Susan is the Current AFA Administrator. AFA administrator is scheduled to work only 3 hours a day in the establishment. She is the first administrator that always stay way beyond the working hours. She checks in every one of the houses in the establishment in person to ensure residents are safe, warm and comfortable. If a resident needs help she will take care of it. When she can't fix the problem by herself she finds the right person to satisfy that need.

Steve commutes a long way to and from his work place in Arkansas. He helps Susan in the evenings after work. They get produce, commodities, and food from various places even from other states such as Texas and distribute them among residents of the housing authority and residents of the town whenever they can. Susan makes residents of the AFA to

feel good by visiting them and making sure they know she is there for them. For example, Mrs. Mary White Michele, Ed's wife had surgery and she stayed away from home in a nursing home for recovery. 
Marvin Grocery Store in Miami, OK Helping Hand Story

6-year-old collects 1,000 jars of PB&J so her classmates won't go without a meal

A little girl with a big heart is ensuring none of her classmates will ever go hungry by collecting jars of her favorite food combination, peanut butter and jelly.

Eva Chapman has donated 1,033 pieces of PB&J to nine schools including her own. Strangers as far as Canada have donated jars to the 6-year-old's cause.

"It's just been such a wonderful outpouring of support," mom Nicole Chapman of Florida told "Good Morning America." "For whatever reason, this really just touched people and moved them. I'm very proud of her. She has a huge heart."

Eva Chapman, a student at Volusia County School District, began collecting jars of peanut butter and jelly after hearing a classmate didn't have enough to eat at home.



Eva, a soon-to-be first grader at Spruce Creek Elementary School in Port Orange, launched her project in mid-April. Eva told her mom she wanted to have a food drive after learning a fellow classmate might not have enough to eat at home.

"She got fixated on [another child] she went to school with," Chapman said. "It became apparent to me that [the child] didn't have a great home life. My advice to her was, 'Go ahead and love from afar because they don't have everything you have."

Chapman said her daughter's school offers free and reduced hot lunch to students whose families struggle financially. Eva knows this, but wondered what those kids have to eat when they're at home.

So with the help of her mom, Eva launched a kid-friendly food drive where in true 6-year-old fashion, she aimed to gather a whopping 10 million jars of PB&J.

Eva Chapman, a Florida student entering first grade, has collected over 1,000 jars of peanut butter and jelly, and had 200 jars left over for her school's food pantry.



While she hasn't reached her overly ambitious goal, mom said Eva is thrilled with the outcome.

"We are getting more and more peanut butter and jelly so we could have some for the children that have hot lunch and so they could have peanut butter and jelly for the summer," Eva said in a video interview with Volusia County Schools.

Eva's PB&J campaign has been featured on local news and in turn, inspired spin-off projects in nearby schools.

"Other parents, other students, other schools and even other districts I'm hearing, students are following her lead and wanting to impact other students in a positive way and make sure that no kids go hungry over the summer break," said Spruce Creek's principal Andrea Hall.

Chapman said Eva is very thankful to those who contributed to her cause.

"It's quantifiable to her at this young age when she sees all the jars come and go from our house, from my office," Chapman added. "She can feel that sense of pride and accomplishment and I think more than anything else, she's happy that she was able to help other kids."





It is amazing that every act we take will ultimately affect other people around us, and this proves the significant effects in changing other people's behaviors through imitation (copying a particular behavior we observe). When we give to others, we are taking consideration for other people's desires and needs rather than our own. There are actually many benefits in giving, and this has proven for physical, mental, and emotional relief. As someone with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), the world can seem to be a confusing and cruel place. Having ASD shows the difficulty in properly socializing with other people and making and maintaining relationships. I have been judged and criticized for something beyond my control, and being excluded from social interactions by many children was painful enough to know that I was not wanted. However, one act of kindness from someone without them knowing about my disorder can go a long way and make me better as a person. Throughout my life, I have learned a few concepts on how important giving really is. First, people who give more to others are genuinely happier than those who do not. Giving is not just materialistic. It is the emotional support and motivation to keep on being the person that I am, and being given emotional support shows more lasting effects. Thinking about others has a longer effect in staying joyful with your life, and nothing is as satisfying as giving to people who need it most. When I saw those who did nice things for me and started imitating them, it reinforced me to keep on doing nice things for others, even if they may acknowledge that or not. Also, giving to others makes you "feel-good [and] do-good," and helping everyone around us is truly satisfying. I see that every person wants nice things to be done to them, and this is especially true for me with the encouragement

that I need to keep living my life with autism. Every day, we all go through personal battles and struggles that having the right motivation from people is virtual for our personal growth.

Feeling good in doing good for others also shows that you have concerns for them and puts you in a more peaceful state. I currently volunteer in a local public school assisting a special education teacher with students with autism. Having to help someone learn more about autism through my own experience is one of the best things I have done to help those who are in need of assistance, no matter how great or small. Volunteering there truly has opened new discoveries and inspirations.

As of now, I can never stop giving back to people, even to those who don't do anything for me. The way that I can see how people treat others really speaks louder than any words they express, and this is something that I am willing to hold onto. There is nothing that people can do to take away the fact that still doing good for others without it being reciprocated to us is actually the strongest trait a person can have. We all need to remember that the way we respond and approach those situations can do so much more than what we ought to think. Responding with respect and positivity flourishes our character and strengthens our potentials. Giving your life to help someone else is truly the highest act of kindness anyone can show, and I am speaking that through the experiences I have and the choices I made. We do not have to necessarily give much to lend a hand, but it just needs an open mind and heart. Becoming empathetic helps us think deeper about the world we live in and what people go through in their daily basis. Robert F. Smith, totally blind, a few years ago started on a quest to do acts of kindness. He didn't have a clue where his footsteps would take him. One of his journey's was to walk from Long Beach, California to Las Vegas. He accomplished the task, and while he was walking he raised funds for a child who needed a service dog. (Mission Accomplished) He also passed out over 500 sock puppets to children who were very ill, libraries, and schools. In addition, he passed out flags and did free concerts for our Veterans.


After this quest of travelin 1,466,022 steps in one month, Robert decided to reach out to other blind people to engage them in acts of kindness. He met Jennefer Bautista, who was also totally blind, and she lived in the Philippines. Her dream was to help a local orphanage. Robert & Jennefer started to work on this immediately, however things changed as they found out about a teen (14) who was abandoned at the age of two, suffered severe ear infections, and it left her partially deaf. In addition, Sophia had now been diagnosed with a very severe heart condition, and unless it was fixed she did not have much time to live.

Robert and Jennefer, started working together and Robert even started a Go Fund Me Page as well as he started raising funds on Facebook. Seven days later, they had accomplished some amazing things. They got of Dr. Judah Gozar, and he arranged for a \$40,000.00 surgery to be done for \$2,500.00 . Robert & Jennefer went to work on this and 9 days later a successful surgery was accomplished.

This is only the beginning though, because Jennefer &

THE BENEFITS OF CREATING A CULTURE OF KINDNESS IN THE WORKPLACE

Modern workplaces can be hot-houses of negativity, competitiveness, and stress. These kinds of environments can make employees feel as if they're entering an assault zone on the daily.

This is clearly no way to live and work, but in many industries, it's the norm. That's why professional leaders need to make a concerted effort to foster a culture of kindness in the workplace.

For many business owners, success is a numbers game. The importance of workplace kindness can, therefore, seem irrelevant. What you might not realise, though, is that a culture of kindness has tangible benefits which will lead to happier staff and a better bottom line. If you're keen to learn more about the advantages of founding a workplace culture on the principle of kindness, then just keep on reading.

1. A positive and healthy workforce

After we leave school and university, our employer becomes, for all intents and purposes, our pastoral carer. That means that the physical and mental health of employees should be a prerogative for any company board. After all, the recipe is simple: well-rested, happy, healthy employees do better work. So what does this care look like in practice? Reasonable working hours, exercise options, and meditation classes are a good place to start. Looking after the whole person, body and mind, means that employees are much less likely to take chunks out of their sick leave.

There are also subtler ways that team leaders can look after their employees' wellbeing. In particular, social

interaction is a proven stress-reducer in the workplace. This means that time spent bonding with colleagues can be seriously beneficial for the whole team. As a leader, it's important not to put too many restrictions on the content and duration of your workers' conversations. For many people, coming to work on a Monday and having a good old chin-wag is as good a spur to productivity as a cup of coffee. It's much better for their health, too!

2. Illustrate the "ripple effect" of one gesture or act of kindness

As Aesop once said, "No act of kindness, however small, is ever wasted." Building a workplace of kindness doesn't have to entail a systemic, resource-intensive overhaul. Simple gestures repeated often can be just as transformative. Giving a compliment, inviting your colleague for lunch, or offering congratulations are all little acts of kindness which cumulatively build a strong culture of compassion. Then there are the really exciting professional and personal events: getting married, being promoted, and having a baby. Surprising your employee or colleague with a thoughtful gift such as a gift basket will remind them why they love working where they do.



3. Higher employee engagement

What do you find in workplaces devoid of kindness? Disengaged workers, that's what. We all have friends whose days consist of enduring nine hours before a computer screen before clocking out and fitting in a few hours of real life. But our lives are too short – and we work too much – to view the daily grind as a prison -sentence in this way.

Engaged workers are workers who believe in what they do. They are people who are happy to turn up on Monday, ready to tackle that exciting new project or to offer new ideas to the boss. These workers are achievers who receive tangible praise from their employer when they're doing well and who are treated as unique individuals rather than as cogs in a machine. Ultimately, they're colleagues whose own levels of enthusiasm will dictate the success of the company at large.

About 6 years ago, I was on a plane next to a woman who was relentlessly energetic and fidgety. I was tired and wanted to take a nap. But before I could go into "ignore mode," she tapped me on the shoulder to introduce herself.

"Hi, my name is Helga!"

We got to talking and eventually it came up that I had started an organization in high school called R.A.K.E. (Random Acts of Kindness, Etc.). As I described what we did, Helga got very serious and told me that she thought "there was nothing more important in the world than Kindness." I was curious why she was so passionate and, as the plane took off, she dove into a story about the last time she had flown; it was 3 years past and she was en route to Arizona because she had gotten sudden news her Dad's health was on the decline. Just as the plane was about to depart to Phoenix, her father's physician called to inform her that her dad had rather

suddenly passed away. For the 3 hour plane ride, she sat in stunned silence around strangers.

When she arrived to the airport in Arizona, she walked to the nearest wall, sat down, and cried.

And here is the part I'll never forget about Helga's story. For 2 hours she sat and wept while thousands walked to and fro in the airport. Helga looked at me and said, "Houston, not a single person stopped and asked if I was okay that day. Not one person. It was that day that I realized how much we need each other. It was that day I realized that Kindness Isn't Normal."

Kindness Isn't Normal. That has stuck with me all these years - especially now that I work in schools nationwide speaking about compassion, kindness, empathy, and love. I'm reminded all the time that, for many of us (especially young people - but certainly not exclusively), Kindness is NOT usually our default setting. We spend so much time worrying about our problems, our lives, our comfort, our insecurities, getting to our flight - that we walk by or ignore people in need of Kindness every day. I'm oftentimes so worried about ME that I'm really bad at taking care of YOU.

So, I've made it my mission to do my part in making Kindness Normal. To share stories with students, teachers, and parents about our need for character and compassion. To provide young people with practical ways to exercise Kindness (they don't always know what it looks like!). And, for me? I'm always be on the lookout for Helga's—for the little opportunities that surround me every day to practice making Kindness my default setting.

Monte doesn't get paid for his good deeds.

"I tell myself: I have a responsibility of doing something to help the community out," he said.

It's something he said he's learned from his mom.

For parenting at that high level, Mayor Kimberley Sims honored Trinell at a recent council meeting. She also cited Monte for his roadwork.

"We commend him for his heart and just being able to assist us with that, but that shouldn't have been something that he was concerned with," Sims said.

The mayor admits her town has a pothole problem.

In the meantime, Monte isn't waiting on bureaucracy. He's still out there filling holes in his neighborhood with dirt from his backyard.



If you are in another kind of business, find out where there is a member café close to your business and encourage your employees and clients to support the scheme.

2. Be environmentally friendly

Your business can show kindness to the planet and to the rest of humanity by being environmentally friendly. This can mean investing in new energy-saving technologies, such as infrared sensor activated taps in your company's bathrooms which greatly reduce water waste – or something as simple as encouraging your staff to turn off lighting and equipment which is not in use. Reducing your company's use of plastics and other pollutants and lowering energy consumption are ways in which your business can show kindness.

3. Reduce waste

If you are in the food business, don't let unused food go to the landfill. Donate unsold food items before their expiration date or work together with local soup kitchens or NGO's to make use of excess food products. This may take some careful thought and organising, but the people fed with food which otherwise would have been lost will appreciate your business for this act of kindness.

Businesses also often produce other kinds of waste, such as paper and plastic that is thrown away. Monitor what waste is leaving your business and choose to be kind to the planet by initiating company-wide recycling programs.

"Some people!" snorted a man standing behind me in the long line at the grocery store.

"You would think the manager would pay attention and open another line," said a woman.

I looked to the front of the line to see what the hold up was. I saw a well dressed, young woman, trying to get the machine to accept her credit card. No matter how many times she swiped it, the machine kept rejecting it.

"It's one of them welfare card things. Damn people need to get a job like everyone else," said the man standing behind me.

The young woman turned around to see who had made the comment.

"It was me," he said, pointing to himself.

The young lady's face began to change expression. Almost in tears, she dropped the welfare card onto the counter and quickly walked out of the store. Everyone in the checkout line watched as she began running to her car. Never looking back, she got in and drove away.

After developing cancer in 1977 and having had to use food stamps; I had learned never to judge anyone without knowing the circumstances of their life. This turned out to be the case today.

Several minutes later a young man walked into the store. He went up to the cashier and asked if she had seen the woman. After describing her, the cashier told him that she had run out of the store, got into her car, and drove away.

"Why would she do that?" asked the man.

Everyone in the line looked around at the fellow who had made the statement.

"I made a stupid comment about the welfare card she was using. Something I shouldn't have said. I'm sorry," said the man.

"Well, that's bad—real bad, in fact. Her brother was killed in Afghanistan two years ago. He had three young children and she has taken on that responsibility. She is twenty years old, single, and now has three children to support," he said in a very firm voice.

"I'm really truly sorry. I didn't know," he replied, shaking both his hands about.

"Are these paid for?" he then asked. He pointed to the shopping cart full of groceries.

"It wouldn't take her card," the clerk told him.

"Do you know where she lives?" asked the man who had made the comment.

"Yes, she goes to our church."

"Excuse me," he said as he made his way to the front of the line. He pulled out his wallet, took out his credit card and told the cashier, "Please use my card. PLEASE!"

The clerk took his credit card and began to ring up the young woman's groceries.

"Hold on," said the gentleman. He walked back to his shopping cart and began loading his own groceries onto the belt to be included.

"Come on people. We got three kids to help raise!" he told everyone in line.

Everyone began to place their groceries onto the fast moving belt. A few customers began bagging the food and placing it into separate carts.

"Go back and get two big turkeys," yelled a heavyset woman, as she looked at the man.

"NO," yelled the man.

Everyone stopped dead in their tracks. The entire store became quiet for several seconds.

"Four turkeys," yelled the man.

Everyone began laughing and went back to work.

When all was said and done, the man paid a total of \$1,646.57 for the groceries.

He walked over to the side, pulled out his check book, and began writing a check—using the bags of dog food piled near the front of the store for a writing surface. He turned around and handed the check to the young man.

International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples 9 August



There are an estimated 370 million indigenous people in the world, living across 90 countries. They make up less than 5 per cent of the world's population, but account for 15 per cent of the poorest. They speak an overwhelming majority of the world's estimated 7,000 languages and represent 5,000 different cultures.

Indigenous peoples are inheritors and practitioners of unique cultures and ways of relating to people and the environment. They have retained social, cultural, economic and political characteristics that are distinct from those of the dominant societies in which they live. Despite their cultural differences, indigenous peoples from around the world share common problems related to the protection of their rights as distinct peoples.

Indigenous peoples have sought recognition of their identities, their way of life and their right to traditional lands, territories and natural resources for years, yet throughout history their rights have always been violated. Indigenous peoples today, are arguably among the most disadvantaged and vulnerable groups of people in the world. The international community now recognizes that special measures are required to protect their rights and maintain their distinct cultures and way of life.

In order to raise awareness of the needs of these population groups, every 9 August commemorates the International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples, chosen in recognition of the first meeting of the UN Working Group on Indigenous Populations held in Geneva in 1982.

2019 Theme: Indigenous Languages

This year's observance is dedicated to Indigenous Peoples' Languages (for information about Indigenous Peoples' Languages visit https://www.un.org/development/desa/dspd/2019/01/2019-international-year-of-indigenous-languages/) in view of 2019 being marked as the International Year of Indigenous Languages (For information about the International Year of Indigenous Languages visit https://en.iyil2019.org/).

The large majority of the languages in danger are spoken by indigenous peoples. It is estimated that, every 2 weeks, an indigenous language disappears, placing at risk the respective indigenous cultures and knowledge systems. That is why, on this International Day, the goal is to draw attention to the critical loss of indigenous languages and the urgent need to preserve, revitalize and promote them at both national and international levels.

The UN Headquarters observance celebration will take place on August 9th from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and will be webcast live.

International Year of Indigenous Languages

Languages play a crucially important role in the daily lives of all peoples, are pivotal in the areas of human rights protection, peace building and sustainable development, through ensuring cultural diversity and intercultural dialogue. However, despite their immense value, languages around the world continue to disappear at an alarming rate due to a variety of factors. Many of them are indigenous languages.

Indigenous languages in particular are a significant factor in a wide range of other indigenous issues, notably education, scientific and technological development, biosphere and the environment, freedom of expression, employment and social inclusion.

In response to these threats, the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) adopted a Resolution (A/RES/71/178, you can read the resolution at https://undocs.org/en/A/RES/71/178)on 'Rights of Indigenous Peoples', proclaiming 2019 as the International Year of Indigenous Languages.

Why Do We Mark International Days?

International days are occasions to educate the public on issues of concern, to mobilize political will and resources to address global problems, and to celebrate and reinforce achievements of humanity. The existence of international days predates the establishment of the United Nations, but the UN has embraced them as a powerful advocacy tool. For more information you can visit this website:

Since each of these 3 options is equally likely, and 2 of them have one girl, there is a 2/3 chance of there being a girl in the house on the left. For the house on the right, because we already know the older child is a boy, there are only two possibilities: Younger Older Girl Boy Boy And as we can see, there is a 1/2chance for the house on the right having a girl.





customers could dial local calls, but long distance calls had to be dialed by the operator. By 1974, customers could dial 1+ calls by themselves, but certain calls, such as collect calls, still had to be handled by the operator.

In 1984 I transferred to a job in the dial office, as an electronics technician working on electro-mechanical equipment that had been installed in 1958. In 1995, the phone company started upgrading the whole state to digital phone systems, replacing the electro-mechanical offices with computerized or digital offices. After my home office was upgraded, I was placed on a traveling crew, going all over the state, until the last offices in Weleetka and Wetumka, Oklahoma, were replaced.

When I retired in 2003 after 32 years of service, I became an active member of the Telephone Pioneers, now serving as secretary and attending most monthly meetings. We are a service organization, serving the communities together as a club, and
