National Bald Eagle Day or American Eagle Day



Date When Celebrated: This holiday is always held on June 20

American Eagle Day and National Bald Eagle Day are used interchangeably, as the day we celebrate the national bird of the United States of America. As our national bird, it symbolizes freedom, strength, honesty, wisdom and power.

On this day in 1782, the Bald Eagle became our national bird, and an important national symbol. On this day, the bald eagle was added to the official seal of the United States. The bald eagle is portrayed holding 13 arrows in its left talon, symbolizing the original 13 colonies. In its right talon, it

holds an olive branch, a symbol of piece.

Did You Know? Our national bird almost became the turkey. The virtues of the two birds were hotly debated by Congress, prior to selecting the Bald Eagle as our national bird. Can you imagine eating bald eagles instead of turkey on Thanksgiving!?

An important distinction: National Bald Eagle Day is defined as a national "observance", rather than a holiday. As a result, government offices, banks and business are open on this day.

Celebrate this special day by:

Learning more about our national bird. Go to a zoo that has a bald eagle Flying the flag. While the flag itself does not portray a bald eagle, the top of the flag pole is often adorned with a bald eagle. (perhaps you never noticed!)

The Origin of National Bald Eagle Day:

On January 28,1982, then President Ronald Reagan issued a proclamation in accordance with a joint resolution of Congress (S.J. Res 121) declaring June 20, 1982 to be National Bald Eagle Day

In 1995, then president William Clinton proclaimed June 20, 1995 as American Eagle Day.

While neither of these presidential proclamations made the observance an annual event, the American public has celebrated it annually. This is a true tribute to the honor and respect we have for our stately and majestic national bird.



Scientists Discover 33 Creatures Trapped In A Poisonous Cave That's Been Sealed Off For Million Of Years

The Movile Cave in Romania has been sealed off for millions of years. Its air is thick with harmful gases, yet it is home to dozens of bizarre creatures.



The cave has remained isolated for 5.5 million years, BBC Earth reports. But despite a complete absence of light and a poisonous atmosphere, the cave is crawling with life.

Scientists have identified 48 species living inside of the cave. Incredibly, 33 of the creatures that were found have never been seen outside of this specific cave.

Microbiologist Rich Boden is one of the few people to have entered the cave.

"It's pretty warm, and very humid so it feels warmer than it is, and of course with a boiler suit and helmet on that doesn't help," Boden told the BBC. "The pool of warm, sulphidic water stinks of rotting eggs or burnt rubber when you disturb it as hydrogen sulphide is given off."



Entering the cave is not for the faint of heart.

First, you lower yourself by rope 20 meters down a narrow shaft in complete darkness. Then you must crawl through narrow tunnels that eventually open up into a central cavern containing a lake.

To explore the rest of the cave, you must dive into the lake and navigate narrow underwater passageways.

On top of that, the place is filled with creepy crawlers.

How do these creatures survive? In most caves, animals get their food from the water dripping down from the surface. However, Movile Cave has a thick layer of clay above it, which is impermeable to water.

Instead, the food comes from a strange frothy foam sitting on top of the water. The foam contains millions of bacteria.

"These bacteria get their carbon from carbon dioxide just like plants do," Boden said. "They get the energy needed from chemical reactions."

Movile is the only cave whose ecosystem is known to be supported in this way.

Over the years, the animals inside the cave have adapted to their unique environment.

Every creature living in Movile Cave has no vision and lacks any kind of color pigments. Without the ability to see, the organisms developed extremely long antennae, limbs, and other bodily features to feel their way around the cave.

Researchers categorized all of the animals in the cave. They included 3 species of spider, a centipede, 4 species of isopod, a leech never seen anywhere else in the world, and a waterscorpion.

How and why the animals entered the cave still remains a mystery. However, it seems they're trapped for good.

All You Need To Know: June Solstice 2020

The June solstice is June 20. Longest day for the Northern Hemisphere. Shortest day for the Southern Hemisphere.

The June solstice -your signal to celebrate summer in the Northern Hemisphere and winter in the Southern Hemisphere –will happen on June 20, 2020, at 21:44 UTC. That 4:44 pm CDT in North America on June 20. For us in the Northern Hemisphere, this solstice marks longest day of the year. Early dawns. Long days. Late sunsets. Short nights. The sun at its height each day, as it crosses the sky. Meanwhile, south of the equator, winter begins. What is a solstice? Ancient cultures knew that the sun's path across the sky, the length of daylight, and the location of the sunrise and sunset all shifted in a regular way throughout the year. They built monuments, such as Stonehenge, to follow the sun's yearly progress. Today, we know that the solstice is an astronomical event, caused by Earth's tilt on its axis and it's motion in orbit around the sun. It's because Earth doesn't orbit upright. Instead, our world is tilted on its axis by 23 ½ degrees. Earth's Northern and Southern? Hemispheres trade places in receiving the sun's light and warmth directly.

At the June solstice, Earth is positioned its orbit so that our world's North Pole is leaning most toward the sun. As seen from Earth, the sun is directly overhead at noon 23 ½ degrees north of the equator, at an imaginary line encircling the globe known as the Tropic of Cancernamed after the constellation Caner the Crab. This is as far north as the sun ever gets.

All locations north of the equator have days longer than 12 hours at the June solstice. Meanwhile, all locations south of the equator have days shorter than 12 hours.

When is the solstice where I live? The solstice takes place on June 20, 2020, at 21:44 UTC. That's 4:44 CDT in North America on June 20.

A solstice happens at the same instant for all of us, everywhere on Earth. To find the time of solstice in your location you have to translate to your time zone. Here an example of how to do that in the central United States, for those of us using Central Daylight Time, we subtract five hours from Universal Time. That's how we get 16:44 (4:44pm) CDT as the time of the 2020 June solstice (21:44) UTC on June 20 minus 5 equals 16:44 (4:44 pm) CDT on June 20.

Where should I look to see signs of the solstice in nature? Everywhere. For all of Earth's creatures nothing is fundamental as the length of the day. After all, the sun is the ultimate source of almost all light and warmth on Earth's surface. If you live in the North Hemisphere, you might notice the early dawns and late sunsets, and the high arc of the sun across the sky each day. You might see how high the sun appears in the sky at local noon. And be sure to look at noontime shadow. Around the time of the Solstice, it's your shortest noontime shadow of the year. If you're a person who's tuned in to the out-of-doors, you know the peaceful, comforting feeling that accompanies these signs and signals of the year's longest day.



How National Days Are Defined?

Of particular note is the growth of "National Days". The word "National" is being added to an overwhelmingly large number of proposed and recently created days. The word "National" has even been added by some holiday calendar websites for special days that were not created as a "National" day! This causes confusion as to the whether or not, a special days is in actuality a national day.

Why is it important to identify and distinguish true "National" days? We care about the term "National' on holiday titles and others do as well. It is fine with us, if someone puts the "national" tag on a holiday that they create. But, we have several reasons why we believe this distinction is very important:


- 1. First of all, to respect the intent of the creator. We've spoken with or traded emails with many holiday creators. We feel it is important to maintain the holiday title as they intended.
- 2. The creators of holidays and events agree the title should be as they created it, and others do not have the right to change it. Some of the creators have said a presidential proclamation or congressional resolution would be nice.
- 3. We also feel it is important to distinguish those holidays that are truly declared as a "National" day by congress or the president. This is not done lightly. Often the creator of the holiday spends much time and effort to attain an official declaration.
- 4. It is important that history is not altered. If we arbitrarily change a title, what's next?

To be a true "National" day, one of the following conditions must be met:

- 1. A proclamation is issued by the President of the United States.
- 2. An Act of Congress. This requires a legislator to propose the day and congress votes approval.
- 3. For other countries, the president (or head of the government) or the national legislature declares it to be a national day.

Obviously, it is no small task to create a true National day.



Antonio Gwynn Jr. started at 2 a.m. and did not stop cleaning for the next 10 hours. When an organized group of neighbors arrived later that morning to assess the damage, they found that Gwynn had already done most of the work.

Gwynn, an 18-year-old high school senior, said he saw on the local news that Bailey Avenue in Buffalo was covered in glass and garbage, and he knew people needed to use that street to get to work in the morning.

Word spread of how Gwynn single-handedly took action and his community rewarded him.

Gwynn has been offered a full scholarship to Medaille College and a 2004 Ford Mustang convertible. He's even getting a year of free auto insurance, courtesy of local businessman Bob Briceland.

"We just need to get together our whole city and show people how there's so many good people here," Briceland said.

The car was gifted to Gwynn by



Matt Block, who said he saw Gwynn's story on the news and decided to give him his Mustang. Block, 27, told CNN the car is one he wanted since he was a child, but these days he is only using it occasionally. He saw Gwynn ask for some car buying advice on Facebook, and Matt decided to offer up his sports car.

It turns out that gift has more meaning than Block ever imagined. Gwynn's mother, who passed away in 2018, also drove a red Mustang. When he realized the coincidence, Gwynn says that he was so shocked he "didn't have any words," and Block says it gave him "goosebumps."

Gwynn is thankful for the community response, saying, "I appreciate everything everyone is doing for me."

The 8th grade class at the Waldorf School in Santa Fe had spent the entire year raising \$2,800 for their rafting trip. But their trip was canceled because of the coronavirus pandemic.

So, the students chose to make a major impact on the lives of others by using the money to help the Navajo Nation.

In May, the Navajo Nation surpassed New York and New Jersey for the highest per-capita coronavirus infection rate in the US, CNN reports.

Falkenhagen drove with her daughters, Daisy and Indie Russell, to Window Rock, Arizona, to make the delivery on behalf of the eighth grade class.

Their teacher, Daisy Barnard, told CNN, "I am very proud of my students, but I'm not surprised. This is a very generous and compassionate group of teens. They have been raised to think outside their own immediate lives and it shows in moments like this."

Australian researchers released drone video this week showing at least 64,000 endangered green turtles at Raine Island -- an island situated on the outer edges of the Great Barrier Reef.




The stunning drone footage, shared by the Great Barrier Reef Foundation, showed the world's largest green turtle gathering ever seen at Raine Island.

The Extra Mile

The inspiring story of a dad who goes above and beyond for his kids.



Near midnight. My wife and I were driving home from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where our son Randy was a junior English major. Rita was asleep in the passenger seat.

I headed north, wondering what on earth had possessed us to take the afternoon off to make the trek to campus and back, a six-hour round trip slogging through the towns dotting Highway 47. All for nothing.

For weeks Randy had been telling me how much fun he was having playing intramural coed flag football. Maybe it was his talk of diving catches and trick plays, but I'd felt this sudden urge to cheer him on, like we had in high school.

Just several hours earlier Rita and I had met him at the field. It was a crisp fall evening—perfect football weather. I was pumped.

Randy introduced us to his teammates. "You really came all this way just to see us?" they asked incredulously.

The cheering section consisted of Rita, me and an injured player on crutches. But we didn't mind. We watched the kids stretch and warm up, run through some drills and then...there was some sort of delay.

Randy ran over. "The other team had to forfeit," he said. "They don't have enough players."

I tried to hide my disappointment. No big deal. Unless you'd just driven three hours to get here. We took Randy out for pie and coffee. Nice, but I'd had my heart set on seeing him in action. I'd wanted to cheer for my son.

Now, slowing the car to a crawl through the town of Yorkville, I couldn't help thinking that the whole idea had been foolish. I was behind on work. I really needed to clean out the garage.

I thought of all the T-ball games and soccer matches, band concerts and science fairs I'd gone to over the years for our five children.

Once Rita and I even snuck into Randy's English class to see him perform in a skit. We had been the only parents there that day too. I'd worked hard to be a supportive dad, but was I trying too hard?

Ahead I saw a bridge crossing over the Fox River. A distant memory stirred...from back when I was a Boy Scout. Every fall our troop made a two-day, 40-mile canoe journey down the Fox.

There was one year I would never forget. My dad dropped my brother Mark and me at the launch, made sure our life vests were snug and said goodbye as our flotilla set off. I plunged my paddle into the water and pulled hard, then lifted and stroked again. Mark, in front, did the same.

Before long we had a good rhythm going. I wish Dad could see us, I thought.

About a mile downriver we came to a bridge. I looked up and there he was. Dad, standing right in the middle of the span. He didn't shout instructions or do anything embarrassing. He simply waved until we passed underneath. I looked back and he was gone. Huh? Was I just imagining him?

But several miles later, at the next overpass, there he was again. And the one after that. And the next.

It turned into a game. The whole troop began looking for him. Every time we rounded a bend that day someone would shout, "There's Mr. Payleitner!" All the boys were waving now, but no one was happier to see him than I was.

My dad had taken a chance and literally gone the extra mile (and then some) to show us his love. All these years later it had never left me.

Now I drove across the bridge in the darkness. I imagined Dad standing there, waving, still encouraging me. It made me think of a nightly prayer I'd said when the kids were younger, asking God to help me be the kind of dad my kids need.

At last I understood the most im-portant thing I could do for my children—just be there, even if it meant going the extra mile, the way my dad did for me, cheering me on.

I believe my husband and father of my three amazing kids is a ridiculously inspiring dad: David Taylor-Klaus. I know his kids would agree! After managing a particularly difficult bout with depression, David started over in a new career in his 40s by becoming a coach. He likes to say that in his work with executives and entrepreneurs, he reintroduces successful professionals to their families. He focuses on creating the life they want, and the business to support it and walks the talks in terms of his relationship with his kids. David is connected, devoted and makes time for each of them, who are now 22, 20 and 16. It is beyond inspiring to watch him with any of our kids—and especially with all of them together.

Our oldest daughter is an actor and did not take a traditional path. The early years of bi-coastal parenting when she moved to the west coast were not easy for any of us, but with intention and attention, we all supported each other and managed to become even more connected than we'd been when we all lived under the same roof.

David is the master chef in our family and in many ways took over as the "glue" when I started building a new company supporting other parents of kids with complex issues. His family dinners create a place for us to come together, even when some of the kids are with us via Skype or FaceTime. So, yeah, "ridiculously inspiring dad" is a perfect way to describe David. 




