

Presidents' Day February 17 2020



When is Presidents' Day 2020? Are Presidents' Day and George Washington's birthday the same day? There's some confusion about this holiday. Here's a short summary of Presidents' Day history and why we celebrate!

PRESIDENTS' DAY

Contrary to popular belief, the observed federal holiday is actually called 2022 Monday, February 21 "Washington's Birthday." Neither Congress nor the President has ever stipulated that the name of the holiday observed as Washington's Birthday be changed to Presidents' Day. Additionally, Congress has never declared a national holiday binding in all states and each state decides its own legal holidays. This is why there are some calendar discrepancies when it comes to this holiday.

So how did Washington's Birthday come to be called Presidents' Day? Many calendars list the third Monday of February as Presidents' Day and many U.S. states list the holiday as Presidents' Day. Of course, all of the 3 -day retail store sales are called "Presidents' Day" sales and this vernacular has also been influential in how we reference the holiday.

PRESIDENTS' DAY HISTORY

Historically, Americans began celebrating George Washington's Birthday just months after his death, long before Congress declared it a federal holiday. It was not until 1879, under President Rutherford B. Hayes, that Washington's Birthday became a legal holiday, to be observed on his birthday, February 22.

Washington's birthday was celebrated on February 22 until well into the 20th Century. In 1968, Congress passed the Monday Holiday Law to "provide uniform annual observances of certain legal public holidays on Mondays." By creating more 3-day weekends, Congress hoped

to "bring substantial benefits to both the spiritual and economic life of the Nation."

Today, George Washington's Birthday is one of only eleven permanent holidays established by Congress. One of the great traditions followed for decades has been the reading of George Washington's Farewell Address—which remains an annual event for the Senate to this day.

In a sense, Washington's birthday helps us reflect on not just the first president but also the founding of our nation, the values, and what Washington calls in his Farewell Address, the "beloved Constitution and union, as received from the Founders."

GEORGE WASHINGTON'S REAL BIRTHDAY

Although the federal holiday is held on a Monday (the third Monday of February), George Washington's birthday is observed on February 22. To complicate matters, Washington was actually born on February 11 in 1731! How can that be?

George Washington was originally born when the Julian calendar was being used. During Washington's lifetime, people in Great Britain and America switched the official calendar system from the Julian to the Gregorian calendar (something most of Europe had done way back in 1582).

As a result of this calendar reform, people born before 1752 were told to add 11 days to their birth dates. Those born between January 1 and March 25, as Washington was, also had to add one year to be in sync with the new calendar.

By the time Washington became president in 1789, he celebrated his birthday on February 22 and listed his year of birth as 1732.

To summarize, Washington's birthday changed from February 11, 1731 (Old Style Julian calendar) to February 22, 1732 (New Style Gregorian calendar).

MYTHS ABOUT WASHINGTON

If you think that George Washington chopped down a cherry tree and then admitted his wrongdoing by saying to his father, "I cannot tell a lie," think again. He didn't say it; he didn't even chop down the tree! Parson Mason Weems (1759–1825), one of Washington's biographers, made up the story hoping to demonstrate Washington's honesty.

This tale is not the only myth about Washington. His wooden dentures? They weren't made of wood. Instead, they were made of hippopotamus teeth that had been

filed down to fit Washington's mouth.

Some Interesting Facts About Crocodiles

Crocodiles are aquatic reptiles, and among the most feared carnivores on Earth, because of their size, big powerful jaws and aggressiveness. They are so suc-



cessful predators – once they were living alongside the dinosaurs. After the Chicxulub impact, which happened around 66 million years ago, the non-avian dinosaurs were gone but crocodiles were managed to survive. Here are top 20 amazing crocodile facts about these fascinating beasts.

- 1. They are the biggest reptiles on Earth Saltwater crocodiles are the biggest reptiles in the world. They can grow up to 6.17 meters (20 feet 3 in) and can weigh more than a ton.
- Measured at 20 ft 3 in (6.17 m), and weighed 2,370 lbs (1,075 kg), Lolong, an Indo-Pacific or saltwater crocodile (Crocodylus porosus), was the biggest crocodile ever measured. He died in captivity at around 8 pm on 10 February 2013, due to pneumonia and cardiac arrest, which was aggravated by a fungus infection and stress.
- 2. Since they are big, there is a crocodile species called "Dwarf Crocodile"

The smallest extant crocodile is the dwarf crocodile (Osteolaemus tetraspis), with a medium adult length of 1.5 m (4.9 ft). The maximum recorded length for this species is 1.9 m (6.2 ft).

- 3. They are widespread They can be found in all inhabited continents with the exception of Europe.
- 4. Crocodiles are closely related to dinosaurs and birds Despite being classified as "reptiles", crocodiles (and all crocodilians, including alligators) are more closely related to dinosaurs and birds (which are actually avian dinosaurs) than to most animals classified as reptiles.
- 5. Crocodiles really do produce tears

Crocodiles really do produce tears. Because, while eating, they swallow too much air, which gets in touch with lachrymal glands (glands that produce tears) and forces tears to flow. But it's not actually crying. The term "Crocodile tears" (and equivalents in many other languages) refers to a false, insincere display of emotion, such as a hypocrite crying fake tears of grief. It is derived from an ancient anecdote that crocodiles weep in order to lure their prey, or that they cry for the victims they are eating, first told in the Bibliotheca by Photios I, who was the Ecumenical Patriarch of Constantinople. This tale was first spread widely in English in the stories of the Travels of Sir John Mandeville in the 14th century and appears in several of William Shakespeare's plays.

6. They can keep open their jaw underwater Crocodiles have a valve at the back of their throat allowing them to open their jaw underwater.

7. They can live long

They have an average lifespan of at least 30-40 years and in the case of larger species an average of 60-70 years. There are claims of some individuals exceeding 100 years, but there is no strong evidence to support that.

8. Their ancestors were much bigger The first crocodiles appeared around 250 million years ago, at the same time when dinosaurs appeared. The prehistoric ancestors of crocodiles were much bigger than today's counterparts.

Sarcosuchus skull next to a human. Sarcosuchus, popularly known as "supercroc" is an extinct genus of crocodyliform and distant relative of the crocodile that lived 112 million years ago. It dates from the early Cretaceous Period of what is now Africa and South America and is one of the largest crocodile-like reptiles that ever lived. It was almost

twice as long as the modern saltwater crocodile and weighed up to 8 tonnes. Like most crocodiles, it had a huge biteforce, possibly up to 9 tons, more than 88,000 N, far exceeding any modern-day crocodile (16,460 N).



- 9. Saltwater crocodiles have the strongest bite Crocodiles have the strongest bite ever measured. Paleobiologist Gregory M. Erickson and colleagues tested the bite forces of all 23 living crocodilian species. The strongest, saltwater crocodiles (naturally) slammed their jaws shut with 3,700 pounds per square inch (psi), or 16,460 Newtons, of bite force. For a comparison, a lion has a bite force of 1,314.7 Newtons at the canine tips and 2,023.7 Newtons at the carnassials. But, despite this enormous bite force, their muscles to open the jaw are extremely small and weak that a human can use her/ his bare hands to keep a crocodile's mouth closed.
- 10. They have a good night vision Their night vision is very good and they are mostly nocturnal hunters.

19. Their infant mortality rate is very high

Most of the young crocodiles (some sources give a percent as high as 99%) are eaten in their first year of life – by other predators like lizards, other crocodiles, hyenas, and even fish

11. Their heart is sophisticated

Crocodiles have the most sophisticated heart in the animal kingdom, and actively change the destination of blood that flows through it depending on requirements.

- 12. They carry their hatchlings in their mouth Crocodiles carry their babies to the water in their mouth. Baby crocodiles can make noises from inside their eggs before they hatch. The mother can hear their voices, then digs up the eggs from the sand, and takes the hatchlings to the water.
- 13. They can find their home from long distances Crocodiles may possess a homing instinct. In northern Australia, three rogue saltwater crocodiles were relocated 400 km (249 mi) by helicopter, but returned to their original locations within three weeks, based on data obtained from tracking devices attached to them.
- 14. They are (obviously) good swimmers Their top swimming speed is 15 km/h (9.3 mph).

15. Their feet are webbed

Crocodiles have webbed feet which, though not used to propel them through the water (they tuck their feet to the side while swimming and use the power of their tails), allow them to make fast turns and sudden moves in the water or initiate swimming.

16. They are cold-blooded

Like other reptiles, crocodiles are cold-blooded. So, they have a very slow metabolism, which allows them to survive long periods without food. They can survive many months on a single large meal.


17. They cannot sweat

Crocodiles do not have sweat glands and release heat through their mouths. They often sleep with their mouths open.

20. Crocodiles are amphibious

They are amphibious reptiles, spending part of their time in water and part on land. Although the saltwater crocodile and the American crocodile are able to swim out to sea, no living species of crocodilians can be considered truly marine.

Where Is the Hottest Place on Earth?



Is it summer where you live? It may not yet be the dog days of summer, but we bet it's starting to warm up nicely!

Wonder Friends know that we've already visited the coldest place on Earth. Now it's time to put on our short -sleeve shirts and shorts and head to the hottest place on Earth!

The Earth is a huge place and two thirds of it is covered in water. The other third is dry land that we can live on. But did you know that one third of that dry land is actually desert that's too hot and dry to support much life?

Most of the deserts of the world are near the equator. This nearness to the equator makes deserts hot. A lack of moisture also makes them dry and not a good place to live.

The deserts of the world are where we find most of the hottest places on Earth. Answering the question of where the hottest place on Earth is, though, isn't quite as easy as it sounds. For example, the place with the hottest temperature ever recorded might not be the hottest place year-round.

To date, the hottest temperature ever recorded was 159.26° F in 2005 in the Lut Desert in Iran. This area of desert in Iran is so desolate that no life — not even bacteria — has been found there.

The hottest part of this desert is an area of over 180 square miles called the Gandom Beriyan, which means "toasted wheat." Walking across its black volcanic rock in the heat of the day would be like walking on burning coals!

Before 2005, the previous high temperature was 136° F in 1922 in El Azizia, Libya. Wow! Those are some hot temperatures. But you don't have to go all the way around the world to find temperatures approaching those highs. Instead, you could just go to California!

Death Valley, California, routinely sees temperatures above 100° F in the summer. In fact, the highest recorded temperature for Death Valley was 134° F on July 10, 1913! Death Valley sits within the Mojave Desert.

As hot as all of these places are, though, there's one other place that maintains the highest average temperature year-round. That honor goes to Dallol, Ethiopia. Day in, day out...all throughout the year, Dallol's average temperature reaches almost 94° F!

Dallol sits in an area known as the Danakil Depression. High temperatures in the area can regularly reach over 115° F. Formerly a mining town, Dallol is now mainly a ghost town that can only be reached via camel.



14 Fun Facts About Penguins

Which penguin swims the fastest? Do penguins have teeth? Why do penguins sneeze? How is penguin poop useful?

Penguins seem a bit out of place on land, with their stand-out black jackets and clumsy waddling. But once you see their grace in the water, you know that's where they're meant to be—they are well-adapted to life in the ocean.

- 1. Depending on which scientist you ask, there are 17–20 species of penguins alive today, all of which live in the southern half of the globe. The most northerly penguins are Galapagos penguins (Spheniscus mendiculus), which occasionally poke their heads north of the equator.
- 2. While they can't fly through the air with their flippers, many penguin species take to the air when they leap from the water onto the ice. Just before taking flight, they release air bubbles from their feathers. This cuts the drag on their bodies, allowing them to double or triple their swimming speed quickly and launch into the air.
- **3.** Most penguins swim underwater at around four to seven miles per hour (mph), but the fastest penguin—the gentoo (Pygoscelis papua)—can reach top speeds of 22 mph!

- **4.** Penguins don't wear tuxedos to make a fashion statement: it helps them be camouflaged while swimming. From above, their black backs blend into the dark ocean water and, from below, their white bellies match the bright surface lit by sunlight. This helps them avoid predators, such as leopard seals, and hunt for fish unseen.
- **5.** The earliest known penguin fossil was found in 61.6 million-year old Antarctic rock, about 4-5 million years after the mass extinction that killed the dinosaurs. Waimanu manneringi stood upright and waddled like modern day penguins, but was likely more awkward in the water. Some fossil penguins were much larger than any penguin living today, reaching

4.5 feet tall!

6. Like other birds, penguins don't have teeth. Instead, they have backward-facing fleshy spines that line the inside of their mouths. These help them guide their fishy meals down their throat.

- 7. Penguins are carnivores: they feed on fish, squid, crabs, krill and other seafood they catch while swimming. During the summer, an active, medium-sized penguin will eat about 2 pounds of food each day, but in the winter they'll eat just a third of that.
- **8.** Eating so much seafood means drinking a lot of saltwater, but penguins have a way to remove it. The supraorbital gland, located just above their eye, filters salt from their bloodstream, which is then excreted through the bill—or by sneezing! But this doesn't mean they chug seawater to quench their thirst: penguins drink meltwater from pools and streams and eat snow for their hydration fix.
- **9.** Another adaptive gland—the oil (also called preen) gland—produces waterproofing oil. Penguins spread this across their feathers to insulate their bodies and reduce friction when they glide through the water.
- **10.** Once a year, penguins experience a catastrophic molt. (Yes, that's the official term.) Most birds molt (lose feathers and regrow them) a few at a time throughout the year, but penguins lose them all at once. They can't swim and fish without feathers, so they fatten themselves up beforehand to survive the 2–3 weeks it takes to replace them.


- 11. Feathers are quite important to penguins living around Antarctica during the winter. Emperor penguins (Aptenodytes forsteri) have the highest feather density of any bird, at 100 feathers per square inch. In fact, the surface feathers can get even colder than the surrounding air, helping to keep the penguin's body stays warm.
- 12. All but two penguin species breed in large colonies for protection, ranging from 200 to hundreds of thousands of birds. (There's safety in numbers!) But living in such tight living quarters leads to an abundance of penguin poop—so much that it stains the ice! The upside is that scientists can locate colonies from space just by looking for dark ice patches.



13. Climate change will likely affect different penguin species differently—but in the Antarctic, it appears that the loss of krill, a primary food source, is the main problem. In some areas with sea ice melt, krill density has decreased 80 percent since the 1970s, indirectly harming penguin populations. However, some colonies of Adelie penguins (Pygoscelis adeliae) have grown as the melting ice exposes more rocky nesting areas.

14. Of the 17 penguin species, the most endangered is New Zealand's yellow-eyed penguin (Megadyptes antipodes): only around 4,000 birds survive in the wild today. But other species are in trouble, including the erect-crested penguin (Eudyptes sclateri) of New Zealand, which has lost approximately 70 percent of its population over the past 20 years, and the Galapagos penguin, which has lost more than 50 percent since the 1970s.



10 Interesting Facts About Cappadocia



Famous for its unique rock formations and amazing hot air ballooning opportunities, the otherworldly land-scapes of Cappadocia are one of Turkey's most popular natural wonders. Unusual honeycombed boulders rise from the plateau of Central Anatolia and have, over the centuries, served as the backdrop for a history equally as fascinating. The region was once the heartland of the Hittite Empire and later gave rise to some of Christianity's earliest philosophers. Cappadocia is now a prime tourist destination with plenty of interesting facts to discover. Here's ten of the best.



- 1. Three to four million years ago a series of volcanic eruptions shook the Central Anatolian area, forming what we now know as the Cappadocia fairies or 'Cotton Castles'.
- 2. Cappadocia's landscape was formed by volcanic erosion. Thick ash solidified into a soft rock, called tuff, and over time the tuff rocks eroded with wind and water, creating the iconic fairy chimneys we see today.
- 3. Cappadocia spans a distance of 5,000 kilometres and sits on an altitude of over 1,000 metres, cutting through three Anatolian provinces Nevsehir, Keyseri and Nigde.
- 4. The name Cappadocia derives from the Persian word Katpaktukya, which means 'the land of beautiful

horses' for in ancient times the region was known for its equine offering. Horses are still important to the locals who call Cappadocia home and they also offer an alternative mode of transport for visitors.


- 5. There are a number of underground cities in Cappadocia, some connected by a network of tunnels. These subterranean settlements were made possible thanks to the pliability of the soft rock. Many are open to visitors, however, a lot of the land in the area is private property.
- 6. There are as many as 600 churches carved from the soft Cappadocian rock, and possibly many more that have not yet been discovered. These churches date back to Medieval times and display beautiful painted frescoes, which have retained an amazing amount of colour and detail over the centuries though some painted figures have had their eyes scratched out by superstitious locals afraid of the Evil Eye.
- 7. The village of Göreme serves as the region's main tourist centre and is also one of the few Cappadocian settlements still inhabited today. Christians gave the town of Göreme its name meaning 'you cannot see here', as they hid in the area during the Arab invasion.
- 8. The Göreme Open-Air Museum encompasses the best known religious complexes in the area. Alongside the other rock sites of Cappadocia, it was enlisted as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1985.
- 9. Music concerts are often held in the surrounding cave buildings of Cappadocia, including the week-long Cappadocia Music Festival which showcases choirs and orchestras.
- 10. The region of Cappadocia is a large grape producer and it's believed that wine-making has a long history here. There's a number of wine-tasting shops where visitors can sample the goods and in recent years wines from the region have won international awards.

Common Misconceptions About Crocodiles

After the crocodile facts mentioned on page 3 of this issue, here are the misconceptions about crocodiles.

- Contrary to the common myth, crocodile skin (and also alligator skin) is not bulletproof.
- "You can not outrun a crocodile. They can run as fast as a racehorse." This is absolutely wrong. A racehorse can run faster than 40 mph (64 km/h) with a record top speed of 43.97 mph (70.76 km/h). Crocs cannot get anywhere near that fast on land. Their maximum speed is 12 mph (19 km/h) on land, and for a very short distance (around 20-25 meters), when they "belly run". They usually go much slower than that. While walking on their legs, which is called the "high walk", their top speed is only 5 km/h (3 mph). So, an average healthy human can easily outrun a crocodile. They do, however, accelerate very fast, thundering from 0 to 15 km/h in no time, both while swimming and running.

"Galloping" crocodile, in fast running pace, goes after a chicken. The typical maximum speed of a crocodile is 12 mph (19 km/h) on land, and for a very short distance (around 20-25 meters).

- does not clean crocodile's teeth. No bird clean crocodile teeth. This is a pure myth. The photos showing Egyptian plover cleaning crocodile teeth are fake. Adam Britton, a zoologist and expert in crocodile biology, behavior, and conservation at Charles Darwin University, says "Nobody has ever photographed or filmed this, but the myth persists to this day." This myth actually originated with the ancient Greek philosopher Herodotus (484–c. 425 BC), but no known photographic evidence exists, and the written accounts are considered suspect also by the biologist Thomas Howell.
- Neither crocodiles nor alligators eat their babies. No crocodilian do that. Evon Hekkala, the principal investigator at Fordham University's Hekkala Lab and a research associate at the American Museum of Natural History, says "A long time ago, people would observe the crocodiles and alligators digging up nests and having hatchlings in their mouths, and

they would think that they were eating them." In fact, they were taking their babies to the water. See the "crocodile facts #12".

• Crocodiles are not dumb. While the brain of a crocodilian is fairly small, it is capable of greater learning than most reptiles.



Chris said the note did indeed leave him smiling all day and he decided to do something meaningful with the money.


"We bought some sandwiches and drinks for a few homeless lads and lasses on the way home to pay it forward," he said.










Footballers let homeless squatters stay in their hotel for winter



Footballers are more often associated with bawdy excess and ridiculously large pay packets than for charity work. But Ryan Giggs and Gary Neville made headlines when a group of squatters and activists moved into a Manchester hotel the footballers were redeveloping – and the players-turned-property moguls let them stay for winter.


Wesley Hall, the human rights activist leading the group, told the Guardian he cried when Neville said they could stay put for a while instead of evicting them.

Neville bought the stock exchange building in 2013 for £1.5 million, with plans to turn it into an exclusive 35-bed hotel. But between October 2015 and January 2016, the building became a refuge for homeless people needing clothes, shelter, food, advice and support getting permanent homes.

"We were expecting that as soon as [they] found out that we had occupied the building, they would try to get us evicted," said Hall. "Having a few months during the winter to work with homeless people without the threat of eviction hanging over our heads is brilliant.

"We've got a real opportunity to do some intensive work with homeless people and make a big difference to their lives."

HALFETI (TR) - BLACK **ROSES, ONLY GROW-**ING IN TURKEY, READY TO HIT WORLD **MARKETS**

Halfeti



The Rose Union to be established by Cittaslow, the Italy-based movement aiming at slowing down the pace of life in cities and promoting ecological harmony, will be introducing Turkey's black rose to the world.

Endemic only to Turkey and growing in the Halfeti district of the southeastern province of Sanlıurfa, the black rose is renowned for its petals which adopt a pitch black hue in March-April and October-November. Its shade changes a bit during other seasons.

The Halfeti District Council Chair Nihat Özdal explained how the flower owes its black color to the area's microclimate and terroir, and also dismissed other similarly black-petaled roses being imported from the Netherlands. "Those cultivated in the Netherlands or in other places are roses which have had their genes altered and grown in greenhouses," said Özdal, "Original black roses only grow in Halfeti; there has been absolutely no genetic manipulation here."

What is the meaning of the Black Rose Color?

Every rose has its own color meaning. For example Red rose means passion, affection, and true love. White rose means purity and innocence. Well, it's not surprising to hear that black roses represent dark emotions. Death, anarchy, sadness and tragic romance all fall under a black rose's meaning. Don't be too discouraged by the dark side. Some consider black roses to represent a one-of-a-kind love since these flowers are unique.

10 Fascinating Dolphin Facts



Did you grow up loving Flipper? Dolphins are truly lovable, but they are far more than just fun creatures of the sea.

Here are 10 fascinating dolphin facts that will make vou love them even more.

- 1. Nearly 40 species of dolphins swim the waters of the world. Most live in shallow areas of tropical and temperate oceans, and five species live in rivers.
- 2. Dolphins are carnivores. Fish, squid and crustaceans are included in their list of prey. A 260-pound dolphin eats about 33 pounds of fish a day.
- 3. Known for their playful behavior, dolphins are highly intelligent. They are as smart as apes, and the evolution of their larger brains is surprisingly similar to humans.
- 4. Dolphins are part of the family of whales that includes orcas and pilot whales. Killer whales are actually dolphins.
- 5. Dolphins are very social, living in groups that hunt and even play together. Large pods of dolphins can have 1,000 members or more.



6. Depending on the species, gestation takes nine to 17 months. After birth, dolphins are surprisingly maternal. They have been observed nestling and cuddling their young.

- 7. A dolphin calf nurses for up to two years. Calves stay with the mothers anywhere from three to eight years.
- 8. Dolphins have acute eyesight both in and out of the water. They hear frequencies 10 times the upper limit of adult humans. Their sense of touch is well-developed, but they have no sense of smell.
- 9. Dolphins have few natural enemies. Humans are their main threat. Pollution, fishing and hunting mean some dolphin species have an uncertain future. In 2006, the Yangtze River dolphin was named functionally extinct.
- 10. Because dolphins are mammals, they need to come to the surface of the water to breathe. Unlike land mammals that breathe and eat through their mouths, dolphins have separate holes for each task. Dolphins eat through their mouths and breathe through their blowholes. This prevents the dolphin from sucking up water into the lungs when hunting, reducing the risk of drowning.



Friends,



Altruistic Babies? New Study Shows Hungry Toddlers Will Give Up Food in Order to Help Others

Altruistic helping—the act of giving away something desirable, even at a cost to oneself—is perhaps most evident when it comes to food.

Human adults often respond to hungry people, whether through food banks or fundraisers, or by simply handing over their lunch. But when does that spirit of giving start?

New research by the University of Washington's Institute for Learning & Brain Sciences (I-LABS) finds that altruism may begin in infancy. In a study of nearly 100 toddlers who were 19 months-old, researchers found that the children gave a desirable snack to a stranger in need, even when they, themselves, were hungry. The findings not only show that young tots engage in altruistic behavior, but also suggest that early social experiences can shape that altruism.

The study is published online in Scientific Reports, an open-access journal from the Nature Publishing Group.

"We think altruism is important to study because it is one of the most distinctive aspects of being human. It is an important part of the moral fabric of society," said Rodolfo Cortes Barragan, a postdoctoral researcher at I-LABS and lead author on the study. "We adults help each other when we see another in need and we do this even if there is a cost to the self. So we tested the roots of this in infants." Non-human primates have been found to cooperate, and to share resources under restricted conditions—but non-human primates, such as chimpanzees, don't actively hand over delicious food that they need themselves.

I-LABS researchers wanted to test whether human infants were able to act beyond self-interest when faced with one of the most fundamental biological needs: food. For this study, researchers chose kid-friendly fruits—including bananas, blueberries, and grapes—and set up an interaction between child and researcher. The goal was to determine whether the child would—without encouragement, verbal instruction, or reinforcement—spontaneously give an appealing food to an unfamiliar person.

In the experiment, the child and the adult researcher faced each other across a table at I-LABS, and the researcher showed the child a piece of fruit. What happened next was determined by whether the child was in the control group, or the test group. In the control group, the researcher gently tossed the piece of fruit onto a tray on the floor beyond reach but within the child's reach. The researcher showed no expression and made no attempt to retrieve the fruit. In the test group, the researcher pretended to accidentally drop the fruit onto the tray, then reach for it unsuccessful-

ly.

That reaching effort—the adult's apparent desire for the food—seemed to trigger a helping response in the children, researchers said: More than half the children in the test group picked up the fruit and gave it to the adult, compared to 4% of children in the control group.

In a second experiment with a different sample of children, parents were asked to bring their child just before their scheduled snack or mealtime when the child was likely to be hungry. Researchers reasoned that this would raise the "cost to self" that defines altruism. The control and test group scenarios were repeated, but with children who were now more motivated to take the fruit for themselves. The results mirrored those from the previous study. Fully 37% of the test group offered the fruit to the researcher while none of the children in the control group did so.

"The infants in this second study looked longingly at the fruit, and then they gave it away!" said Andrew Meltzoff, who is co-director of I-LABS and holds the Job and Gertrud Tamaki Endowed Chair in psychology. "We think this captures a kind of baby-sized version of altruistic helping."

The research team also analyzed the data in different ways—whether children offered fruit on the first trial of the experiment or got better during the process, for example, and whether children from particular types of family environments helped more.

The researchers found that infants helped just as well on the very first trial of the experiment as on later trials, which Barragan said is informative because it shows that the children did not have to learn to help during the study and needed no training. Indeed, children spontaneously and repeatedly helped a person from outside of their immediate family.

The researchers also found that children with siblings and from certain cultural backgrounds were especially likely to help the adult, indicating that the expression of infant altruism is malleable. These results fit well with previous studies with adults that show positive influences of having a cultural background that emphasizes "interdependence," that is, a background that places particular value on how much an individual feels connected to others.

"We think certain family and social experiences make a difference, and continued research would be desirable to more fully understand what maximizes the expression of altruism in young children," says Barragan. "If we can discover how to promote altruism in our kids, this could move us toward a more caring society."


