A Holy Week Monologue

I" don't belong here. I really don't. Paradise is the last place I expected to end up after all I've done. Let me tell you my story."

I am — I was — an armed robber, I guess you'd call it. Me and Jake and the others would live in caves in the Judean hills near the road from Jerusalem to Jericho. We made our living by violence. We wouldn't take on people in the big groups that passed. They traveled together for safety. But a family alone would be an easy mark, as well as anyone fool enough to travel by himself. Brandishing a strong staff would usually do the trick. Threaten them with a beating and they'd give up without much of a fight. But I've been known to break a few bones in my day, God forgive me. I don't think I actually killed anyone, but then I never stayed around long enough to find out.

The first time I meet Jesus is when I am invited to a party in his honor in Jericho at the home of a rich tax collector named Zacchaeus. I am introduced, we shake hands, and Jesus looks me in the eye for

a long moment. He can see right into me, who I am, every crime I have ever committed. Then he smiles this big friendly smile. "You know," he says, "there's forgiveness for you in my Kingdom. How about it?" I drop my eyes, say something noncommittal, and shuffle away. The next day I'm in the crowd, hanging on every word he says. Jesus is talking about his Kingdom, comparing it to a mustard seed, calling it the Kingdom of Heaven. I want so much to go up to him after he has finished and take him up on that forgiveness thing, but I just can't bring myself to do it.

I wish I had. It isn't much later when me and my friend Jake — the guy on the third cross — get caught by a Roman patrol. The others run off, but they catch us, beat us silly, drag us into Jerusalem, and throw us in prison. No mercy for the likes of us.

And so it happens that on the same day that they crucify Jesus, they crucify me and Jake — one of us on his left, the other on his right. This isn't any normal crucifixion. Mobs of people are there just because of Jesus. Self-righteous Pharisees are swaggering and mocking. "If you're some kind of messiah," one sneers, "come on down from that cross. If you're a savior, save yourself — if you can!"

Jake begins cat-calling, too, if you can imagine that. I yell over at him, "You miserable thug, don't you have any fear of God? Can't you see that we're going to die just like he is? Show a little decency! We're getting exactly what we deserve, but he ain't done nothing wrong."

Jake quiets down and the Pharisees lose interest. But I can't get Jericho out of my mind. I can't forget Jesus' eyes, his words, his invitation. And so I call over to him, though it's getting hard to breathe and talking makes it that much harder.

"Jesus!" I say. He turns his head towards me. "Jesus, I was there in Jericho. I met you at a party at Zacchaeus' house. Remember?"

He looks at me for a moment and then nods his head just a little. He does remember.

"I never forgot what you said. I wanted to say yes, but just couldn't. And now look at me — look at us!"
He is in bad shape — exhausted, in excruciating pain, back oozing, breath labored. He isn't going to last long. I can see that. But somehow I can see beyond all that. He was the Messiah, is the Messiah, no matter what those priests and Romans and Pharisees have done to him. And when he dies, he will be with God. In a few hours, maybe less, he will be vindicated. He will reign in that Kingdom he told us about.

"Jesus," I call again, quieter now.

He opens his eyes. They are the same eyes, the same piercing, loving, honest eyes.

"Jesus," I say, "when you come into your Kingdom, would you remember me?"

His words are labored, his lips parched, but I can still hear him pretty well. "Truly, I say to you...." His voice cracks, then is stronger for a moment. "Truly, this very day you will be with me in Paradise."

His eyes droop. He is fading quickly now. But I believe him. I do! That's what gets me through those next few hours until they break my legs to kill me. I do believe him!

And then I find myself here in heaven, in Paradise. I sure don't deserve to be here, but here I am anyway. I guess that's what a man like me gets when the King himself grants a pardon. Full forgiveness. Pretty amazing, don't you think?

Holy Week in Christianity is the week just before Easter. It is also the last week of Lent, in the West, – Palm Sunday, Holy Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday – are all included. However, Easter Day, which begins the season of Eastertide, is

not.

Saturday 8

An important holiday called Passover was only six days away. Many people were coming to Jerusalem so they could offer sacrifices in the temple on that day. Jesus walked to Bethany, a village nesssssar Jerusalem. He would stay there for five nights with His friends Lazarus, Mary, and Martha. Mary anointed His feet with oil.

Sunday 7

Jesus walked from Bethany to Jerusalem. He rode into the city on a donkey, as a verse in the Old Testament said He would. People recognized Him as their King, shouting, "Hosanna," and laying down palm leaves in front of the donkey to keep dust from getting on the Savior. Jesus visited the temple and then returned to Bethany.

Monday 6

Jesus saw people buying and selling things in the temple. Because He wanted the temple to be a "house of prayer," He made them leave. Then He healed people who were lame or blind. The jealous priests were angry with Him.

Tuesday 5

Jesus taught people in the temple and on a nearby hill called the Mount of Olives.

The priests plotted to kill Jesus. One of His disciples, Judas Iscariot, agreed to turn Jesus over to the priests in exchange for 30 silver coins.

Wednesday 4

Friday 2

Saturday 1

"I was knackered at work the next day."

Ron called Dean afterwards to thank him, but Dean said it was just what anyone else would have done.

"They were stuck in a bad situation, I just made it a little better," he said.

70% Of The Materials Used To Make IKEA Products In 2018 Were Either Renewable Or Recycled

The world's largest furniture retail company has revealed that 70% of the materials used to make its products in 2018 were either renewable or recycled.



Their ambition is 100% renewable and recycled materials by 2030.

IKEA's 59-page Sustainability Report FY18 was released last week, reporting progress from across the IKEA value chain and franchise system towards the commitment to become "People & Planet Positive".

The report reveals that 60% of all the raw materials IKEA sourced to produce products during 2018 were from renewable sources such as cotton and bamboo, with a further 10% accounted for by recycled material.

More highlights from the report include:

Increasing renewable energy - 18,240 solar panels installed on IKEA Industry production unit in Portugal enough to power 2,700 homes

The number of home solar customers grew and customers saved money on their energy bills.

100% of the cotton was certified as sustainable for a second year running, while the proportion stood at 85% for wood – up from 77% in 2017.

Developing new innovative products such as the MISTELN – a water saving mist nozzle that can reduce water use by more than 90%

Commitment to phase out single-use plastic products from the IKEA range by 2020

"We always think long term, innovating to ensure that our actions to meet people's needs today do not compromise the ability of future generations to meet their needs," the Inter IKEA Group's head of sustainability Lena Pripp-Kovac wrote in the report.

"This requires us to rethink and inspire changes in lifestyles and consumption and to transform our way of working – from linear to circular, from consuming to regenerating resources."

Billionaire Rewards Grandmother Who Walked 10 Miles To Help Cyclone Victims

A 71-year-old woman walked 10 miles to donate clothing and kitchen supplies to victims of a cyclone in southern Africa — and her incredible act of kindness and compas-



sion has influenced one of Africa's wealthiest people to ensure she lives comfortably for the rest of her life.

Plaxedes Dilon, known as Gogo Magombo, wakes up at 4 a.m. daily and walks long distances selling clothing. She had just returned home from a long day of vending when she heard of the cyclone disaster on the radio.

"I immediately packed the clothes and jackets that I earlier purchased for resell and carried my bag to Star FM the following morning," she told ZimLive.

Telecoms tycoon Strive Masiyiwa, who is Africa's eighth richest person, learned of Magombo's act of generosity on social media and announced that he will be building her a home, saying "she gave more than us all".

"This gogo had no 50c for combi, walked the whole way from Mbare to Highlands just to donate her pots to give to people in chimanimani," Highlands Presbyterian Church wrote on Facebook.

"This is the biblical 'widow's mite'," Masiyiwa wrote on Facebook. "What she did is one of the most remarkable acts of compassion I have ever seen.



When this is over, I'm going to find her, and invite her

to come and see me, if possible. Then I will spend time in prayer with her. Then I will build her a house, anywhere she wants in Zimbabwe. It will have solar power and running water. Then I will give her a monthly allowance of \$1,000 for life."

Highlands Presbyterian Church, which received her donation, and Masiyiwa's companies have been leading relief efforts in Chimanimani and Chipinge, the districts worst hit by the cyclone.

Unused Cafeteria Food Is Being Turned Into Take-Home Meals For Kids

An Indiana elementary school is taking steps to ensure all kids have enough to eat.





Students usually get breakfast and lunch at school, but on the weekends at home, they may be without food.

So, Woodland Elementary teamed up with Cultivate, a nonprofit food rescue, for a pilot program that provides students with repackaged meals every Friday.

Jim Conklin, the founder of Cultivate, explained how schools and businesses usually cook more food than is actually consumed each day.

"Mostly, we rescue food that's been made but never served by catering companies, large food service businesses, like the school system," said Jim Conklin, the founder of Cultivate. "We take well-prepared food, combine it with other food and make individual frozen meals out if it."

"At Elkhart Community Schools, we were wasting a lot of food," admitted Natalie Bickel, who works with student services. "There wasn't anything to do with the food. So they came to the school three times a week and rescued the food."

The program is making a big difference in the lives of the students receiving the meals.

"It's making a big impact," said Melissa Ramey of the Chamber Leadership Academy. "I am proud of that. It was heartbreaking to hear that children go home on the weekends and that they don't have anything to eat."

10 Surprising Discoveries Involving Ancient Pottery

At first glance, pottery shards appear the least glamorous items to come from a dig. But archaeologists love them. There are times when ceramics really don't reveal anything. Then there are the flakes, imprints, designs, and content capable of returning lost knowledge or add interesting new mysteries. They can even expose how somebody died, surprising facts about the potters themselves, migrations, and unexpected ways this art form was used to keep society stable.

10 Oldest Pre-Alphabet Writing

During 2016, the archaeological site of Ad Putea delivered a historical surprise. Located in Northern Bulgaria, the fort used to



be a Roman road station. The idea was to learn more about Ad Putea, but diggers unexpectedly came across an unknown settlement from the Copper Age underneath it. A few spadefuls into this era uncovered a ceramic fragment with markings. The 7,000-year-old shard appears to hold the world's oldest pictographic writing, a picturesque way people recorded things important to them before the advent of the alphabet. The symbols include a swastika. Once part of a clay vessel, the writing on the prehistoric piece is two millennia older than those of ancient Mesopotamia and Egypt. Some Bulgarian experts even go as far as saying that Sumer's famous linear writing and Egyptian hieroglyphs developed from a proto-writing that started in Northwest Bulgaria. The intriguing signs remain undeciphered.

9 Mystery Meal

Another 2016 find saw archaeologists in Denmark pull a unique pot from a refuse pit. What made it one of a kind had nothing to do with



the cauldron's design or unusually preserved state. The content was strange. Usually, charcoaled plant matter remains behind in old cooking vessels. But during the cleaning process, instead, a light yellow crust popped up. It defied identification, and test results on the 3,000-year-old froth provided some clues but no solid answers. The substance appears to be a mix of bovine fat, oil, and sugar—a rare find as far as ancient meal traces go. Researchers can only tag its true identity once the future turns up something similar. However, one thing is certain. The attempt, possibly to make some cheese, met with such failure and a terrible smell that the cook chucked the pot away immediate-

8 The Visigoth Takeover

In Northeastern Bulgaria, Visigoth pottery told a grim story. In the fourth century, Rome extended a helping hand when the Germanic tribes fled from



the Huns. Allowing the refugees to settle near their fort, today known as Kovachevska Kale, was a decision the Romans would come to regret. Visigoths made distinctive ceramics, dark gray creations molded from high-quality clay. The sheer number discovered at the site told of a mass arrival of goths—ousting, in turn, the locals. A granary inside Kovachevska might've sparked its destruction. Food scarcity caused open warfare between the Visigoths and their Roman benefactors. Fire damage show the invaders won and torched the fort at one point. Afterward, the goths squatted between the ruins. Researchers made the conclusion based on 87 percent of Kovachevska pottery excavated since 1990 being gothic.

7 The Israel Jug

During an archaeology class, Israeli schoolchildren found an extraordinary artifact. Pulled from the sands outside Tel Aviv, the jug is exactly what archaeologists ex-



pect from the Middle Bronze Age. An unusual decoration makes it unique and unlike anything found before in Israel. The figure of a person, done in exquisite detail, tops the jar. It's unclear if the two parts were created by the same or different potters, but the upper portion of the vessel was adjusted to form the body of the figure. The limbs and face were then crafted onto this extension. The statue appears to sit and think very deeply about something, almost looking worried. The strange ceramic fusion measures 18 centimeters high and is nearly 4,000 years old. Found among weaponry, several other pottery items, and animal bones, researchers suspect the collection was included in an important individual's funeral offerings.

6 Plain Of Jars

In the 1930s, excavations began at one of Southeast Asia's greatest mysteries. The Plain of Jars in Laos consists of about 100 locations stacked with pots. These are



not your usual sort of pottery. Carved from stone, some

weigh up to 10 tons. An unknown culture felt the need to drag the monster containers 8–10 kilometers from the quarry and arrange them in groups as large as 400. In contrast, single jars adorn other areas. The reason for this remains as missing as their original contents. During a new examination of Site 1, something was found that might finally provide answers. What turned out to be a veritable graveyard revealed 2,500-year-old human remains, some interred inside ceramic pots. Researchers are hoping that tests will reveal the ethnicity of this lost society and clarify if there is any connection with India's own ancient jar fields.

5 The Child Potters

An archaeologist, who is also a trained ceramist, discovered something previously unknown. Dr. Katarina Botwid was studying the neglected area of ancient



pottery production, when she found that during the Bronze Age, children as young as nine could be skilled potters. Botwid came across juvenile fingerprints on ancient vessels, proving just who made them. As a ceramist herself, she estimated that it took about three years to raise these young artisans to expert level. Further assessment of the Bronze Age objects proved how the kids mastered a very difficult craft, something that surprised her. Even the most basic household item of the era sometimes demanded intense skill never before attributed to anyone but adults. She also believes that a much higher amount of pottery survived the firing techniques of the time, a remarkable 95 percent—40 percent more than generally accepted.

4 Egyptian Pot Burials

The human remains found inside the Jar of Plains vessels were jumbled bones. Ancient Egypt potted the entire person. Citizens earmarked for such burials were thought to be the poor



and the very young. The destitution theory developed when it was discovered that the domestically used pots were not specially made for the deceased. The "poor and young" angle doesn't explain why certain sites contain only adults and in high-status tombs. Scholars remain divided about the meaning of it all. Surely, the afterworld-obsessed Egyptians had a reason for placing a corpse in a ceramic jar. Some experts feel that pots symbolized the womb and rebirth, while others cite a lack of archaeological evidence. For hundreds of years, pot burials remained a popular choice. Perhaps the durability of clay had something to do with it. Even today, they yield the best preserved bodies in ancient cemeter-

ies.

3 Infected Blood And Organs

Between 600–450 BC, a village in ancient Germany buried a special individual. At the time, he might not have felt all that special, considering



that he had a bruised appearance and suffered bloody hemorrhaging of the gums, nose, stool, and urine. The rest of the villagers gave his organs and blood a strange send-off. He was interred in pottery vessels, and the gory receptacles were then laid to rest in a burial mound. By the time they were rediscovered, all that remained were dried shards. But ancient proteins still clung to them, and these identified the once-visceral contents and that the person had died from Crimean-Congo hemorrhagic fever. Carried by ticks and still killing people today, it's the first discovery of the disease in the archaeological record. For the region, finding human blood and organs interred in pottery during the Bronze Age was also unique.

2 The Peace Women

First found in Arizona during the 1930s, a ceramic collection became known as the "Salado Problem." Spread across the territories of three



native cultures of the American southwest, none could be identified as the source. The problem wasn't just its origins but the purpose of the Salado pottery. All bore the same religious messages and symbols of fertility and cooperation. Researchers now believe that a new female religion, practiced during the 13th–15th centuries, produced the vessels. This was an extremely violent time, and northern refugees poured into the area. To prevent tensions between locals and newcomers from reaching the genocidal levels of the north, women banded together by participating in the same spiritual practices. The Salado religion was preserved only in ceramic creation. This was not a traditional male field, supporting the belief that it was the women who stabilized this multicultural society for centuries.

1 Hidden Excellence

Greek pottery is known for the "black figure" depictions of daily life and battle scenes. The art form is particularly difficult to recreate. In



an attempt to learn the mysterious artistic techniques, scientists specializing in conservation joined up with Stanford's National Accelerator Laboratory. They zapped a Greek vase with X-ray fluorescence. Soon, it became clear why the work could never be authentically replicated. There had been too many assumptions. What was always thought to be a single coat of painting, the X-rays revealed to be a hidden world of chemical colors and more layers. The zinc additive credited for creating black during the firing process wasn't even present, opening up another mystery—what happened during heating that caused the color? Nobody knows. Adding white was additional effort. The discovery finally gives Greek artisans back a level of excellence the art world never before suspected.

Unique photos, autobiographies, and workplaces also invite an intimate look into what it was like to be enslaved. Slavery artifacts have a weird side, too—like the Bible designed to make workers more obedient and the reverse engineering of an escaped slave's DNA.

10 Mystery Foundations And Box

Virginia's College of William & Mary is centuries old. In 2011, an excavation was



launched south of the college's iconic Christopher Wren Building. Historic documents recorded nothing in that area. However, after shoveling through a shallow amount of dirt, the team unearthed mysterious foundations. The brick layer once supported a building 4.9 meters (16 ft) wide and over 6 meters (20 ft) long. A relatively small size for a building today, this one dated to the colonial era when it was considered large. The structure was likely the living quarters or workplace of the 18th-century enslaved staff. If not lodgings, the building could have been a laundry room or kitchen. Additionally, near the foundations was a box buried for unknown reasons. Made of slate, it measured 15 by 10 centimeters (6 by 4 in) and was empty, save for deteriorated grains that could have been anything.

9 The Last Slave Ship

The Clotilda was the last slave ship of the United

States. Her human cargo was not even legal. By the time the vessel sneaked into Alabama waters, the importation of slaves was banned. Timothy Meaher was a plantation owner who did not care



for humanitarian laws. He made a \$100,000 bet that he could bring a boatload of African slaves into the country without being detected. In 1860, Meaher employed William Foster to sail over to the Kingdom of Dahomey (modern-day Benin) and kidnap 110 people. Meaher and Foster succeeded and burned the Clotilda to destroy the evidence. Historians have looked for the vessel ever since. In 2018, the strongest candidate was tracked down by a journalist. The shipwreck was near Mobile, Alabama, which was already a thumbsup. When the Dahomey captives were freed five years after their capture, they built their own town north of Mobile. Structural clues also placed the vessel's age in the mid-1800s. (Clotilda's construction year was 1855.) Additionally, the 38-meter-long (124 ft) ship showed fire damage, but more research is needed to confirm its identity.

8 A Crucified Slave (Maybe)

In 2007, archaeologists excavated at Gavello, a site outside Venice, Italy. They found a skeleton buried in an unusual way. At the time of his death around 2,000



years ago, Romans buried their dead in tombs and with grave goods. This man was plonked into the ground with neither. When researchers examined his feet, they found one ankle was missing. The other had unhealed fractures, suggesting the injury occurred right before death. The nature of the wounds strongly suggested that a metal spike had been forced into the foot. One possibility was that his heels had been nailed to a cross.[3] Ancient Romans reserved crucifixion mostly for slaves as well as some criminals and those who threatened the status quo (Jesus). Even though the Romans crucified people for centuries, the Gavello grave is only the second time that evidence of the practice turned up in the archaeological record. The skeleton belonged to a man in his thirties. His small body suggested that he was an undernourished slave. The unceremonious burial also matched the disdain shown for those who were execut-

7 Heming's Kitchen

Former US president Thomas Jefferson loved French cooking. At the time, French meals needed a certain stove that was ex-



ceptionally rare in the United States. In 2017, a kitchen

with the right stew stoves was found. Discovered at Monticello (Jefferson's plantation in Virginia), the room was undoubtedly the realm of James Hemings.Born into slavery, Hemings was taken to France with Jefferson when the latter served as the US minister to France (1784–89). The 19-year-old Hemings trained as a French chef and, upon his return, introduced macaroni and cheese, meringues, and creme brulee into American culture. The first thing archaeologists found was the kitchen's original brick floor in a cellar. As the work continued, the ruins extended to a partial fireplace and the four stew stoves, which would have stood waist-high during Heming's time. Sadly, only their foundations were left. Even so, the find marked a rare time when a workplace was linked to an enslaved person whose name was known.

6 The Sierra Leone Smoker

Around 200 years ago, a slave smoked a pipe at Maryland's Belvoir plantation.



The pipe was one of four among other artifacts that remained at the site until archaeologists unearthed them in 2015. The pipe was made of clay, a fortuitous choice for researchers. Clay is porous and can retain bodily fluids such as saliva from a smoker. DNA tests soon identified that the person who enjoyed tobacco in this case was a woman. Experts did a deeper analysis and found that she shared strong genetic links to modern-day Sierra Leone—more specifically, to the Mende people of West Africa. Indeed, old records revealed that a slavery route once existed between Sierra Leone and Annapolis, where the Belvoir plantation was situated.[5]The smoker was either abducted from West Africa or born in America to parents taken from Sierra Leone. The pipe proved that artifacts could identify slave quarters, which often cannot be separated from small housing for white families. The item is also part of an initiative to use artifacts' DNA remnants to return to descendants their ancestral heritage, which was erased the moment their ancestors landed in America.

5 A Young Harriet Tubman

Harriet Tubman escaped slavery and then risked her life to free hundreds through the Underground Railroad.



All of Tubman's photos showed an older lady, stooped and fragile. When researchers recently uncovered an unknown portrait of a young Harriet, they were stunned. Not only did it depict her in earlier years, but her famous grit shone through. The picture was taken in her forties around 1868 or 1869, with Tubman's gaze as the most striking feature. It burned with a tangible mix of strength and suffering. For the first time, schol-

ars could see why people called her "Moses," for leading her people to safety, and "General Tubman," after she helped to free over 700 African-Americans in a Union raid. The image came from an album that once belonged to abolitionist Emily Howland, who was Tubman's friend. All 49 portraits were of men and women, black and white, who fought for the freedom and education of enslaved individuals. The album contained another gem—the only known image of John Willis Menard, the first African-American elected to the US Congress.

4 Unique Slave Narrative

Omar Ibn Said was a wealthy young Muslim in the 19th century. Living in West Africa, he dedicated himself to being an Islamic scholar.

One day, he was plucked

from his routine and transported halfway across the world. Said was sold into slavery in Charleston, South Carolina. His first owner was cruel, and after an escape attempt, Said was imprisoned in North Carolina. Contrary to popular belief, slaves were not uniformly illiterate. Said carved Arabic script on the only surface available—the cell's walls. It was also his autobiography, which ensured his personal story would survive. The Owen family purchased Said, and he lived with them until he died. He experienced a relatively good life, during which he produced the 15 pages that described his abduction and enslavement. Today, the document is invaluable as a rare story sourced directly from the victim. (As it was penned in Arabic, his owners could not edit it.) It remains the only known Arabic slave narrative created in the United States. In 2019, the Library of Congress digitized Said's pages to bring them to a wider audience.

3 George Washington's Teeth

One of the wackiest myths surrounding George Washington is that he wore wooden dentures. However,



Washington never chewed his corn with timber teeth. By the time he was president, he had already lost most of his own teeth and had several sets of dentures—some sporting other people's pearly whites. Evidence seems to suggest that they came from slaves. In 1784, he recorded the purchase of human teeth for his own private use—"By Cash pd Negroes for 9 Teeth on Acct of Dr. Lemoire." The latter was a dentist who treated Washington and also paid premium prices for people to

part with their front teeth. Slaves could also sell their teeth but for much less. While it is impossible to know if the nine snappers became dentures, they were almost certainly pulled from Washington's slaves. It is believed that the two men struck a deal to use Washington's own slaves to drive the price down.

2 Hans Jonatan's Genome

In 1784, Hans Jonatan was born in the Caribbean. His family was enslaved on a sugar plantation in St. Croix, which was a colony



of Denmark. When Hans was old enough, he was shipped to Denmark and ordered to fight for the Danish navy. At one point, he was told to go back to the colony, but the 18-year-old made a bid for freedom.In 1802, he fled to Iceland and became the first person with African heritage to reach the region. In recent years, scientists performed the first study using DNA from descendants and genealogical records to partially recreate the genome of an ancestor whose body was not available. They analyzed 182 of his descendants and reverse engineered their genes until they completed 38 percent of the genome on his mother's side. It showed that she was originally from Cameroon, Nigeria, or Benin. After comparing the genes to world databases, they also revealed when things changed drastically for the family. Hans's mother or her parents were captured in West Africa between 1760 and 1790.

1 Rare Slave Bible

When slaves in the Caribbean opened their first Bible, it was not a regular edition. What British missionaries brought in the 19th century was a ver-



sion so snipped that it shocked modern people. In 2019, one of the last three remaining slave Bibles went on display in Washington, DC. Visitors were so stunned by the abridged book that officials soon made it the centerpiece of the exhibition.Roman Catholics can page through 73 books, the Protestant edition holds 66, and 78 books knit together the Eastern Orthodox translation. The Caribbean version was pruned to 14 books. [10] The missionaries wanted to convert enslaved Africans to Christianity. However, they first had to get permission from the sugar plantation owners who did not want their workers reading about rebellions and uprisings. For this reason, related passages were removed. In this version, the enslaved Israelites never left Egypt. Lines that condemn slave owners are gone. Even though "their" Bible praised obedience to a master, the Caribbean's enslaved people constantly rebelled and finally gained freedom in 1834.

Student walks all night to make his first job, gets car

When this Birmingham, Alabama college student's car broke down the night before his new job, he didn't call in. Instead, he woke up at midnight and walked over 20 miles for four hours to make his first day on time. Thanks to the help of some kind and concerned police officers who drove him the rest of the way—and bought him some early- a.m. breakfast—he made it early. His new boss, under the guise of meeting him for coffee to say thanks, gave the student a new car.

Grocery store clerk helps autistic teen

In Baton Rouge, Louisiana, a supermarket employee noticed an autistic teen watching him stock groceries. The clerk asked if he wanted to help. For the next half-hour, the clerk patiently showed the teen how to stock, getting the teen to open up to a stranger for the first time in years. Once the teen's dad posted the video on Facebook, the community rallied, raising more than \$100,000 through GoFundMe to send the 20-year-old to college, while a local credit union surprised him with a car.

UK teen saves lives through simple, inspirational notes

After struggling with her own post-traumatic stress disorder, 18-year-old Paige Hunter began taping notes to the Wearmouth Bridge in Sunderland, England, with uplifting messages like, "Don't you dare give up on this life. Not tonight. Not tomorrow. Not ever." So far, Hunter says eight people have reached out to her to tell her how the small gesture changed their lives.

Kenyan Teacher Who Gives Away 80% Of His Salary To Help His Students Wins \$1 Million Prize

A science teacher in Kenya who gives away most of his salary to help the poorest students has won a \$1 million prize and the title of world's best teacher.



Peter Tabichi, 36, has won the Varkey Foundation's 2019 Global Teacher Prize.

Tabichi received the award at Dubai's Atlantis Hotel in a ceremony hosted by actor Hugh Jackman.

The Varkey Foundation said Tabichi was chosen for his "dedication, hard work and passionate belief" in his students who all live in poverty.

He gives away 80% of his salary to support his students, who otherwise could not afford uniforms, books or food.

"Even affording breakfast is hard. They're not able to concentrate, because they haven't had enough meals at home," Tachibi said.

"As a teacher working on the front line I have seen the promise of its young people - their curiosity, talent, their intelligence, their belief.

"Africa's young people will no longer be held back by low expectations. Africa will produce scientists, engineers, entrepreneurs whose names will be one day famous in every corner of the world. And girls will be a huge part of this story."

The Global Teacher Prize is intended to raise the status of the teaching profession. The winner is selected by committees comprised of teachers, journalists, officials, entrepreneurs, business leaders and scientists.

The 2019 competition included 10,000 nominations from 179 countries.

The founder of the prize, Sunny Varkey, said he hopes Tabichi's story "will inspire those looking to enter the teaching profession and shine a powerful spotlight on the incredible work teachers do all over Kenya and throughout the world every day".

"The thousands of nominations and applications we received from every corner of the planet is testimony to the achievements of teachers and the enormous impact they have on all of our lives."


When Gaylord finally made it back, she found Madison guarding the rubble of what was once her house, patiently waiting for his mom to return.



Morgan Freeman Converted His 124-Acre Ranch Into A Giant Bee Sanctuary

Morgan Freeman is doing his part to help the environment by converting his 124acre ranch in Mississippi into a giant bee sanctuary.





The 81-year-old actor said he has taken up beekeeping to help revive the declining bee population.

"There is a concerted effort for bringing bees back onto the planet... We do not realize that they are the foundation, I think, of the growth of the planet, the vegetation," he said.

Freeman imported 26 bee hives from Arkansas to his ranch in Mississippi where he has help feeding the bees sugar water and planting bee-friendly trees and plants.

Freeman added that he never wears a bee suit or a bee hat and they haven't stung him yet.


