The Great Fire of London

The people of London who had managed to survive the Great Plague in 1665 must have thought that the year 1666 could only be better, and couldn't possibly be worse!

Poor souls... they could not have imagined the new disaster that was to befall them in 1666.

A fire started on September 2nd in the King's bakery in Pudding Lane near London Bridge. Fires were quite a common occurrence in those days and were soon quelled. Indeed, when the Lord Mayor of London, Sir Thomas Bloodworth was woken up to be told about the fire, he replied "Pish! A woman might piss it out!". However that summer had been very hot and there had been no rain for weeks, so consequently the wooden houses and buildings were tinder dry.



The fire soon took hold: 300 houses quickly collapsed and the strong east wind spread the flames further, jumping from house to house. The fire swept

through the warren of streets lined with houses, the upper stories of which almost touched across the narrow winding lanes. Efforts to bring the fire under control by using buckets quickly failed. Panic began to spread through the city.

As the fire raged on, people tried to leave the city and poured down to the River Thames in an attempt to escape by boat.

Absolute chaos reigned, as often happens today, as thousands of 'sightseers' from the villages came to view the disaster. Samuel Pepys and John Evelyn, the diarists, both gave dramatic, first-hand accounts of the next few



days. Samuel Pepys, who was a clerk of the Privy Seal, hurried off to inform King Charles II. The King immediately ordered that all the houses in the path of the fire should be pulled down to create a 'fire-break'. This was done with hooked poles, but to no avail as the fire outstripped them!

By the 4th September half of London was in flames. The King himself joined the fire fighters, passing buckets of water to them in an attempt to quell the flames, but the fire raged on.

As a last resort gunpowder was used

to blow up houses that lay in the path of the fire, and so create an even bigger fire-break, but the sound of the explosions started rumours that a French invasion was taking place.... even more panic!!

As refugees poured out of the city, St. Paul's Cathedral was caught in the flames. The acres of lead on the roof melted and poured down on to the street like a river, and the great cathedral collapsed. Luckily the Tower of London escaped the inferno, and eventually the fire was brought under control, and by the 6th September had been extinguished altogether.

Only one fifth of London was left standing! Virtually all the civic buildings had been destroyed as well as 13,000 private dwellings, but amazingly only six people had died.

Hundreds of thousands of people were left homeless. Eighty-nine parish churches, the Guildhall, numerous other



public buildings, jails, markets and fifty-seven halls were now just burnt-out shells. The loss of property was estimated at £5 to £7 million. King Charles gave the fire fighters a generous purse of 100 guineas to share between them. Not for the last time would a nation honour its brave fire fighters.

In the immediate aftermath of the fire, a poor demented French watchmaker called (Lucky) Hubert, confessed to starting the fire deliberately: justice was swift and he was rapidly hanged. It was sometime later however that it was realised that he couldn't have started it, as he was not in England at the time!

Although the Great Fire was a catastrophe, it did cleanse the city. The overcrowded and disease ridden streets were destroyed and a new London emerged. A monument was erected in Pudding Lane on the spot where the fire began and can be seen today, where it is a reminder of those terrible days in September 1666.

Sir Christopher Wren was given the task of re-building London, and his masterpiece St. Paul's Cathedral was started in 1675 and completed in 1711. In memory of Sir Christopher there is an inscription in the Cathedral, which reads, "Si Monumentum Requiris Circumspice".

— "If you seek his monument, look round".

Wren also rebuilt 52 of the City churches, and his work turned the City of London into the city we recognize today.

Their plan worked: the Burmese arrived and figured the statue wasn't worth looting. They also killed off all of the monks, who took the secret of the statue's true identity to their graves...



CULTIVATING KINDNESS IN AN UNKIND WORLD



This fall, gun violence created waves of panic and help-lessness in my school district, Charlotte-Mecklenburg, when a freshman at Butler High School shot and killed a classmate in the hallway over a personal conflict. With more than 80 incidents of gunfire on American school grounds already this year, it had seemed like only a matter of time. How did we get to the point where such tragic events are now accepted as inevitable? How can we shift the interpersonal dynamics in our schools and in our society to make incidents like this less common?


Psychologists have been administering a test called the Narcissistic Personality Inventory for more than 30 years. Over that period, they've seen a consistent rise in levels of narcissism and a corresponding drop in feelings of empathy. Individuals with higher narcissism scores are more likely to lash out in anger, while those with lower empathy scores are less likely to help others in need.

Look what has happened to school shooting numbers dur-

ing those decades:


Incidence of US school shootings, 1960-2018

I'd already been thinking a lot about the decline in positive interactions in our society and how we might more effectively teach character in our schools. But this local act of gun violence added a new sense of urgency to my goal of building community and cultivating kindness between students. Twenty plus years of experience teaching prescribed character education lessons have shown me that an adult simply talking about character or modelling positive behavior does not often lead to the changes we want to see in our children. There had to be a more impactful approach.

A few years ago, researchers at the University of Wisconsin set out to answer the question 'Can compassion be learned?' They wanted to see whether practicing the



mindset of caring would lead to more caring behavior, and the results of their study were very promising. After practicing compassion towards friends, strangers, and even people they'd had conflict with, participants showed increased activity in the region of the brain associated with empathy and understanding. Just like learning to write the letters of the alphabet or using the quadratic formula, it was regular opportunities to practice the skill that made it more likely they would successfully use the skill on their own.

With that in mind, I created an assignment to give my 7th grade Language Arts students the opportunity to practice compassion towards each other. I called it Undercover Agents of Kindness.

Undercover Agents of Kindness

Agent's name:

Your mission is to perform an unexpected act of kindness for the classmate whose name you have drawn, then complete a report of your mission results. Be sure your act of kindness is big enough for your classmate to notice and doesn't cost any \$\$. Also, remember to keep your mission a *secret* until you're ready to do the act!

To increase interaction between students who did not normally talk to each other, I had students draw a random classmate's name from a bowl. After they drew names, I was shocked to hear some of them had no idea who the other person was—even after being in class together for two months and in many cases attending the same school for years. Students had two weeks to perform an unexpected act of kindness for the other person and complete a written 'mission report' detailing what they did and how it went.

Soon I began to see encouraging sticky notes on lockers in the hallway. Batches of homemade cupcakes and bags of leftover Halloween candy made their way onto desks in my classroom, as did origami, inspirational quotes, and hand-drawn portraits. I heard compliments exchanged about all kinds of things. Students I'd never seen together started offering to carry each other's books and musical instruments to the next class. As the mission reports started trickling in, I read accounts of children studying together, inviting others to sit together at lunch, helping others put football equipment on at practice.

However, it was my students' reflections on the kindness activity that revealed its impact most. Again and again they acknowledged that it was difficult and felt awkward to approach someone they didn't know well and do something for them. But almost every time they added that they were proud of themselves for doing it anyway and felt the power in brightening someone else's day.

After the mission, I felt proud of myself because I am usually a shy person. Also normally I don't really do these things. But knowing that something that I did could have brighten someone's day, also makes me happy.

As part of our reflection on the assignment, I solicited student advice on what I could do to improve 'Agents of Kindness.' My students offered many helpful suggestions, including drawing names from the whole grade level instead of just individual classes, offering example acts of kindness for those who get stuck, and allowing a little more time so they don't feel rushed. The majority of them said they'd like to repeat the activity, although some admitted that it shouldn't require a school assignment for them to be kind to each other.

I plan to make Undercover Agents of Kindness a monthly occurrence, and I would love to see other teachers borrow the idea, improve it, and share their results with the educator community as well.

Sometimes our world seems dark and scary and we feel



powerless to change it. Together my students and I are learning that there are steps we can take to make things better. We can find ways to break down barriers, build stronger communities, and normalize compassionate behavior. We can be intentional about creating opportunities to practice kindness and make it more likely people will treat each other with compassion on their own. We can be the change we want to see in the world.

Caring For Cancer Patients



In a world where insults and criticism seem only a tweet away, compassion is more important than ever, and there is research to prove it works.

In 2014, Stanford University Center for Altruism Research and Education and a large health organization found that compassionate care helps patients recover more quickly and reduces their pain. Dr. James Doty,

the author of the study, suggested it can also make common colds less severe, lead to better patient outcomes and shorten hospital stays.

Voluntary Acts of Compassion

Shortly before she died of Ewing's Sarcoma, a 27-year-old Australian woman wrote a letter thanking her family for their generosity and asking people around the world to be grateful, help each other more and complain less. Posted on Facebook, the touching request had more than 50,000 shares and 65,000 reactions within four days after her death. The letter talks about the things that mean the most at the end and suggests giving blood instead of spending money on possessions, adding that one blood donation can save up to three lives.

Blood donors are important, but there are other ways volunteers can help. The American Cancer Society, for instance, has 10,000 Road to Recovery drivers who make sure patients get to their medical appointments and treatments, but they need even more drivers to meet their needs. The list, of course, goes on. Little acts, like running errands, providing meals or just listening, can mean just as much as the big ones. Patients or their caregivers can also help others by sharing their stories, something that helps the storyteller and the listener.

Compassion and Medical Care

In a study published by the Journal of Oncology Practice, doctors discussed the role of being kind and identified six habits that improve outcomes for patients and their families:

☐ Deep listening, or taking the time to understand their
needs and concerns
☐ Empathy for what they are experiencing
☐ Acts of generosity that go beyond expectations
☐ Timely care, or avoiding unnecessary waiting
☐ Gentle honesty, or sharing the truth in a compassion-
ate way
☐ Support for family and caregivers

The article also explains that acts of compassion help to prevent burnout and reduce the emotional upheaval that accompanies illness.

Ways to Get Involved

Sometimes, people want to help, but they don't know what to do. No act of compassion is ever too small, but factors like age and the kind of illness often determine what is most appropriate. Patients may not want to ask for help or even know what they need. Luckily, organizations like the Kindness Initiative and Cancercare.org



can offer support and advice.

The internet is also a good place to brush up on information about different kinds of malignancies. While people often know about common ones like breast tumors, they may be less familiar with rare conditions like mesothelioma. Caused by exposure to asbestos, mesothelioma often occurs in military veterans, construction workers or others in toxic environments. It affects the lining of the lungs, abdomen or heart, makes it difficult to breathe, and is hard to treat.

Children suffer from asbestos exposure at much lower rates than adults, but they are more likely to have diseases like childhood leukemia. Websites like this one for children, with a homepage titled "We Prescribe Joy," shares programs, resources and suggestions for making the lives of sick children better. The American Childhood Cancer Association also offers a chance for people to get involved in their organization, but there is no substitute for simply offering a kind word or helping hand when a child is sick.

Gift Suggestions for Patients

Visits and kind words are always welcome, but sometimes people want to give a tangible expression of their concern. The Cancer Treatment Centers of America offers these suggestions:

- A "security" blanket
- A pillow to support a chemo port
- Comfortable lounging clothes
- A silk eye mask for sleeping
- A stuffed animal for children
- A small thermos for drinks
- A gift card for take-out, online shopping or other services
- A small laptop, tablet or Kindle with downloads for books, music and meditations
- Headphones
- Books, including journals, coloring or stories of inspiration

- Beanie or scarf after chemo
- Warm socks, or compression socks to prevent swelling
- A tote bag with a chemo care kit
- A gift certificate for a service like cleaning the house or ride to appointments

Offering assistance is a good idea, but people may be hesitant to ask for it. Making a master list with all the names, phone numbers and offers lets the patient know what people feel comfortable doing and how to reach them when help is needed.

The Dalai Lama said it this way: "This is my simple religion. There is no need for temples; no need for complicated philosophy. Our own brain, our own heart is our temple; the philosophy is kindness."

Stan Tucker is making big changes in children's literacy. What originally began as a personal project of Stan's has grown into a much larger organization. Based out of Atlanta, Georgia, Stan's Leap for Literacy project has now helped countless students embrace their passion for reading and writing.

Stan's Inspiration

Stan's passion for literacy began when he worked as a second grade teacher in a Title 1 school. Having worked with lower income and at-risk students, he was able to see the gaps in education that these students faced. Some of the children he taught had little to no personal reading materials at home. Leap for Literacy

Members of the foundation team also visit classrooms and read aloud to the students. Aside from promoting children to read and write, one of the goals of Leap for Literacy is to promote children to be kind to one another. Stan believes it's pivotal to teach the importance of kindness to children so that it will stick with them into adulthood. He says, "In my opinion lessons on kindness are just as important as academic ones".



In orreceive a book in the Leap for Literacy program, each
child needs to read for 20 minutes a night and log the
reading into a journal. They also need to perform one
act of kindness a day for an entire month. Some examples of kindness acts that the children are asked to perform are writing letters to a friend, complimenting a
friend, helping neighbors with yard work, etc.



Superintendent donates his \$10,000 bonus to help high school seniors applying for college

A superintendent at a public school system in Georgia announced that he would donate his entire \$10,000 bonus to help high school seniors with their college application fees.

Grant Rivera, 44, of Marietta, told "Good Morning America" that he received the bonus after



Rivera said he announced earlier this week to his student community that his bonus "would be given to students who decided to apply to college early admission and early action." There are approximately 500 seniors in his district.

"We know that students have an increased chance of getting accepted and increased chance of financial aid," when they apply early, Grant said. "I didn't want senioritis to prompt a kid to miss out on any opportunities."

"What I said to the kids was as an incentive to start this process early," he added. "That I would cover the cost of their application fees for early action, early decision."

Rivera said he wrote a \$10,000 check to the Marietta Schools Foundation, and their district's college adviser has a credit card to pay for college applications that directly comes out of that fund.

He said he decided to donate his bonus in part because he wanted to make a "value statement" to school staff, "and I don't feel like I exclusively deserve the bonus when that comes from a collective effort of 14,000 employees."

He said he also wanted to let his students know that, "I believe in you and I'm proud of the work you did to get to this place."

Rivera, a former special education teacher and high school principal, has been superintendent for approximately 2 1/2 years.

If there are any funds remaining after the early action college application process is through, he said he is committed to using any remaining money to get buses and do college tours in Georgia.

Conversely, if student interest in applying early exceeds the \$10,000, he said he has committed to covering the fees out of pocket. "I'm not going to tell a single child 'no,'" if they decide to apply early, he told "GMA."

"I've had several students reach out to me and say,
'Thank you,' and one of which said I'm working on my
UNC-Chapel Hill application right now," Rivera said.
"I've been very humbled by the degree of appreciation
I have received from students, families and staff."


"As a district we place a really high priority on career access and college access this was just in line with our larger community vision," Rivera added.

Ayesha Khurram is a second-year accounting student at the University of Waterloo in Ontario. Due to the province's recent cuts to student assistant programs, Khurram had been struggling to scrape together the money for her upcoming semester.

In addition to her mother suffering from chronic kidney disease, both of her parents work low-income jobs as Pakistani immigrants—so Khurram knew that she had to raise the money on her own.

At the suggestion of a friend, she created a Paypal account for people to contribute to her college fund. Hours after making the account, she received a donation for \$6,386.47 with a note reading: "Ayesha, get your learn on girl! I love you!"

The donation, which covered the entirety of her tuition, was made by none other than Taylor Swift.

This is not the first interaction that Khurram has had with the superstar. Since Khurram first fell in love with Swift's music as she was living in Pakistan back in 2009, the two have shared multiple social media interactions (only recently, Swift liked several social media photos that Khurram had posted of the musician's chai cookie recipe). After Khurram moved to Ontario, she was able to see Swift in concert in 2018—and the superstar even invited Khurram backstage for a meet-ingreet.

But Khurram never thought in a million years that her musical hero would donate thousands of dollars towards her education.

"My parents actually cried when I told them the Taylor news because they couldn't believe it," Khurram told The Star. "It's like a guardian angel is watching or something."

COUNT THE COST
