#### **How Did April Fools' Day Start?**



April Fools' Day or April Fool's Day is an annual (primarily) Western celebration commemorated on April 1 by playing practical jokes and spreading hoaxes. The jokes and their victims are called April fools. People playing April Fool jokes often expose their prank by shouting "April fool(s)" at the unfortunate victim(s).

A disputed association between April 1 and foolishness is in Geoffrey Chaucer's The Canterbury Tales (1392). In the "Nun's Priest's Tale", a vain cock Chauntecleer is tricked by a fox on Syn March bigan thritty dayes and two. Readers apparently understood this line to mean "32 March", i.e. April 1. However, it is not clear that Chaucer was referencing April 1. Modern scholars believe that there is a copying error in the extant manuscripts and that Chaucer actually wrote, Syn March was gon. If so, the passage would have originally meant 32 days after March, i.e. 2 May, the anniversary of the engagement of King Richard II of England to Anne of Bohemia, which took place in 1381.

In 1508, French poet Eloy d'Amerval referred to a poisson d'avril (April fool, literally "Fish of April"), possibly the first reference to the celebration in France. Some writers suggest that April Fools' originated because in the Middle Ages, New Year's Day was celebrated on March 25 in most European towns, through a holiday that in some areas of France, specifically, ended on April 1, and those who celebrated New Year's Eve on January 1 made fun of those who celebrated on other dates by the invention of April Fools' Day. The use of January 1 as New Year's Day became common in France only by the mid-16th century, and the date was not adopted officially until 1564, thanks to the Edict of Roussillon.

In 1539, Flemish poet Eduard de Dene wrote of a nobleman who sent his servants on foolish errands on April 1. In the Netherlands, the origin of April Fools' Day is often attributed to the Dutch victory at Brielle in 1572, where the Spanish Duke Álvarez de Toledo was defeated. "Op 1 april verloor Alva zijn bril" is a Dutch proverb, which can be translated to: "On the first of April, Alva lost his glasses." In this case, the glasses ("bril" in Dutch) serve as a metaphor for Brielle. This theory, however, provides no explanation for the international celebration of April Fools' Day.

In 1686, John Aubrey referred to the celebration as "Fooles holy day", the first British reference. On April 1, 1698, several people were tricked into going to the Tower of London to "see the Lions washed".

Although no Biblical scholar or historian are known to have mentioned a relationship, some have expressed the belief that the origins of April Fool's Day may go back to the Genesis flood narrative. In a 1908 edition of the Harper's Weekly cartoonist Bertha R. McDonald wrote:

Authorities gravely back with it to the time of Noah and the ark. The London Public Advertiser of March 13, 1769, printed: "The mistake of Noah sending the dove out of the ark before the water had abated, on the first day of April, and to perpetuate the memory of this deliverance it was thought proper, whoever forgot so remarkable a circumstance, to punish them by sending them upon some sleeveless errand similar to that ineffectual message upon which the bird was sent by the patriarch".

#### **List of Some of April Fool Pranks**

#### **Television Stations**

Spaghetti trees: The BBC television programme Panorama ran a hoax in 1957, purporting to show the Swiss harvesting spaghetti from trees. They claimed that the despised pest, the spaghetti weevil, had been eradicated. A large number of people contacted the BBC wanting to know how to cultivate their own spaghetti trees. It was, in fact, filmed in St Albans. The editor of Panorama at the time, Michael Peacock, approved the idea, which was pitched by freelance camera operator Charles de Jaeger. Peacock told the BBC in 2014 that he gave de Jaeger a budget of £100. Peacock said the respected Panorama anchorman Richard Dimbleby knew they were using his authoritativeness to make the joke work. He said Dimbleby loved the idea and went at it with relish. Decades later CNN called this broadcast "the biggest hoax that any reputable news establishment ever pulled".

- In 1962, Swedish national television broadcast a 5-minute special on how one could get color TV by placing a nylon stocking in front of the TV. A rather in-depth description on the physics behind the phenomenon was included. Thousands of people tried it.
- Smell-o-vision: In 1965, the BBC purported to conduct a trial of a new technology allowing the transmission of odour over the airwaves to all viewers. Many viewers reportedly contacted the BBC to report the trial's success. In 2007, the BBC website repeated an online version of the hoax, as did Google in 2013, in tribute.

#### **Radio Stations**

- ◊ Jovian–Plutonian gravitational effect: In 1976, British astronomer Sir Patrick Moore told listeners of BBC Radio 2 that unique alignment of two planets would result in an upward gravitational pull making people lighter at precisely 9:47 am that day. He invited his audience to jump in the air and experience "a strange floating sensation". Dozens of listeners phoned in to say the experiment had worked, among them a woman who reported that she and her 11 friends were "wafted from their chairs and orbited gently around the room."
- Opie and Anthony were discussing April Fool's Day hoaxes, and sardonically stated that Boston mayor Thomas Menino had been killed in a car accident. Menino happened to be on a flight at the time, lending credence to the prank as he could not be reached. The pair repeated that the mayor was dead several times throughout the broadcast, however listeners who tuned in late to the broadcast did not hear that they were repeating a bit, and when they pretended to tell the "news" to an unsuspecting listener (the listener thought she was calling a different show), the rumor spread quickly across the city, eventually causing news stations to issue alerts denying the hoax. The pair were fired shortly thereafter.
- ◊ In 1998, UK presenter Nic Tuff of West Midlands radio station pretended to be the British Prime Minister Tony Blair when he called the then South African President Nelson Mandela for a chat. It was only at the end of the call when Nic asked Mandela what he was doing for April Fools' Day that the line went dead.
- ♦ Archers theme tune change: BBC Radio 4 (2005): The Today Programme announced in the news that the long-running serial The Archers had changed its theme tune to an upbeat disco style.

iBod: Every year, National Public Radio in the United States does an extensive news story on April 1. These usually start off more or less reasonably, and get more and more unusual. A recent example is the 2006 story on the "iBod," a portable body control device. In 2008 it reported that the IRS, to assure rebate checks were actually spent, was shipping consumer products instead of checks. It also runs false sponsor mentions, such as "Support for NPR comes from the Soylent Corporation, manufacturing protein -rich food products in a variety of colors. Soylent Green is People".

**Newspapers and Magazines** 

- \* Scientific American columnist Martin Gardner wrote in an April 1975, article that MIT had invented a new chess computer program that predicted "pawn to queens rook four" is always the best opening move.
- \* In The Guardian newspaper, in the United Kingdom, on April Fools' Day, 1977, a fictional mid-ocean state of San Serriffe was created in a seven-page supplement.
- \* A 1985 issue of Sports Illustrated, dated April 1, featured a story by George Plimpton on a baseball player, Hayden Siddhartha Finch, a New York Mets pitching prospect who could throw the ball 168 miles per hour (270 km/h) and who had a number of eccentric quirks, such as playing with one barefoot and one hiking boot. Plimpton later expanded the piece into a full-length novel on Finch's life. Sports Illustrated cites the story as one of the more memorable in the magazine's history.

#### Internet

- Kremvax: In 1984, in one of the earliest online hoaxes, a message was circulated that Usenet had been opened to users in the Soviet Union.
- April Fools' Day Request for Comments: Almost every year since 1989, the Internet Engineering Task Force has included an April Fool in their Request for Comments publication, including a "Hyper Text Coffee Pot Control Protocol" and "Electricity over IP".
- College Mascots: For decades, printed college newspapers have run stories about their respective institutions changing to a ridiculous or silly new athletics mascot. In the internet age, the practice has moved to online editions and then to the social media pages of fanbases and alumni associations.

• Dead fairy hoax: In 2007, an illusion designer for magicians posted on his website some images illustrating the corpse of an unknown eight-inch creation, which was claimed to be the mummified remains of a fairy. He later sold the fairy on eBay for £280.

# **Top 10 Scientific And Historical Facts About Bees**

Mankind's relationship with bees goes beyond the love affair with honey. The sweet treat has its own unusual properties and claims, but bee venom, genes, and fossils are changing many scientific fields. Ancient therapies return to heal (or kill) modern patients, and famous prehistoric events lurk in the insects' DNA. There's the oldest honey farm that was surprisingly advanced and the oldest bee that evolution hated. It is easy to overlook a buzzing individual in the garden, but bees' history and influence remain remarkably complex.

#### Why Honey Lasts Forever


The recipe for immortality is simple—acidity, no water, and a touch of hydrogen peroxide. At least, this works for honey. Many a surprised archaeologist has stum-



bled upon the sweet snack and found it edible after thousands of years. Honey has one enemy—water. Should water get into it, the honey will spoil. Nectar is mostly water, and this flowery ingredient is also the first step in the honey-making process. Remarkably, bees remove the water from nectar by fanning it dry with their rapid wing beats. After bees regurgitate nectar into honeycombs, they leave behind a stomach enzyme that breaks down the fluid. One by-product is hydrogen peroxide which, along with honey's natural acidic and waterless state, prevents organisms from surviving inside the delicious goop.[1] This ability to smother infections was the reason why many ancient cultures used honey as a natural bandage for open and burn wounds. If honey remains sealed against water, there is no reason why it cannot last for as long as the lid holds.

#### **Ancient Snacks For Bees**

In 2015, researchers looked at what kind of pollen clung to the fossil bees from the extinct group called Electrapini. Found in Germany and aged 44–48 million years, the bees revealed their snacking habits outside the hive.Bees



travel great distances to gather pollen to feed their young. These grains are compacted into balls against the bee's back legs and are known as pollen baskets. During the marathon flight sessions, the adults must also eat constantly to replenish energy. The pollen on the ancient bees revealed that the nectar-loving adults did not shy

away from leaving their usual pollen areas to search for nectar for themselves. Finding one kind of pollen in the baskets (for the babies) and a multitude of other plants' pollen on their bodies (picked up wherever they consumed nectar) is scientifically important. It is the oldest proof that bees collect food for themselves and their offspring during the same flight. [2] The discovery is also crucial to the survival of modern bees. If researchers can apply this knowledge to find out what flowering plants best support bees, these food sources can be better protected.

#### What Ancient Mead Tastes Like

In 2000, archaeologists dug into a grave in Germany. The burial mound dated between the seventh and fifth centuries BC and contained the weapons of a long-decomposed man.



A cauldron lay at his feet (or where they once were). Inside were the 2,500-year-old remains of something dark. Curious to know what was so valued that it had to accompany the man into the afterlife, researchers decided to test it. The sediment turned out to be mead, a honey-based alcoholic drink. Taking things a step further, brewers were brought in to recreate the ancient refreshment in 2016. The Iron Age booze had five ingredients: honey, yeast, barley, and the herbs mint and meadowsweet for flavor. When tasted, it was drinkable and in the vicinity of a dry port that lacked sweetness.[3] Surprisingly, the mint came through very strongly with only a hint of meadowsweet and no honey. The lack of a honey taste was not surprising. The ingredient had converted into a good alcoholic kick. Even so, the consensus was that the Iron Age mead would probably not become popular at bars today.

#### New Cuckoo Bees

Cuckoo bees were named for the bird that deposits its eggs in the nests of other species. This kind of bee doesn't have a nest and leaves its kids inside the hives of settled swarms. A



cuckoo baby bee kills off the resident bee larva and consumes the pollen stored for the larva. Once grown, the invader abandons the adoptive nest to live a solitary life. In 2018, scientists discovered that cuckoo bees were good at hiding in museums, too. Amazingly, when researchers scoured through bee collections in North American museums, 15 new cuckoo bee species showed up. They all belonged to the Epeolus genus, and the discovery pushed the known North American species in

this group up to 43. The newcomers resembled wasps rather than bees. Although some were clearly unidentified types, others looked so similar that only DNA tests revealed their unknown status. Finding new bees in old collections could only be the start of adding more species to the 20,000 already identified.

#### **Romanians Love Their Bees**


In Romania, the restorative properties of the hive are more than just an alternative lifestyle craze. It is serious business. Due to its past history of poverty and communism, Romania



never developed as fast as most other countries. As a result, nature remained diverse and the people held onto folk remedies. Many qualified doctors and bee product researchers come from families where honey was used as traditional medicine. Today, Romania actively keeps apitherapy alive in villages and in the science laboratory. Considered the "oldest pharmacy in the world," apitherapy includes venom, honey, propolis, and even pollen. Going back to ancient Greek and Roman times, it was hailed back in the day as a wound healer, aid to indigestion, and more. Romanian treatments are said to combat diseases and conditions like multiple sclerosis, sore throats, weak immune systems. The country is not put off by the medical community, which largely is unconvinced by apitherapy. Each town has a so-called plafar, a pharmacy that specializes in bee products. Bucharest opened the world's first apitherapy medical center back in 1984. A census in 2010 also counted 42,000 beekeepers happily attending 1.3 million colonies of bees.

#### **Ancient Brain Booster**

Around 2.5 million years ago, hominids broke away from the apes by developing bigger brains. Something happened to these early hominids that enlarged



their gray matter even more, and they developed the mental faculties that separated them from animals.Researchers believe that food—in particular, honey—played a big part in the evolution of this human trademark. Though honey is certainly not the only thing that nourished brain power, there is a strong argument that its properties acted like a booster. Apart from other critical foods like meat, honey had glucose and dense energy that were perfect for brain development. Back then, the only available source was wild honey and that was even better. The wild variety is packed with bee larvae pieces, minerals, vitamins, fat, and protein.[6]There is no evidence of honey-enriched brains in the fossil rec- 6 ord, but looking at people and apes today suggests that

the theory is sound. Wild honey remains a huge part of several tribal diets around the world. Primates also continue to use inventive ways, tools included, to break into beehives.

#### **People Who Love Bee Venom**

It is called Bee Venom Therapy, a practice that falls under apitherapy (medicinal uses of bees and honey). The treatment is ancient and painful. The doctor, or whoever qualifies to oversee



this bizarre method, angers a bee before letting it sting the patient. The bees are usually placed on trigger points. During a visit, the person receives multiple zaps from a small swarm. How the venom is supposed to help for things like scarring, inflammation, anxiety, and even serious conditions like high blood pressure and multiple sclerosis is unknown. However, believers (including celebrities) stand strong behind the treatment. Those who are scared of the stings also have the option to be injected with the venom, but the therapy is far from safe. The so-called benefits still need to be scientifically proven. In 2015, a Spanish woman suffered a horrific case of anaphylactic shock. She had no prior history of a bee allergy and underwent the treatment for two years. During the last visit, a sting caused a massive stroke and organ failure, killing her.

#### **Oldest Bee Farm**


At Tel Rehov in Israel's Jordan Valley, 30 clay cylinders were unearthed in 2010. They held ancient honeybees but not as traps. The insects lived inside the containers, a fact backed up by



tiny doors and the fossils of different individuals and life stages. Among the remains were worker bees, drones as well as pupae and larvae. The hives were around 3,000 years old and, oddly, within a courtyard inside a dense urban area. Bees can get nasty, especially during routine honey removal. The reason behind the risky location is not fully understood. Perhaps, honey was so precious that the location kept the "factory" safe from theft or natural damage. Interestingly, the bee species was different from those living in Israel today. Instead, the fossils closely matched Turkish bees. The farm was the first archaeological evidence of beekeeping. Also, the foreign species (probably imported for better quality) and the elaborate courtyard showed that the practice was already highly advanced in Israel 3,000 years ago.

#### **Oldest Bee Was A Dud**

Amber is a semiprecious stone that often harbors fossils. Thanks to its translucent and preservation qualities, amber makes million-year-old specimens appear freshly trapped in yellow glass.Recently, another



frozen-in-time specimen was found—the world's oldest bee. The amber piece was mined in the Hukawng Valley of Myanmar (Burma). Inside was a bee that died around 100 million years ago. Astonishingly, the previous oldest bees were about 40 million years younger. This allowed scientists a good look at the "first bee." It was male, unrelated to any modern species, and ate pollen. It was not a honeybee. Named Melittosphex burmensis, it was five times smaller than today's honeybee and shared several physical traits with carnivorous wasps. The tiny creature could help scientists better understand the era's flowers, four of which were trapped with the prehistoric bee.[9] Unfortunately for Melittosphex burmensis itself, the lack of living descendants suggests that the species was an evolutionary flop that went extinct before it could contribute as an ancestor to modern bees.

#### **Dinosaur Extinction In Bee DNA**

The great dinosaur extinction event is a well-known fact

that happened around 65 million years ago. Images of giant creatures like Tyrannosaurus rex dying in the disaster (thought to be a space impact) make it easy to forget that other non-dinosaur



species also perished. One of them may have been the ancestors of today's carpenter bees. In 2013, a study looked at the latter's DNA and found something unexpected. A genetic anomaly possibly showed the effect of the dinosaur extinction event on the carpenter bee lineage. Four kinds of these bees showed the exact same thing: Around 65 million years ago, evolution stopped dead. [10] No genetic diversity happened for close to 10 million years. To scientists, something like this indicates a mass extinction inside a species' history. The similar timing suggested that the bees were wiped out during the same disaster that crushed the dinosaurs and 80 percent of all Earth's species.

#### Top 10 Peculiar Happenings In The World Of Horses

Horses can no longer be described purely as beasts of burden. These days, they are athletes, pets, and subjects of unusual studies. Researchers have found that horses can talk in symbols and hold grudges against people they have never met. The hoofed wonders also wore zebra blankets for science and inspired the birth of movies. Even more surprisingly, their clones can now compete in the Olympic Games.

#### Frankfurt's Roaming Mare

Frankfurt's police are used to something very unusual—phone calls about an animal loose in the city. To be fair, the creature is a large Arabian horse and pedestrians often worry that she is



lost or might bolt into traffic. The police never do anything and with good reason. They know Jenny well. In fact, the Arabian mare has taken her morning stroll through Frankfurt's Fechenheim district for the past 14 years—without incident. Many find it upsetting that she is by herself. However, those who dare to go close enough can read a card attached to her halter. It explains, "I'm called Jenny, not a runaway, just taking a walk. Thanks."[1]Despite the police assuring callers that the horse is a regular feature in the neighborhood, the owner faces a slew of criticism. Werner Weischedel often hears from strangers on social media that he is being negligent. However, an entire veterinarians union stands behind the owner and police. They dismiss the criticism, saying that the Arabian knows her way, walks leisurely, and appears very satisfied.

#### **Reilly And Trooper**

They may not be all that peculiar, but this pair deserves special mention. Detective John Reilly and his horse, Trooper, were Central Park's only mounted team. In 2019, Reilly



reached 63 years old, the mandatory retirement limit. Had it been up to Reilly, he clearly would have patrolled Central Park for a few more years. He and his faithful mount were a favorite of selfie-seeking tourists and those needing directions. Reilly had been with New York's mounted unit for 24 years, but he rode Trooper alone in Central Park during the last decade. The horse is part quarter horse, part Belgian, and around 15 years old. Trooper logged 10 years on duty, sporting his own de-


partment blanket and larger-than-normal police shield. Coincidentally, Trooper had also reached retirement age. The patient creature went to a special farm that provides lifelong care for retired police horses, and officers can visit. There are no plans to assign the Central Park route to another single officer. Instead, Reilly's spot will likely be taken by a group of mounted officers.

#### The Ice Age Foal

Late in 2018, a mummified foal was found in Siberia. It died around 40,000 years ago during the last ice age. A team of scientists in Siberia wants to use the remains to resurrect the species. It could take a while, if



ever, to succeed. However, the foal represents more than just having another species back on the planet. It could help scientists develop the technology to return more difficult extinct animals, notably the woolly mammoth. The theory is that a living surrogate mare can carry a cloned foal to term without the need for genetic adaptation.[3] For now, a mammoth must be an elephantmammoth hybrid to complete the pregnancy inside an elephant cow. Unlike horses, mammoths and elephants are not closely related. The Siberian team, which boasts international scientists, claims that they only need a single living cell from the foal. It can be multiplied to create countless embryos. The rest of the scientific community is not forthcoming with support. Ice age DNA is normally broken beyond repair into millions of bits. Also, finding a cell with a complete genetic code is close to impossible.



#### They Get Dressed As Zebras

There are theories about why zebras need lines. Camouflage is an obvious pick—a herd of stripes makes individual zebras harder to spot by predators. Other theories suggest that the stripes



aid social interactions or regulate their temperature. Another idea involved flies. For a while now, scientists have known that flies bother horses more than zebras for some reason. In 2019, three groups of horses got new blankets. One group wore white, another donned black, and the third got saddled with stripy frocks. Researchers watched horse flies in action and gathered hours of data. The study found that the insects swarmed around horses and zebras without prejudice. Even though the flies approached both species in roughly equal attempts, they landed three times as often on horses. Around zebras and the striped horses, flies seemed a little drunk. They bumped into the animals or just flew away. It would appear that one purpose of the striped hide is to confuse the bloodsucking pests.

#### The Blanket Board

In Norway, some horses do not wait for twolegged wonders to decide when they should wear blankets. In 2016, a small herd of 23 showed when they wanted a blanket put on



or removed or whether they wanted to keep wearing one. It was not always this way. Researchers designed a board with three signs. Using carrots as a reward, the horses were taught the meanings behind the signs. A horizontal stripe meant "I want my blanket," a vertical bar denoted "take this thing off me," and a blank symbol signified "I want to keep wearing my blanket." The animals were encouraged to touch the board with their muzzles. Amazingly, it took just two weeks of daily training lasting 15 minutes each at most. All 23 horses made their choices when asked to do so. They did not just thump their snoots at the board to get carrots. Every time, their answers sensibly matched with the weather. (When wet or cold, they wanted their blankets.)

#### **Psychologists Show Them Photos**


In 2018, the Universities of Sussex and Portsmouth showed images to horses. This was not an inkblot test but photos of people who looked happy or angry.




Horse lovers know that the animals can read human body language very well. The photos not only proved it but also that horses can hold an angry expression against somebody—even when that person did nothing upsetting. The study took 24 horses and monitored their responses to the photos. Interestingly, the scowling faces increase heart rates and sparked negative reactions from the horses. Most of the animals also viewed the threatening pictures with their left eye. A few hours later, the models arrived but kept their expressions neutral. When meeting the "angry" humans, the horses experienced faster heartbeats and turned their heads to keep the person in view with the left eye. The animal ability to recognize a particular person's emotions hours later has never been recorded before. Even more striking, they prejudged strangers from their photos, which altered the animal's behavior when they met for the first time.

#### The First GIF

During the 1800s, the horse was the main way to get around. For this reason, one debate was alive and well: At any point, did a galloping horse lift all four hooves



off the ground? Leland Stanford, the founder of Stanford University, had racehorses himself. To settle the debate and understand equestrian locomotion (he wanted to make his animals faster), he hired a brilliant photographer. Eadweard Muybridge was tasked with the impossible—take photographs of a galloping horse. The problem? The era's exposure time was so long that a person having his photograph taken had to stand really still or risk being seen as a blur. Incredibly, to do the assignment, Muybridge invented a shutter that snapped shut within one-thousandth of a second.[7]In 1878, he rigged a racetrack with cameras. A horse ran over trip wires and triggered a sequence of photographs. One of them proved that horses were completely airborne at one point. Muybridge took it further and created a device that allowed the images to be viewed in motion essentially, the world's first GIF and the inspiration for movies today.



#### **Illegal Frog Juice**

When a lot of money can be won, an injured racehorse is a bother. Illegal painkillers are nothing new in the racing industry, but regulators actively fight the



practice. Meant to keep injured animals running, this inhumane treatment ends with the horse breaking down. An unusual rumor started circulating around 2012. There was a painkiller being used by trainers that was 40 times more powerful than morphine—and it came from a frog. It took months before samples were confiscated and analyzed. [8] Called dermorphin, it was made from the secretions of the waxy monkey tree frog. However, its widespread availability suggested that most was likely produced synthetically. The substance made horses euphoric, hyper, and unable to feel pain. Dermorphin was also a performance booster. Several horses that tested positive had won large sums in recent races. Due to its potency, dermorphin was outed as one of the industry's worst and weirdest drug violations.

#### **Britain's First Guide Horse**

Mohammed Salim Patel turns heads wherever he goes. Patel, who is visually impaired, cannot see people's reactions. However, he can hear the stir that he and his guide horse create on the streets of Blackburn



in Lancashire. As he traversed the marketplace one day, he heard cell phones snapping photos of Digby, his American miniature horse. The unusual choice did not come from the desire to stand out. Patel suffers from a fear of dogs. Not having a guide dog made the 23-year-old reliant on people for assistance. Digby was raised at a pony therapy farm in North Yorkshire and is Britain's first guide horse for the blind. In 2018, the pair started training together and should complete the program in 2020. After graduation, the tiny creature is bound for his own miniature stable at Patel's home. Although the choice of species seems unusual, there are perks. Besides being capable of guiding, miniatures live around 45 years—a lot longer than dogs—and have no problem doubling as a shopping carrier.



#### **Clones At The Olympics**

Horses have been cloned since 2003.
Around four years later, the Federation Equestre Internationale (FEI) banned cloned horses and their offspring from the Olympic Games.
Since most would be




cloned from high-level champions, FEI believed that the replicas had an unfair advantage in competition. In 2012, the governing body reviewed the issue. They found that clones were 98 percent identical to the original horse. While the margin was small, it overturned the ban. Other factors also helped. Just because the donor animal shattered records does not mean that the clone is guaranteed to inherit its performance ability. The rider, training, environment, and nutrition all influence competing skills. In other words, 10 clones from the same horse raised differently in all ways will not turn out the same. Genetic copies must also go through the same channels as natural-born horses to reach the Games. Since roughly 300 animals make it to each Olympics, a clone must really prove itself to qualify.

# Top 10 Real-Life Inspirations For Famous Cartoon Characters

Whether they're bumbling, irascible, crotchety, irrepressible, sensual, obstreperous, or bombastic, we tend to love the larger-than-life cartoon characters that we grew up with, saw in reruns, or heard about from our elders. Although many of these beloved figures sprang fully formed from their creators' imaginations, some were based on actual people. Others were inspired by characters played by comedians or actors on radio and television shows.

#### W.C. Fields

A United Productions of America creation, the bald, cantankerous, nearsighted Mr. Magoo was an immediate hit when he debuted in 1949. He starred in 53



animated cartoons and won two Academy Awards. Mr. Magoo was immensely popular partly because he embodied "the nation's postwar optimism." Like comic actor W.C. Fields, the nearsighted Mr. Magoo had a bulbous nose and narrow eyes. He also mumbled frequently. Despite these similarities, Millard Kaufman, who wrote

the first cartoon featuring Mr. Magoo, said that Fields was not originally the inspiration for the character. Dialogue director Jerry Hausner seemed to contradict Kaufman's account as Hausner said that director John Hubley did not want the character's voice to sound like that of Fields. (Actor Jim Backus provided the character's distinctive voice.) Whether or not Fields was originally the inspiration for Mr. Magoo, Fields at least influenced the character fairly soon. After a few films featuring the character were made, Magoo creative director Pete Burness said that he and his colleagues studied the film performances of W.C. Fields for ideas. For example, they used a scene in which Fields waves his cane to "ward off dogs and other undesirables."

#### Frank 'Rocky' Fiegel

Although most of us have probably never heard of him, Frank "Rocky" Fiegel has a claim to fame: He's the inspiration for Popeye the Sailor, created in 1929 by Elzie Crisler Segar as a new character



in Segar's Thimble Theater comic strip. A resident of Chester, Illinois, Fiegel was "a one-eyed, pipe-smoking river man who had a penchant for getting into fistfights," just like Popeye. Other characters featured in Popeye cartoons were also inspired by Segar's hometown friends. Popeye's girlfriend, Olive Oyl, was based on a thin store owner named Dora Pascal. Wimpy was inspired by William "Windy Bill" Schuchert, who owned the local opera house and loved hamburgers enough to send his employees to buy them for him during breaks in performances. A 183centimeter-tall (6'0"), 408-kilogram (900 lb) bronze statue of Popeye was unveiled in 1977. The figure stands in Chester's Segar Memorial Park with hands on hips, pipe in the corner of its mouth, and eyes squinting into the distance. Each weekend after Memorial Day, Chester celebrates a three-day Popeye Picnic with lots of festivities for every-

#### **Dennis Lloyd Ketcham**

Dennis Mitchell, the child star of comic strips, comic books, and a television show, was based on creator Hank Ketcham's own son, Dennis Lloyd Ketcham.



One afternoon, the real-life Dennis was supposed to be napping. Instead, his mother found him removing the mattress and springs from his bed, pulling out drawers from his dresser, and taking down curtains by removing their rods. Exasperated, she cried, "Your son is a menace!" Hank Ketcham, an artist, was inspired. He hastily drew a dozen pencil sketches and sent them to his agent. Ten days later, he received a telegram: Bob Hall, Post Syndicate's president, was interested and asked to see 12 more sketches. In 1950, Ketcham signed a "once-in-a -lifetime, strike-it-rich jackpot contract." By the end of the year, Dennis the Menace was appearing daily in over 100 newspapers, each of which paid \$3 to \$5 per week for the feature. However, the Chicago Tribune paid \$100 each week due to its massive circulation.Ketcham added other characters. Dennis's neighbor, Mr. Wilson, was inspired by Ketcham's Sunday school superintendent. Dennis's friend Margaret was based on Ketcham's own "schoolboy crush." Then there was Wade, inspired by the local grocer, and Gina, presumably based on actress Gina Lollobrigida.

#### Rita Hayworth, Veronica Lake, And Lauren Bacall

Sexy cartoon character Jessica Rabbit was based on three movie stars. Appearing as Roger Rabbit's wife in the 1988 full-length animated feature film, Who



Framed Roger Rabbit?, Jessica attracted controversy because of her curvaceous figure, sultry demeanor, and sometimes suggestive dialogue. The film focused on the efforts of a shabby private detective to clear his falsely accused client, Roger, of a murder charge. Animation director Richard Williams explained his inspiration for Jessica: "I tried to make her like Rita Hayworth; we took her hair from Veronica Lake, and [Director Robert] Zemeckis kept saying, 'What about the look Lauren Bacall had?'"

#### **Margaret Kerry**

James M. Barrie's female fairy, Tinkerbell, was usually represented on the stage by a "flying point of light." For the 1953 Walt Disney film Peter Pan, she was personified as a winged pixie with a decidedly feminine figure.Her



curves proved too indecent for the play's fans, especially in light of the rumor that Tinkerbell was based on sex goddess Marilyn Monroe. In reality, Tinkerbell was modeled after a different actress, Margaret Kerry.Like any other actress seeking a part in a movie, Kerry had to audition for the role. She was faced with the challenge of conveying the character of a tiny fairy who never said a word. At first, she wasn't sure how to audition. but she played music and choreographed Tinkerbell making food for breakfast. Studio executives asked Kerry to have Tinkerbell "land on Wendy's dresser top, measure her hips, and be unhappy with the results."Impressed with Kerry's performance, they offered her the part. She reported to work the next week, helping to make Tinkerbell one of Hollywood's most iconic animated characters. For six months, Kerry's job was to pose with props and provide the facial expressions, gestures, and other responses that animators would give Tinkerbell to make her come alive as a character.



#### Red Skelton's Deadeye

Movie star and comedian Red Skelton invented a cavalcade of characters during his long and varied career. Starting in vaudeville during the 1930's, he soon moved to radio, followed by





TV—The Red Skelton Show, which aired each week from 1951–1971. One of these characters, Deadeye, played various roles set in the American Wild West, including those of an incompetent sheriff and a cowboy who "couldn't control his horse or sometimes even himself."Michael Maltese conceived the story for Hare Trigger, a 1945 Warner Brothers cartoon featuring the feisty, mustachioed, redheaded bandit Yosemite Sam, whose six-guns and sombrero were nearly as big as he was. According to Maltese, the character was based in part on director Friz Freleng. Like the character, Freleng was "short, red-haired, and wore a mustache." However, Yosemite Sam was later modeled mostly on Skelton's cowboy Deadeye.

#### **Percy Crosby**

Some artists pattern their cartoon characters after themselves. Percy Crosby, "the Rembrandt of American cartoonists" and creator of the classic cartoon character



Skippy, based his rambunctious alter ego on his own childhood. The precocious boy's fears echoed Crosby's own in his youth and those of every generation. Skippy's prayer, "Oh, Lord, give me strength to brush my teeth every night, and if Thou canst not give me strength, give me strength not to worry about it," is reminiscent of the pervasiveness of chores and the attendant fear of many young children. Skippy inspired a radio show, a 1929 novel, and a feature film starring Jackie Cooper. Everything from toys to food products was associated with Skippy. Just as his escapades came from Crosby's childhood, they also mirrored the adventures of many American youths as well, making Skippy an immensely popular character.

#### Marjorie Henderson Buell

Marjorie Henderson Buell, who signed her work "Marge," was another artist who modeled her cartoon character, Little Lulu, after herself. Thanks to Lulu, Buell



became the first female cartoonist to gain international

recognition. In high school, her studio was a converted chicken coop in which she drew cartoons that she sold to the Philadelphia Ledger. By her mid-twenties, she had syndicated two strips, The Boy Friend and Dashing Dot, but Little Lulu established Buell as a famous cartoonist.Little Lulu began as a 1935 replacement for The Saturday Evening Post's Henry, which had transitioned from local publication to national syndication. At first, Lulu was a silent character who spoke through her actions rather than her words. In one strip, she insisted on standing in the line to see a movie in a "Men Only" theater, having disguised herself by wearing a mustache. The cartoon was a hit, and Lulu soon pitched a variety of merchandise. In addition, she appeared on everything from lunch boxes to pajamas. Buell said that she chose Lulu because "a girl . . . could get away with more fresh stunts that in a small boy would seem boorish." Buell thought of Lulu as an independent role model for girls since the character was feminine and nonviolent but also feistv.

Little Lulu's predecessor, Henry, also became extremely popular as his strip's national syndication suggests. A pudgy, bald boy who always wore a red shirt, black shorts, and sneakers, Henry was an impromp-



tu creation. As a freelance artist, Carl Anderson contributed cartoons to major magazines such as Judge, Life, Collier's, and The Saturday Evening Post. He also drew regular strips. But it wasn't until age 67, when he created Henry, that he attained true financial security. After the Great Depression, he taught cartooning at a vocational school. He drew Henry during a lecture. His students liked the character, so he sent some samples to The Saturday Evening Post. In 1932, the magazine featured the strip every week. Henry was one of the few cartoon characters who didn't speak. Mute, he depended on pantomime to communicate. He wouldn't hesitate to blacken Butch the Bully's eye, if need be, and he enjoyed the company of Henrietta, who looked exactly like Henry except for her pink hair ribbon, her blonde curls, and her pink dress. Henry was also pals with his canine companion, Dusty.

#### **Archie Andrews**

Archie Andrews lived in Riverdale, where he attended high school with Betty Cooper, Veronica Lodge, Jughead Jones, Reggie Mantle, Big Moose Mason, Dilton



Doiley, Midge Klump, Ethel Muggs, and Chuck Clayton. Adults, such as the teenagers' parents, Principal Weatherbee, homeroom teacher Miss Grundy, and chocolate shop proprietor Pop Tate, made occasional appearances.But Archie comics focused on Archie's romances with Betty and Veronica, his friendship with Jughead, his rivalry with Reggie, and his interaction with his other Riverdale friends. A radio show, The Archie Show TV series (1968–1969), and several TV specials and sequels were based on the comic strip, as was a flood of Archierelated merchandise. Archie himself was inspired by actor Mickey Rooney, who appeared in silent films as early as 1926 and in "talkies" later on, including films in the 21st century. (Rooney died in 2014.) Archie Comics debuted in 1939 when Rooney was starring in such teenoriented fare as Andy Hardy's Private Secretary (1941) and other films in the series. Rooney's roles in these films provided the model for Archie Andrews.For MLJ Publishing's cofounder John Goldwater, the success of the Archie radio show and Rooney's movies suggested the time was right to introduce comic books offering

readers something besides superhero adventures. He wanted to market comics more relevant to young people's everyday lives: "an idealized and sanitized version of the American teenager of the 1940s." Over the years, Archie comic books were updated to reflect more current themes that appealed to contemporary readers.
