And mamma in her kerchief, and I in my cap,


Had just settled our brains for a long winter's nap,



Letters From Santa





As a child, like most any child, I always wanted a kitten. My mom would never hint at getting me one, but if I queried, "Mom, can I have a kitten yet?" it would be followed up with typical Mom Speak: "Are you ready to handle the responsibility?" Of course, the answer was, always, that I could.

Though the shock hit me like a ton of bricks as an 8-year-old, I had Kevin (his name, after Kevin McCallister from the Home Alone films) for 17 years, as he died after a good, hearty life on Aug. 30, 2009 — a date I can't forget. I was, of course, sad at the time, but so happy I had him. My baby Kevin was the best Christmas present I've ever received. He brought me pure joy. Every Christmas, I remember him fondly with a big smile on my face.

Time With Mum

I am one of seven children, and have never had much alone time with my mum. Every Christmas, we would go down to my gran's house around the corner for the huge family Christmas party on Christmas Eve. Mum was also one of seven, so I'd see my huge number of cousins and aunts and uncles and get presents and sing songs. It was such a warm, loving atmosphere, but one Christmas when I was little, I got quite sick with a fever. As a result, I couldn't go to the party and I was miserable. Mum stayed behind to look after me that Christmas. I remember laying on the couch under the Christmas tree, Mum playing carols quietly on the record player. It was just her and me, and she made me my own special dinner because I was ill and let me open one of

my Christmas presents early. It was my first Ken doll (before that I used an 11-inch C3P0 toy to date my Barbie dolls). I had such a nice time with her.

A Christmas Computer Game

Before there were websites that allowed you to track Santa's progress, my dad, a computer programmer, made up a program on our home computer that allowed us to follow Santa across the globe on Christmas Eve. He even made it so that phrases would pop with my name or my brother's. It's probably been more than 10 years since we've done that, but I still remember it being one of the things I looked forward to most.

The Orange

When I was 6 years old or so I received an orange from my great-grandmother. I didn't understand why someone had given me fruit for Christmas, until I learned many years later that this was my great-grandma's favorite gift when she was a kid in the 1910s... It was her tradition and her way to remind us that small things could make us happy.

Teachers Are the Best People

One year, my family was going through a really hard time. My school was aware of this, and during our middle school Christmas party, two of my teachers brought us clothes, food, and stockings. Our tree and counters were full. My mom was crying when we got home because she wasn't expecting us to have Christmas at all.

Catching Santa Claus

One Christmas morning my parents woke my siblings and I up and told us they had secretly videotaped Santa last night and we just HAD to see it. At this point we had started to question if Santa was real or not, but when we saw that video of Santa putting gifts under the tree and eating the cookies we left, any doubt we had was gone! Years later we found out that my parents had found a Santa suit at the store and stayed up all night recording the video. We still talk about that video every year at Christmas and it is definitely something I plan on doing with my kids!

Two Lives, Twice The Fortune



The evening of December 24, 2009, promised to be extra special for Mike and Tracy Hermanstorfer. Not only was it Christmas Eve, but, more importantly, they were about to have a baby. During labor, however, Tracy's heart suddenly stopped beating, followed by her breathing. The doctors were forced to react quickly: they had little time to save the baby.

They immediately performed an emergency C-section, but the Hermanstorfer baby, Coltyn, exhibited all the

wrong signs: he was limp, and his pulse and heartbeat were extremely weak, to the point that the whole room, including Mike, had little hope.

As the child remained unresponsive in his father's arms, another team attempted to resuscitate Tracy, who lay motionless on the hospital bed. But suddenly, as unexplainably as it had stopped minutes earlier, her heart started beating again. And as her life rekindled, so too did Coltyn's strength. His skin, once pale, flushed with color, and he started crying—showing everyone he was fine. Two lives, having almost gone through to the other side, amazingly came back.

To this day, no one can explain exactly what happened. Tracy was healthy and had no family history of heart disease. Her recovery, and that of Coltyn's, was as mysterious as her ailment. Whatever the answer ultimately is, that intense Christmas night will surely remind the Hermanstorfers that life is fragile but also wonderful and full of surprises.

She stressed that the present came from one little girl who "wanted to get m[e] something so badly, but had nothing to give."

"So rather than give me nothing, this student opened up

her free [school] breakfast cereal this morning, took the packaging of her spork, straw, and napkin, and finally took the time to take every marshmallow out of her cereal to put in a bag—for me," Uretsky-Pratt continued. It was a big sacrifice for her student because, as the teacher told USA Today, "No one likes Lucky Charms without the marshmallows."

She concluded: "Be grateful for what you have, and what others give you. It all truly comes from the deepest parts of their hearts."



Adriana Pollock of Newark, Ohio, is handwriting 500 cards for those in local nursing homes and foster care in an effort to spread "Christmas joy."

"I thought that nursing homes and foster homes weren't having as good of Christmases as me and my sister so I thought that we should give them Christmas cards," Pollock remarked to the Newark Advocate. The third grader added, "Some people that don't have as good of Christmases don't have as much Christmas joy."

Last year she sent 400 cards, but this year she had more time – beginning in October and working on them after school, on the weekends, and even on days off at her grandma's house. She has some help too, from little sister Aria and from her community, which helped purchase some of the cards.

Inside, she writes messages like the following, "You might not know us but we love you."

For others who wish to do the same, local media are publicizing the addresses of a 12-year-old girl battling cancer and an 8-year-old boy suffering a terminal brain tumor after both wished that, for Christmas, Americans would send them cards.

Young Boy Unwraps Military Dad in Early Christmas Present

On Dec. 14, Jadin Hart from Pittsburgh tweeted a video of her nephew opening his most wished for Christmas gift – a box with his dad inside.

"My nephew got to unwrap the only Christmas gift he asked for a few days early and his reaction broke my heart," Hart typed.

After her nephew tentatively unwrapped the large box, his dad popped out. Instead of jumping back in surprise, he clung to his dad without letting go.

The video went viral, with more than 902,000 likes and shares from big names like talk show host Ellen De-Generes, actor John Krasinski, and comedian James Corden.

"When my dad came back from serving in the gulf war I held him so tight as he walked off the coach at the

base.I couldn't let go," Corden commented. "This brought it all back.Thoughts are with every family missing loved ones this Christmas."

Kids with Down Syndrome Sign Michael Bublé Christmas Song

For Christmas 2018, Wouldn't Change a Thing, an organization dedicated to "creating a world where negative perceptions of Down's Syndrome are a thing of the past," organized a video of families singing (with sign language) Michael Bublé's rendition of "All I Want for Christmas Is You."

25 families of children with Down syndrome participated in the project, and later appeared as guests on British ITV show This Morning, the Mirror reported Dec. 13. During the show, they expected to watch the finished video for the first time – but not to also see a special message from the Canadian singer.

"When I heard that Wouldn't Change A Thing had chosen one of my songs to sign to, I was really moved by it," Bublé stressed at the beginning of their video. "It's absolutely beautiful."

In the film, those with Down syndrome – and their parents – sign along to the classic Christmas song while smiling next to their Christmas trees. As the song continues, the cameras revealed the families on the set of This Morning.

Bublé waved at the end, "Merry Christmas, everybody."

Rudolph: the marketing story behind the most famous reindeer



Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer is one of our favourite Christmas Songs, but did you know Rudolph was created for a marketing campaign in 1939, 10 years before the song, and his red nose was originally rejected?

Here's the story behind "the most famous reindeer of all".

Every year, a chain of US department stores called Montgomery Ward would buy thousands of colouring books to give away at Christmas. It was a successful marketing tactic that brought thousands of customers into their stores, especially the toy department, but it was also expensive. They wanted to cut costs so, in 1939, asked their in-house advertising copywriter, Robert L May, to come up with a Christmas giveaway. The brief was fairly simple: It had to appeal to children & adults, and be about an animal.

For inspiration, Robert L May drew on his own 4 year old daughter. She liked the deer at the zoo, and reindeer pull Santa's sleigh, so that was a start; Robert had been shy as a child, and other children would exclude him from their games so he liked the idea of an unpopular reindeer who wins in the end; After toying with the names Rollo & Reginald, he settled on the name Rudolph. Piece by piece the idea was taking shape.

Then, one foggy day, he was looking out of his office window and could see nothing except for some lights in the distance. Those lights were the inspiration for Rudolph's iconic red nose that would guide Santa's sleigh. Brilliant! But there was a problem. In the 1930's, a red nose was associated with chronic alcoholism and drunkenness, and Rudolph's defining feature was rejected by his bosses until they were eventually won over by illustrator Denver Gillen's cute character designs for Red Nosed Reindeer.

Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer proved so popular that Montgomery Ward stores distributed 2.4 million

copies in its first Christmas season. Then came the second world war, and restrictions on paper. The first reprint was in 1946, when another 3.6 million copies were snapped-up by Montgomery Ward shoppers.

The copyright for the poem was owned by Montgomery Ward but, in 1947, the president of the company, Sewell Avery, handed over the copyright to May for free. This quickly led to a successful spoken-word recording, and a best selling book.

It wasn't until 1948 that Robert L May's poem was adapted into the song that most of us know today. It was Robert's brother-in-law, Johnny Marks who adapted it and added the introduction:

"You know Dasher and Dancer and Prancer and Vixen, Comet and Cupid and Donner and Blitzen, but do you recall the most famous reindeer of all?"

This was a reference to Clement Clarke Moore's poem, A Visit from St. Nicholas, which was much better known at the time than Rudolph, and was a bit of brand association.

The song version of Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer was first released as a single by Gene Autry in 1949 and reached No. 1 in the US Charts, eventually selling a total of 12.5 million copies. Marks went on to write a sequel, Run Rudolph Run, that was popularized by Chuck Berry and he also penned the Christmas classic Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree, originally recorded by Brenda Lee.

So, 2019 marks Rudolph's 80th Birthday.

There's a lot more to the story of the low-paid advertising copywriter, Robert L May, including the effect of the Great Depression on his life, the sad death of his wife Evelyn, his fondness for limericks and children's stories (and much more) that's all well worth a Google, but I'll leave you with this:

Some people claim there's another reindeer mentioned in the song who was mean to poor Rudolph. Her name was Olive. Olive, the other reindeer, used to laugh and call him names.

Santa's Veterinarian Answers Kids' Questions about Santa's Reindeer

Q: Can reindeer really fly?

A: Most reindeer can't fly, but Santa's reindeer are special. Because they're magic, they can fly very high and very far without getting tired.

Q: How does Santa find the reindeer for his sleigh? A: Reindeer live in arctic and subarctic climates, and Santa spends some of his "off-time" traveling to evaluate reindeer and find the truly gifted ones that can pull his sleigh. I often get to travel with Santa to make sure the reindeer are healthy.

Q: What does Santa feed them? How often do they eat? A: Santa feeds them hay and reindeer feed, with the occasional graham cracker Christmas cookie as a treat. They also eat mosses, grass (when it's not covered with snow, that is!) and lichens. They get to eat the hay any time they want, but they get their reindeer feed twice a day.

Q: How much does a reindeer weigh?

A: The male reindeer usually weigh up to 450 pounds (205 kg), and the females weigh up to 250 pounds (114 kg). There have been some male reindeer that weighed in at 700 pounds (318 kg)!

Q: Do boy and girl reindeer grow antlers, or are they like deer in that only the boys grow antlers?

A: Both male and female reindeer grow antlers.

Q: How old is Rudolph?

A: Because he's magic, nobody really knows how old Rudolph is. He may even be as old as Santa, but I can tell you he's healthy and he can certainly keep up with the younger reindeer.

Q: Does Rudolph's nose really glow red?

A: Yes, but not all the time. You'll often see him looking like all the other reindeer, with a black nose, because he's learned how to control the glow.

Q: Why does Rudolph's nose glow red?

A: Rudolph actually has a medical condition called nasus roseus (pronounced "NAY-suss ROSE-ee-us") that makes his nose glow bright red like a light bulb. It doesn't hurt, though, so don't worry. And if you're familiar with the story of Rudolph, you'll know that his glowing nose makes it possible for Santa to complete his mission even in a blizzard or heavy fog.

Q: What are their teeth like? How many do they have? Are they sharp?

A: Like other ruminants (such as cattle, sheep, goats and deer), reindeer don't have incisor teeth on their upper jaw. They have what's called a 'dental plate,' which still allows them to bite off grass. Their premolar and molar teeth are made for grinding grass, hay, moss and lichen, and are very similar to the premolars and molars of grass-eating animals such as cows and horses. Reindeer have 34 teeth total, compared to 32 teeth in people.

Their incisor teeth (the ones in the front of their mouths) are made for cutting and tearing grass, so they're relatively sharp. Because their back teeth are made for grinding grass and roughage, they aren't sharp like a dog's or cat's teeth, but they can still hurt if they bite you. They don't have the sharp, pointy teeth that dogs and cats have.

Santa takes special care to make sure his reindeer's teeth stay healthy by having me give them regular dental exams and cleanings, just like your pet should have.

Q: Do they have to live in a barn to be protected from the cold at the North Pole?

A: Reindeer are used to cold weather, and actually prefer it, but even reindeer need protection from the elements at the North Pole. They get to live in a cozy barn during the coldest weather. When they're not in training for the sleigh pull, they get to spend time in a top-secret pasture area in a (slightly) warmer climate, where they get to have fun and graze on grass.

Q: Do they sleep during the day or at night? How do they stay up all night on Christmas?

A: Reindeer can sleep any time of the day, but Santa's reindeer generally sleep at night so they can train during the day – after all, they need to stay in shape to pull the sleigh for that long ride on Christmas Eve! As their special trip gets closer, their schedules are altered so they can be as rested as possible. Santa definitely makes sure that his reindeer are healthy and 100% ready and able to make that long flight.

Santa packs snacks and water for them so they don't get too hungry or thirsty on the trip, and so they can keep their energy up. Plus, they get to catch short naps on the rooftops while Santa's delivering the toys to all the good girls and boys.

Q: What are your duties as Santa's Official Veterinarian? A: My primary duty is to make sure the reindeer are healthy throughout the year. Here are some of the things I do:

I examine the reindeer about a month before the scheduled flight to make sure that they're healthy and that they're not showing any signs of disease or other problems. It's important that they don't have any diseases they could give to other animals during their trip around the

world, and they need to be healthy so they're less likely to catch any diseases themselves on that flight.

Once I've made sure they're healthy, I fill out health certificates for the reindeer to make sure that Santa can legally fly them into the countries around the world and to prevent any unnecessary delays. The last thing we want is Santa getting stopped at a border, right?

Right before the trip, I give them a once-over again to make sure their feet and legs are healthy enough to take off and land on the rooftops and that they're still healthy and ready to go. I also do a nose-check on Rudolph to make sure he's ready to light up in case it's needed. During the trip, I'm on call in case there are any problems or emergencies that arise. Thankfully, Santa takes such good care of them that this has never happened.

Once they've completed their trip and returned to their home base, I give each one of them a good exam to make sure they didn't get any injuries and that they're not dehydrated or weak. I then help the elves feed the reindeer their post-trip treats and food and get them settled into their comfy stalls so they can rest.

In the spring and summer, I check up on them and give them the vaccines they need, as well as do any blood tests that are necessary.



The Tradition of Mistletoe at Christmas



Mistletoe is a plant that grows on range of trees including willow, apple and oak trees. The tradition of hanging it in the house goes back to the times of the ancient Druids. It is supposed to possess mystical powers which bring good luck to the household and wards off evil spirits. It was also used as a sign of love and friendship in Norse mythology and that's where the custom of kissing under Mistletoe comes from.

When the first Christians came to Western Europe, some tried to ban the use of Mistletoe as a decoration in Churches, but many still continued to use it! York Minster Church in the UK used to hold a special Mistletoe Service in the winter, where wrong doers in the city of York could come and be pardoned.

The custom of kissing under Mistletoe comes from England. The original custom was that a berry was picked from the sprig of Mistletoe before the person could be kissed and when all the berries had gone, there could be no more kissing!

The name mistletoe comes from two Anglo Saxon words 'Mistel' (which means dung) and 'tan' (which means) twig or stick! So you could translate Mistletoe as 'poo on a stick'!!! Not exactly romantic is it!

Mistletoe was also hung on the old English decoration the Kissing Bough.

Did You Know?

- Mistletoe is normally spread on trees through bird poo and is actually a parasite! The plant attaches itself to the host tissue (a tree) and grows out of the branch.
- Mistletoe was a symbol of love and friendship in Norse mythology, which is where the practice of kissing under Mistletoe comes from.
- The name mistletoe derives from two Anglo Saxon words 'Mistel' (meaning dung) and 'tan' (meaning

twig or stick). So you might say mistletoe is 'poo on a stick' - not quite so romantic now, is it?

- Mistletoe promotes wildlife! Although it's poisonous to us, it provides a great source of food for many animals. Birds rely on the plant and butterflies lay their eggs on it and use the nectar. Bees also get important pollen from mistletoe.
- During the Medieval period, people believed mistletoe possessed mystical powers which could bring good luck to a family during December and ward off evil spirits and the devil. It was often used in ceremonies and burnt once Christmas was over.

The Christmas Pickle



The tradition of the Christmas Pickle has got to be one of the strangest modern Christmas customs, in that no one is quite sure why it exists at all!

In the 1880s Woolworth stores started selling glass ornaments imported from Germany and some were in the shape of various fruit and vegetables. It seems that pickles must have been among the selection!

Around the same time it was claimed that the Christmas Pickle was a very old German tradition and that the pickle was the last ornament hung on the Christmas tree and then the first child to find the pickle got an extra present.

However, the claim that it's an old German tradition seems to be a total myth! Not many people in Germany have even heard of the Christmas Pickle! (Similarly in Russia virtually no one knows the supposedly Russian story of Babushka!)

Some families now have the tradition of hanging the pickle on the tree, with the first person/child to find it getting a present. But it probably didn't start in Germany!

There are two other rather far-fetched stories linking the pickle to Christmas.

One features a fighter in the American Civil War who was born in Bavaria (an area of what is now Germany). He was a prisoner, and starving, he begged a guard for one last pickle before he died. The guard took pity on him and gave a pickle to him. The pickle gave him the mental and physical strength to live on!

The other story is linked to St. Nicholas. It's a medieval tale of two Spanish boys traveling home from a board-


ing school for the holidays. When they stopped at an inn for the night, the evil innkeeper, killed the boys and put them in a pickle barrel. That evening, St. Nicholas stopped at the same inn, and found the boys in the barrel and miraculously bought them back to life!

There is an old legend about St. Nicholas rescuing boys from a barrel but the barrel was originally holding meat for pies - not pickles!

So it's most likely that an ornament salesmen, with a lot of spare pickles to sell, invented the legend of the Christmas Pickle!

The American city of Berrien Springs, MI (also known as the Christmas Pickle Capital of the World) has an annual pickle festival held during the early part of December.






