SBA to Open Business Recovery Center in Muskogee to Help Businesses Impacted by Severe Storms, Straight-line Winds, Tornadoes and Flooding

SACRAMENTO, Calif. – The U.S. Small Business Administration and the Oklahoma Small Business Development Center today announced the opening of an SBA Business Recovery Center in Muskogee on Monday, June 24, to provide a wide range of services to businesses impacted by severe storms, straight-line winds, tornadoes and flooding that occurred May 7 - June 9, 2019.

"Due to the severe property damage and economic losses the severe storms, straight-line winds, tornadoes and flooding inflicted on Oklahoma businesses, we want to provide every available service to help get them back on their feet," said SBA's Director Tanya N. Garfield of the U.S. Small Business Administration's Disaster Field Operations Center-West. "The center will provide a one-stop location for businesses to access a variety of specialized help. SBA customer service representatives will be available to meet individually with each business owner," she added.

No appointment is necessary. All services are provided free of charge. The center will open as indicated below.

"SBA customer service representatives will meet with each business owner to explain how an SBA disaster loan can help finance their recovery. They will answer questions about SBA's disaster loan program, explain the application process and help each business owner complete their electronic loan application," Garfield said.

According to State Director Michele Campbell, Oklahoma Small Business Development Center business advisors are available by appointment to provide business assistance to clients on a wide variety of matters designed to help small business owners re-establish their operations, overcome the effects of the disaster and plan for their future. "Services include assessing business working capital needs, evaluating the business's strength, cash flow projections, and most importantly, a review of options with the business owner to help them evaluate their alternatives and make decisions that are appropriate for their situation," she said.

According to Garfield, businesses of any size and private nonprofit organizations may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory, and other business assets. These loans cover losses that are not fully covered by insurance or other recoveries.

For small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture, and most private, nonprofit organizations of any size, SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loan sto help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. Economic Injury Disaster Loan assistance is available regardless of whether the business suffered any property damage.

For business owners who are unable to visit the business recovery center, they may apply online using SBA's secure website at https://disasterloan.sba.gov/ela.

SBA representatives will meet with business owners and residents at disaster recovery centers located throughout the impacted area as they are established. For a list of locations, or to receive additional disaster assistance information, visit SBA's website at www.sba.gov/disaster. Applicants may also call SBA's Customer Service Center at (800) 659-2955 or email disastercustomerservice@sba.gov for more information. Individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing may call (800) 877-8339. The deadline to apply for property damage is July 31, 2019. The deadline to apply for economic injury is March 2, 2020.

Toddler Diagnosed With Rare Ovarian Cancer Is Now Cancer-Free



In February, Kenni was diagnosed with stage 3 ovarian cancer.

After surgery to remove the tumors and four rounds of chemotherapy, parents Mike and Meagan Xydias received the good news of their daughter's clear bill of health.

"Today, we saw the oncologist and were told that all of Kenni's scans were clear. No evidence of disease in her abdomen (everything that was left over after surgery has been taken care of). X-rays showed no evidence of disease in her chest (so nothing spread)."



"We can't say 'Thank you' enough to everyone for all of the love, support, and prayers that our sweet Kenni and family have received over the last four months," Meagan wrote in a Facebook post.

Now that Kenni is cancer-free, Mike and Meagan are sharing their advice with other parents. They also plan to pay it forward for all the support they received over the past four months.

"People are genuinely good and they want to help," Mike told GMA. "[We want to] pay it forward to everyone who helped us."

Scientists Are Using Music To Help Build The Brains Of Premature Babies

Researchers in Switzerland have discovered that certain music helps strengthen brain development in premature babies.



Babies born very prematurely are at high risk of developing neuropsychological disorders, so researchers at the University of Geneva (UNIGE) and the University Hospitals of Geneva (HUG) proposed a unique solution: music written especially for them.

Results published in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences (PNAS) in the United States, show that the neural networks of premature infants who have listened to this music, and in particular a network involved in many sensory and cognitive functions, are developing much better.

The Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at the HUG welcomes each year 80 children born between 24 and 32 weeks of pregnancy. The vast majority will survive, but half will later develop neurodevelopmental disorders, including learning difficulties, attentional or emotional disorders.

"At birth, these babies' brains are still immature. Brain development must therefore continue in the intensive care unit, in an incubator, under very different conditions than if they were still in their mother's womb," said Petra Hüppi, professor at the UNIGE Faculty of Medicine and Head of the HUG Development and Growth Division, who directed this work.

"Brain immaturity, combined with a disturbing sensory environment, explains why neural networks do not develop normally."

As the hearing system is functional early on, music appeared to be a good option.

"Luckily, we met the composer Andreas Vollenweider, who had already conducted musical projects with fragile populations and who showed great interest in creating music suitable for premature children," said Hüppi.

To choose instruments suitable for premature babies, Andreas Vollenweider played many kinds of instruments to the children, in the presence of a nurse specialized in developmental support care. "The instrument that generated the most reactions was the Indian snake charmers' flute (the punji)," said Lara Lordier. "Very agitated children calmed down almost instantly, their attention was drawn to the music!"

Researchers found that without music, premature babies generally had poorer functional connectivity between brain areas than full-term babies, confirming the negative effect of prematurity.

The first children enrolled in the study are now 6 years old, at which age cognitive problems begin to be detectable. Scientists will now meet again their young patients to conduct a full cognitive and socio-emotional assessment and observe whether the positive outcomes measured in their first weeks of life have been sustained.

Being Homeless For 2 Yrs Of College Was The Best Thing To Ever Happen To Me

I grew up 3 hours outside of Pittsburgh, PA with my mother and 3 younger siblings. My mom was a single mother and worked a minimum wage job, so we never had much, but that was ok, we made ends meet anyhow. Freshman year of HS I got a job at a local bakery and immediately started saving money for college, to help out around the house, and to buy myself a car.

Junior year of high school I bought a 2002 Dodge caravan. Senior year I was accepted into the University of Pittsburgh and received some academic scholarships that covered my tuition. Room and board were not covered so I opted to pay for the meal plan but not the housing because it was way too expensive for me.

Whenever it was time to head out for college I scrapped all of the back row seating in my caravan(the old caravan seats were removable) and I purchased a twin mattress and laid it on the floor of my van, I also saved enough money to have my windows tinted. I purchased a parking pass on campus, chose a spot on the top level of the parking garage and lived out of my van for the next 2 years.

Like I said, this was the best thing to ever happen to me, did living out of a van suck? Of course it did. The weather in Pittsburgh sucks. Super hot and humid in the summer time and freezing cold and snowy in the winter time. That being said, being homeless forced me to take advantage of everything the campus had to offer since I wanted to spend as little time in my van as possible. I ended up spending most of my time throughout the week at the library and consequentially ended up studying and reviewing classroom material a lot more than I would have if I had the luxury of going home and turning on the tv or falling asleep for hours in my room.

I frequented my professors office hours if I had questions about course material after class was over because what else did I have to? Go sit around in my hot or freezing cold car? I ended up getting really close to some of my professors because of this, and it really helped me excel in the classroom.

Our campus had a free gym available to students, complete with locker rooms and showers, so every morning I would wake up at 6 am, head to the gym. Workout

for an hour and a half or so, take a shower at the gym, then go about the rest of my day. I learned a lot about my body during this time and absolutely fell in love with physical fitness. I was able to construct work out routines for myself that I still follow everyday, I also ended up doing a lot of jogging around campus and frequented Schenley Park and really develop an appreciation for the outdoors.

I attended a lot of social events, guest speakers, plays, charities, student life events around campus too and this was really good for me because I ended up meeting a lot of new friends by attending all these things. Prior to college I would have considered myself and introvert, I didn't really speak much unless spoken to, but again not wanting to sit around in my van all day made me venture outside of my comfort zone and do new things and I really developed an outgoing personality because of it.

Other than that my time was spent with my new found friends or working at the campus book store.

Junior year I moved into a house with a group of friends and stayed there senior year too. All of those girls are still my best friends 7 yrs later.

Even after I moved out of the van I continued to spend hours at the library, working out everyday, attending events, etc and I really think that having to deal with the struggles that I had to go through really made me into a better person.

Since then I got a really got job and have been helping my siblings prepare for life after hs and I've even been able to help my mother out a little bit.

It just feels good

A Calf in the House

We had a newborn calf whose mother had stepped on and broken her leg. I wrapped her up in a blanket, put her in the front of the truck in the floorboard and took her to a veterinarian, who casted her leg. I then kept her in our house, and fed her a bottle two to three times a day until she got her strength back. The room where I was keeping her had a tile floor, so she soon needed to be returned outside – not only was I ready to quit cleaning up after her, but she also needed to get traction on the dirt to start moving around and get her mobility back.

Sneaking Extra Feed

Now, she's doing super and is just as big or bigger than the rest of herd. She got pregnant and the girl delivered twins!

The Cow that Saved My Life

This story is not what I did for the animal, but what she did for me. She found my breast cancer. I still truly believe she was an angel send from God to help me. I would not have found the lump this early or easily.

Gemma found my cancer by bumping me in that breast. I remember it very well. It hurt a lot. For days. So I started feeling around. Big bruise on the inside. It got a little smaller but then it stopped getting smaller and just stayed the same. And it was hurting. Cancer doesn't hurt, so they say. My doctor was really thinking it was an infection from the bruise. I had a differ-

ent feeling from day one. Finally, three months and three visits later, I asked him about a sonogram. He agreed. They found fluid in an abscess - not a sign of cancer. Still, I was pushing for a biopsy. When they did that, I knew it. I've seen enough cancer tissue with the cows. It was the same.

If it was not for Gemma, I would have found it even later. I'm SO THANKFUL she bumped me that hard in my breast. God knows how to send you a message. I know I'm not always listening to people; he knew I had to have a cow speak to me. Cows are my life, and now one saved my life.

We lost her when I was going through chemo. It broke my heart when she died. It was in matter of hours. They found her and she did not respond to anything. First, I was so upset and cried. But know I'm at peace with it. It just confirmed to me that she was that special angel and had to go help other people. Angels don't always come in the form we think they do. God sends them in the form you need. It was a Brown Swiss calf for me.

Since then she has had two sisters: Gloria and Gertrude. Both names mean "glory to God." They will go to Stillwater this year and will be shown. I will be crying again when they go in the show ring, but happy tears and so thankful.

Divers Set World Record For Cleaning Trash From Ocean Floor



633 diport vers picked up litter from the sea floor near the Deerfield Beach International Fishing Pier in Florida.

The record was overseen by Guinness officiator Michael Empric, who flew from New York to do the official head count.

Divers had to stay in the water for at least 15 minutes to count towards the record.

It is still not known exactly how much trash was collected, the Sun Sentinel reports. But diver and environmentalist RJ Harper reported that divers collected 1,600 pounds of lead fishing weights alone.

"Obviously, trash was collected, but the beauty of it is with 633 divers, we were able to do a very thorough cleaning," Harper told the news outlet.

The previous record for the most divers taking part in an underwater cleanup was 614, in a dive organized in the Red Sea in Egypt in 2015.

"It doesn't matter what happens today with the Guinness World Records," said Empric. "What really matters is that everyone is out there cleaning up around the pier and trying to improve the community."

My dad and the few others who helped are hero's and his humility makes it 10x more amazing.

Our Best Friends



I started having this strange feeling of loneliness, selfpity, and sadness in my first year in college. I had no idea what it was, but one thing I knew was that it all started when my teacher called me out In front of the whole class for not carrying out the tasks that were assigned to me.

My name is Eric Silver, and this is my story. I was a brilliant student in school, even though I could be non-chalant sometimes, which I felt was commonplace amongst kids my age.

I was given a task by my teacher, which was to make a list of items needed for a particular class experiment. She, as always, saw me as this care-free and unserious person, and so she wanted to start tasking me with responsibilities, even if it wasn't necessary. I never took this to heart until she called me out in front of the whole class. After that experience, I couldn't listen in class; thoughts of that scenario kept playing in my head and my grades dropped drastically. Unfortunately, no one noticed anything, so I felt it was just a part of me. There was this particular incident, where I approached a couple of students and told them (jokingly) about my intentions to burn down the whole school for making students feel slow. After that, my friends started avoiding me, thinking I was acting weird. I was. Immediately after that, my parents advised me to see a doctor. My father felt that maybe I was stressed. My mother, on the other hand, knew. I will get to that in a moment.

I refused help because I thought they were treating me like a sick person. I started imagining weird things. One minute I was overly excited, while the next minute I was all moody. At this point, I had been withdrawn from school; they felt I might be a danger to other students. My family couldn't pinpoint what was particularly wrong with me, and I refused every form of therapy advised. The class incident was always in my head; I was stigmatized. Whenever my parents mentioned treatment, I would retort with "nothing is wrong with me." Until I reached a breaking point and couldn't go on any longer by myself. I needed help.

Now, therapy isn't new to me. Neither is bipolar disorder. My mother has suffered from it for as long as I can remember, and has been in therapy for years. But, this is something I always tried to black out. I never took the time to learn about it. After weeks of finally understanding what bipolar disorder is, I realized I was in

serious need of therapy. Unfortunately, therapy is costly and definitely out of my budget. So, I decided to look for alternatives. That was when I stumbled upon online counseling.

Although I initially was filled with excitement, online counseling was new to me. In fact, it's still considered new even today. That initial excitement died down, but I didn't give up. I learned that this type of service had experienced therapists who help patients suffering from mental health disorders – all via the intertnet. I (hesitantly) applied for a service, and I was assigned to a therapist who started engaging me multiple times a week. I was ultimately diagnosed with "bipolar disorder" as I suspected. "I'll help you manage it." That was what she said to me.

At first, It was boring and annoying, but my parents, specifically my mother, kept telling me to continue with it, which I did. I started noticing significant changes in my behavior. I could sleep better, eat well, talk amongst people, and do other stuff I couldn't do before. After a few weeks, I finally felt like myself again, due to the help of my online therapist.

For those of you out there that have any mental health disorder, this is my recommendation. If you are scared of getting professional help because of the shame or stigma, there are alternative options you can consider like online therapy. If you can't afford therapy like most people, try it out, at least for a few weeks. Recognize that you need help and your issues won't go away on their own, and are likely to worsen if left untreated. There are a range of benefits to counseling. You would be wise to take advantage of that.

History of Inclusion & Improvement in Educating Students with Disabilities

Inclusion Strategies for Mainstreamed Classrooms / By Stephanie Torreno / Special Ed Info Teachers & Parents

A Legal History of Inclusion

Educators continue to debate and determine the best ways to teach students with disabilities. As more children with physical, intellectual, emotional, and other impairments learn alongside typical children, teachers continue to discover how to include these students in their classroom. Challenges, as well as benefits, of inclusion continue to emerge for educators, children with disabilities, and their non-disabled peers. However, nearly everyone agrees that education for students with disabilities has improved greatly. Taking a look at the legal history shows just how much progress has been made in educating students with disabilities in the United States, and how much more is needed.

The Beginning of Special Education

As recent as a hundred years ago, children with disabilities received little, if any, formal education. In the tradition of segregating students during the middle to late 19th century, special schools for those with disabilities continued to be created in the early 1900s. These schools claimed to educate children; however, they primarily served as residential facilities and institutions. Even in 1918, as states began creating a nationwide public school system, children with disabilities were usually excluded.

Between 1850 and 1950, special classes with people trained to care for individuals with disabilities began to develop as teachers noted differences among students. During these years, groups of parents of children with developmental disabilities started schools and programs. Although these developments were sporadic, they began to positively change ideas about teaching these children. Attitudes continued to change in the mid -1920s as educators began to see the value of education and community involvement for individuals with disabilities. Still, children continued being placed in institutions as many parents believed these facilities offered the only educational opportunity available to their child. Special education was typically only offered in large cities.

Improved Educational Opportunities

While the Supreme Court ruled in 1954 that students

could not be separated in schools because of race, the parents' movement worked to change the belief that individuals with disabilities could not be taught. The movement additionally improved conditions in state institutions, created educational and employment opportunities, and proposed legislation. In public schools, however, more than a million students were excluded and another 3.5 million did not receive appropriate services. As many laws specifically exclude children with certain disabilities, only one in five have the right to an education.

IDEA

Beginning with the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and its amendments of 1986 and 1992, employment and educational rights of people with disabilities were guaranteed from institutions receiving federal funding. Then, with the passage of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), all school districts were required to develop and provide a free, appropriate public education for all children. The first major legislation of its kind, IDEA required that education be provided in the least restrictive environment for each child, meaning that students with disabilities should be taught in neighborhood schools in general education classes.

The U.S. Court of Appeals ruling, with Timothy v. Rochester School District, established that all school districts have the responsibility for educating every child, including those with disabilities. The Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 further protected schoolaged children with disabilities outside of education in employment and access to public and private services.

Inclusion: Another Way to Educate

Although still rare in many school districts, real special education inclusion began in the 1990s when children with physical disabilities gained access to neighborhood schools. For children with developmental disabilities in 1993, though, separate classes remain the norm. The reauthorization of IDEA in 1997 guaranteed more than access to education for students with disabilities; it ensured the rights to a quality education and quality outcomes. Another reauthorization of IDEA

occurred in 2004 to align it more closely with the general education No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, while retaining, expanding, and clarifying important elements of the 1997 law.

The onset of inclusion has resulted in over 90% of students with disabilities receiving education in typical schools and almost half were included in the general classroom 80% of the day during the 1999-2000 school year. An increasing number of students with disabilities are graduating from high school, with over half earning a diploma. Full inclusion is still years away, though, as millions with disabilities learn in special education classrooms.




Small Acts Bring Big Rewards Original Written by MissTina, Posted by Jun. 27th, 2019





The case finally went to the emperor himself. After examining the


evidence, Napoleon said, "Through a surrogate, this man has not only fought, but has died in his country's service. No man can die more than once, therefore the law has no claim on him."

There's another river that I love to think about, but I've never been there. It's been described several places by different people, but my favorite description is in Revelation.

"And he showed me a pure river of water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding from the throne of God and of the Lamb. . .. There shall be no night there: They need no lamp nor light of the sun, for the Lord God gives them light." Revelation 22:1, 5 NKJV.
