is some big news involving a Walton Family project on the old Lake Frances property South of Siloam Springs. This is a major project that our good friend Ed Fite has been working on for years.

It is an economic boon to our area and could have an impact on how Arkansas view the Illinois River, i.e. more respect and admiration for a clean river. The project Is patterned after one in the East where water is pumped to an elevated storage and released for kayakers to float down a water course.

#### The Lake Frances Whitewater Park

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is seeking public comment on construction of the Lake Frances Whitewater Park on the Illinois River in Adair County. The location is the former City of Siloam Springs, Arkansas water supply lake. The site was once a privately owned resort with a lake and lodge.

The Walton Family is funding the project through the Grand River Dam Authority (GRDA).

#### Black Bartelmy's Ghost A Nova Scotia Ghost Story





"Good-night, sir," said the policeman, passing on along his beat, trying doors as he went.



## New KIDS COUNT Data Book ranks Oklahoma near the worst in the nation for child wellbeing



A new report shows the youngest generation of Oklahomans face far-reaching challenges. The state ranks near the bottom in the nation for most measures of child well-being, according to the 2018 KIDS COUNT® Data Book released by the Annie E. Casey Foundation.

Overall, the report ranks Oklahoma 44th out of all 50 states for child well-being. Even in areas where Oklahoma has seen the most improvement recently, we're not keeping up with the progress in other states. We have a high percentage of kids scoring below proficient in reading and math, a high rate of teen births, hundreds of thousands of kids living in poverty, and tens of thousands without health insurance. The 2018 Data Book shows that while Oklahoma has improved on some measures of child well-being, we still have a lot of work to do.

The annual KIDS COUNT Data Book uses 16 indicators to rank each state across four domains — health, education, economic well-being, and family and community — as an assessment of child well-being. Oklahoma ranks:

36th in economic well-being. The economic security of Oklahoma kids has improved significantly in recent years as the state and national economy emerged from recession. Compared to 2010, 19 percent fewer children were in families facing burdensome housing costs in 2016. The state also made progress in reducing child poverty and increasing full-time employment among parents. However, the percentage of teens ages 16-19 not attending school and not working (9 percent) has remained stagnant and ranks as one of the highest percentages in the nation. 46th in education. Oklahoma's ranking for education was lowest among all areas covered in the report. While Oklahoma had seen progress in improving 4th grade reading proficiency, that progress was reversed

in 2017 when 71 percent of 4th graders scored below proficient, 44th worst in the nation. Oklahoma students ranked even lower (45th) for 8th grade math proficiency, with 76 percent scoring below proficient. 44th in the family and community domain. Teen birth rates are at an all-time low nationwide and in Oklahoma, where they have dropped 34 percent since 2010. Despite this improvement, Oklahoma's 2016 rate of 33 births per 1,000 females age 15 to 19 was tied with Mississippi for 2nd highest in the nation. Oklahoma also ranked among the highest for children in families where the head of household lacks a high school diploma (141,000 children, or 15 percent of all kids in the state).

40th in health. Oklahoma was a national leader for one measure of child health in the Data Book – the state has the lowest percentage of children ages 12-17 who abused alcohol in the past year (4 percent). Oklahoma also improved in reducing the number of low birthweight babies by 7 percent since 2010 and now ranks 19th in the U.S. on this measure. However, the state continues to struggle with a relatively high child uninsured rate (7 percent, 5th highest in the U.S.) and a high rate of child and teen deaths (35 deaths per 1,000, 7th highest in the U.S.).

For too long, Oklahoma has under-invested in children and put too many barriers in the way of young families who are struggling to get by. The commitments made this year to fund education and teacher pay will make a difference, but we also took some steps in the wrong direction. For example, the push to deny health care to very low-income parents who don't meet strict work and reporting requirement threatens health care access for both these parents and their children. We must do better to become a state where all children have what they need to thrive.

## Why Americans Struggle to be Happy

A new cross-cultural study finds that we should pursue stronger social ties, not happiness.

(This article was published in the Greater Good Magazine a publication of the Greater Good Science Center at the University of California, Berkeley.)

Americans want to be happy. The pursuit of happiness is even an unalienable right for Americans, according to the Declaration of Independence.

But some recent studies have found a paradox: The pursuit of happiness tends to make individual Americans unhappy. Did the Founding Fathers set us up for failure?

A new study sheds some light on this peculiar American contradiction, suggesting that the relationship between pursuing happiness and decreased well-being, far from being universal, may actually be a product of our individualistic culture.

Brett Ford, of the University of California, Berkeley, teamed up with researchers from around the world to look at the pursuit of happiness in four culturallydistinct locations: the United States, Germany, Russia, and East Asia. College undergraduates living in each location answered questionnaires measuring their psychological and physical well-being, their motivation to pursue happiness, and the extent to which they viewed happiness in social terms—meaning that for them happiness was linked to social engagement and helping others.

Ford and colleagues then analyzed the data to find out how these factors interacted with one another in different cultural settings. The results, published in the Journal of Experimental Psychology, showed that the pursuit of happiness actually led to less subjective

or studies. But for Germans, there was no impact of the pursuit of happiness on well-being—while for the Russian and East Asian students, the pursuit of happiness actually correlated with more happiness, not less.

"Although the intense motivation to pursue happiness has been very robustly linked to worse well-being in the US," says Ford, "the reverse pattern found in other cultures tells us that the link between the motivation to pursue happiness and well-being is culturally influenced."

The impact of culture on the pursuit of happiness seems to be related to the way different cultures view happiness, she says. In Russia and East Asia, study participants were shown to strongly equate happiness with social relationships—something Ford says is in line with their more "collectivist," or group-oriented, cultures. In Germany and the United States this wasn't the case, probably a result of their more "individualistic" orientation.

This suggests that in collectivist cultures, people seek social solutions for becoming happier, says Ford. Since social ties and social connection are well-known predictors of subjective well-being, this may explain why they tend to actually feel happier.

"The fact that the socially-engaged pursuit of happiness is stronger in Russia and East Asia than it is in the US and Germany at least partially explains why those cultures are more likely to have greater wellwell-being for Americans, a finding that replicates pribeing when they really want to pursue happiness," she This may also explain why study participants who defined happiness as social engagement tended to have more well-being, whatever their culture. Pursuing social relationships is a surefire way to make someone happier, says Ford, and lots of prior research supports this connection.

Still, it's difficult to accept that the motivation to pursue happiness does not translate into greater wellbeing for Americans—even for those who view happiness in social ways. Ford speculates that being embedded in a culture that's centered on the self—and holding a culturally incongruent definition of happiness—might lead to a sense of not belonging or of frustration.

For those who still have a typical go-it-alone American attitude, strongly desiring happiness may create a high standard—like, I must always be happy—that's hard to meet. This leads to disappointment, which directly interferes with being happy.

"Part of the reason that wanting to be happy backfires in the US is that people get down on themselves," says Ford. "Also, wanting happiness can make you self-focused and disengaged, and then you're kind of lonely, and that interferes with feeling happy, too."

Yet, pursuing happiness is not necessarily doomed to failure, she says. Instead, it depends on whether you belong to a culture that supports social relationships as a pathway to happiness, and many do.

But, if you're from a culture that doesn't see happiness as socially-determined, you can try to focus less intensely on your desire to be happy and just concentrate on building social relationships—hang out with friends and family, seek out social opportunities when possible, and develop practices like compassion and gratitude, which can make you feel more connected to others.

That way, you can avoid the pitfall of pursuing happiness and beat a more direct path to well-being.

"We don't have to discourage people from wanting happiness; we just need to give them better tools," says Ford.

## **Cheesy Salsa Mac**

tongue torn out by the roots."



## This Month in History — August

#### August 7

1945 - Japan Nuclear Bomb Comment, Japanese imperial headquarters stated a few new type bombs had been dropped, causing considerable damage. The US confirmed it was a single bomb which later is confirmed to have destroyed 60 percent of the City of Hiroshima including practically all living things, human and animal burned to death by the tremendous heat and pressure engendered by the blast.

1948 - Truman Government Accused of Un-American Activities, Representative, McDowell a member of the House Committee on Un-American Activities, claimed that the Truman government shipped 1,300 tons of uranium to the Soviet Union in 1945. McDowell thought that the Soviets had a spy ring sabotaging the United States government and that the uranium was going to be used for military purposes. He also accused Canada of shipping 500 pounds of uranium nitrate and 500 pounds of black uranium to Moscow. The Soviets claimed the radio-active material was for medical and research purposes.

1958 - U.S.A. Arthur Miller, The playwright Arthur Miller has been cleared of contempt of court by the Court of Appeals for refusing to provide the names of alleged Communist writers with whom he had attended meetings with in New York in 1947 to the House of 1974 - U.S.A. Nixon Resigns, Richard Nixon An-Un-American Activities Committee.

1960 - Protests Over White Only Restaurants, In Oklahoma city more than 200 black protesters had a sit-in to protest the ban on blacks eating at white-only restaurants. The protesters marched from Calvary Baptist Church to the downtown area in 90 degree temperatures. Although the group maintained a policy of nonviolence, the leader Mrs. Luper decided that if the sitin failed the next step would be a boycott of Oklahoma city businesses.

1990 - Kuwait Operation Desert Shield, Following the invasion of Kuwait by Iraq troops President George Herbert Walker Bush orders the organization of Operation Desert Shield with American troops becoming part of an international coalition in the war against Iraq.

1998 - Africa US Embassies Bombed, The Islamic fundamentalist terrorist organization al-Qaeda (run by Osama bin Laden) is believed responsible for the

bombings today of two United States Embassies in Nairobi, Kenya and Dar es Salaam, Tanzania where at least 200 people have been killed and more than 5,000 injured. US President Bill Clinton is shocked and has made a statement "We will use all the means at our disposal to bring those responsible to justice."

2004 - U.S.A. Iraq Prisoners Abuse, Sgt. Joseph Darby agonized for a month before he reported that his fellow soldiers were abusing Iraqi prisoners. He turned in two CD's of photos that revealed inmates hooded and naked being led around on a leash like dogs. Darby found it hard to submit the photos, because the soldiers who committed the dishonorable acts were his friends.

2013 - Switzerland Segregation of Asylum Seekers, The first special center to house asylum seekers was opened in Bremgarten, Switzerland. Switzerland made a law to restrict the movements and public freedoms of asylum seekers in the country. The first such move was to house asylum seekers in special centers. Other measures included banning them from public places like swimming pools and libraries. Opponents say the measures are racist and discriminatory.

2006 - Spain Hundreds of Morocco Migrants Arrested, A total of 383 migrants, mostly from Morocco, who hid in trucks and fairground rides were arrested in the Spanish enclave of Ceuta in North Africa on this day. The migrants were headed for the Spanish mainland when they were intercepted by authorities.

2007 - China Baijis Dolphin Possible Extinct, Scientists announced that a rare type of dolphin was likely to be extinct. The Yangtze river dolphin, called Baijis, did not show up on researchers' surveys of the river. The extinction of the Yangtze river dolphin would become the first extinction of the kind in nearly fifty years. It is thought one or two have been spotted since but that would be insufficient to stop the Baijis Dolphin from extinction.

#### August 9

1945 - Atom Bomb Dropped On Nagasaki, The United States dropped its second atomic bomb killing more

than 70,000 people in Nagasaki, Japan. The first bomb had been dropped 3 days earlier on Hiroshima. Six days later on August 15th, Japan announced its surrender effectively ending World War II. Japan signed the Instrument of Surrender on September 2.

1974 - U.S.A. Gerald Ford, Gerald Ford becomes the Affair and President Richard Nixon resigns.

1978 - U.S.A. Inflation, Inflation rates rose by 1.1% in just one month as well as steeply rising fuel costs. Gas and heating oil had increased in price dramatically. Gas prices this year exceeded the July 1978 prices by 38.9% and heating fuel was 51.8% higher. Yearly Inflation Rate for 1978 in the USA was 7.62% Yearly Inflation Rate for 1978 in Great Britain was 8.3% To put this in perspective 1975 Inflation UK was 24.2% and 1979 in USA was 11.2%

2011 - Philadelphia Introduces Curfew, The US city of Philadelphia in Pennsylvania instituted a curfew after a series of violent flash-mobs occurred in the city. The measures put in place by Mayor Michael Nutter would carry penalties for minors and their parents who violate the curfew.

#### August 10

1990 - Magellan Space Craft, The Magellan spacecraft begins it's orbit of the planet Venus after a 15month journey from Earth. The space craft spent the next four years mapping Venus, producing a detailed map of 99% of the planet.

2002 - Concerns Over Corporate Corruption, Stock market losses, corporate corruption, and a sagging economy have hit senior citizens hard and have become an election issue. After retiring a couple of years ago Michael Dalal, a lawyer and businessman, lost half of his savings and had to go back to work. Seniors accounted for 14% of the vote in 2000. The AARP (The Association of Retired People) is keeping made public till this date. an eye on pensions and corporate fraud prevention.

The damage is a major concern for NASA since the Columbia disaster in 2003 which was caused through a similar problem and not repaired prior to re-entry. Over the next 7 days astronauts will be sent out on space walks to first inspect 38th president of the United States after the Watergate the damage and send pictures back to NASA and then if needed to patch up the damage with filler of a metal shield to protect the area for re-entry. The Space shuttle has been sent to the International Space Station to replace one of the four gyroscopes which help control the orbiting outpost's orientation in space.

1917 - Palestine Turks Attack Gaza. In Palestine Turks plundered and murdered some of the Jewish inhabitants. An Associated Press Official observed, "The attitude of the young Turks for the unfortunate non-Turkish races within their empire has been an open campaign of robbery, exploitation, and massacre." The town of Gaza had to be evacuated and the regional violence was the worst since World War I began. 1929 - Germany Graf Zeppelin, The Graf Zeppelin from Friedrichshafen Germany was prevented from taking off due to bad weather in Russia. It was supposed to travel to Tokyo on its second world cruise. It was possible that another course in Russia could be charted for it, but the weather remained uncertain. 1935 - Social Security Bill Signed, Following the huge unemployment and suffering during the Depression President Roosevelt signed the social security bill providing unemployment compensation and pensions for the elderly.

1945 - Truman Announces Japanese Surrender, President Truman announces Japan has accepted terms for unconditional surrender following the second nuclear bomb on Nagasaki on the August 9th just a few days before, The agreement to the terms of the Potsdam Terms had been agreed on the 10th August but not

1969 - Northern Ireland Britain To Deploy Troops, Following a number of days of violence in Londonderry, Belfast and other cities in Northern Ireland, the British Home Secretary James Callaghan announces "limited operation" to restore law and order. highest ever recorded temperature in the country since 1999 - U.S.A. Gun Buy Back Project, In the District of records began in 1875. Throughout August the intense Columbia, the government had implemented a program to buy guns for \$100.00 each. A victim of its own success, some municipal governments ran out of money and had to bribe people with running shoes and sewing machines instead of cash. 




