The History of America's Independence Day

"Taxation without representation!" was the battle cry in America's 13 Colonies, which were forced to pay taxes to England's King George III despite having no representation in the British Parliament. As dissatisfaction grew, British troops were sent in to quell the early movement toward rebellion. Repeated attempts by the Colonists to resolve the crisis without military conflict proved fruitless.

On June 11, 1776, the Colonies' Second Continental Congress met in Philadelphia and formed a committee whose express purpose was drafting a document that would formally sever their ties with Great Britain. The committee included Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Roger Sherman and Robert R. Livingston. Jefferson, who was considered the strongest and most eloquent writer, crafted the original draft document (as seen above). A total of 86 changes were

made to his draft and the Continental Congress officially adopted the final version on July 4, 1776.

The following day, copies of the Declaration of Independence were distributed, and on July 6, The Pennsylvania Evening Post became the first newspaper to print the extraordinary document. The Declaration of Independence has since become our nation's most cherished symbol of liberty.

Bonfires and Illuminations

On July 8, 1776, the first public readings of the Declaration were held in Philadelphia's Independence Square to the ringing of bells and band music. One year later, on July 4, 1777, Philadelphia marked Independence Day by adjourning Congress and celebrating with bonfires, bells and fireworks.

The custom eventually spread to other towns, both large and small, where the day was marked with processions, oratory, picnics, contests, games, military displays and fireworks. Observations throughout the nation became even more common at the end of the War of 1812 with Great Britain.

In June of 1826, Thomas Jefferson sent a letter to Roger C. Weightman, declining an invitation to come to Washington, D.C. to help celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. It was the last letter that Jefferson, who was gravely ill, ever wrote. In it, Jefferson says of the document:

"May it be to the world, what I believe it will be ... the signal of arousing men to burst the chains ... and to assume the blessings and security of self-government. That form, which we have substituted, restores the free right to the unbounded exercise of reason and freedom of opinion. All eyes are opened, or opening, to the rights of man. ... For ourselves, let the annual return of this day forever refresh our recollections of these rights, and an undiminished devotion to them."

- Thomas Jefferson June 24, 1826 Monticello

Congress established Independence Day as a holiday in 1870, and in 1938 Congress reaffirmed it as a paid holiday for federal employees. Today, communities across the nation mark this major midsummer holiday with parades, firework displays, picnics and performances of "The Star-Spangled Banner" and marches by John Philip Sousa.

Most of us use them every day, the thin plastic bags used by almost every retailer we visit. Whether we're shopping for groceries or the newest Prada, you can almost guarantee that you'll be leaving the store with a plastic bag stuffed full of your new goodies.

Then, when you arrive home, you'll quickly remove them like a kid opening Christmas presents, tossing aside the wrapping with thoughtless abandon. Have you ever stopped to consider what happens to those plastic bags? Has it ever occurred to you just how many of them we go through, individually, in a year?

Learn about International Plastic Bag Free Day Plastic pollution is a global catastrophe and sadly it is a man-made one. Did you know that approximately 500 billion plastic bags are used on a global scale? Just think about how many of these bags will end up littered all over the planet. This is having an extremely detrimental effect on the environment, wildlife and indeed human health.

The marine ecosystem in particular is suffering immensely as a result of plastic pollution. 31 species of marine mammals are known to have ingested marine plastic whilst over 100 species of sea birds have ingested plastic artefacts. Over 250 species have become entangled in plastic, whilst entanglement rates of approximately eight percent have been discovered in some sea lion and seal species.

This pollution is also extremely dangerous because it is leading to the transportation of invasive species, which can have a catastrophic influence on biodiversity. We are not immune from the impact either. Plastic particles in the ocean attract toxins, which in turn affects us, as the toxins enter the food chain.

International Plastic Bag Free Day is dedicated to heightening awareness about these and very real and pressing issues brought about by this most popular of disposable carrying devices. We are reminded that those bags we pick up from the retailers are used for an incredibly short time, usually under 25 minutes, and are then disposed of.

They may pass out of our thinking then, but they do not pass out of our world. Plastic bags remain in the world for anywhere from 100-500 years before finally decaying completely, and have a profound impact upon our environment as a result.

Out in the great reaches of the ocean are massive reefs

made up of all sorts of plastic waste, and plastic bags play heavily among them. Such is the magnitude of the problem that these great floating islands reach hundreds of miles, like great monuments to mankind's wastefulness, and disregard for the world upon which we live. International Plastic Bag Free Day gives us an opportunity to remind ourselves, and others, that every action we take, and every bag we dispose of, effects the lives of everyone in the world for generations to come.

3. John Adams took up residence in the White House on November 1, 1800. In the first few days of his residency, he wrote a letter to his wife, Abigail, containing this prayer:

"I pray Heaven to bestow the best of blessings on this House, and all that shall hereafter inhabit it. May none but honest and wise men ever rule under this roof."

- 4. The full symbolism of the flag colors is as follows: red symbolizes hardiness and valor; white symbolizes purity and innocence; and blue represents vigilance, perseverance and justice.

Former Presidents Thomas Jefferson and John Adams were the last surviving members of the original signers of the Declaration of Independence, when on July 4, 1826 they both passed away within hours of each other. Pablo Messineo, one of the archaeologists at the scene, said: "We went there expecting to find two glyptodonts when the excavation started and then two more were found!"





Messineo added that the sizes indicate the group was comprised of two adults and two younglings.

He's Got A Funny Face, Antifreeze In His Blood, And Loves To Cuddle With Divers

The wolffish has the face only a mother could love, but these goofy looking fish are surprisingly affectionate.



Wolffish inhabit both the west and east coasts of the Atlantic Ocean. They are benthic dwellers, living on the hard ocean floor, frequently seen in nooks and small caves. They are usually found in water temperatures of -1 to 11 °C.

In order to resist freezing in their very cold habitat, wolffish produce natural antifreeze to keep their blood moving fluidly.


And that's not the only thing that makes these creatures so unique!

Unlike most fish species, which "broadcast spawn" (females release thousands of eggs into the water, and males compete to fertilize them externally), wolffish pair up and fertilize the female's eggs internally (much in the same way mammals mate). The female incubates the eggs for four to nine months (depending on the water temperature) before laying them in large clusters, which the male then aggressively protects for about four months until they hatch.

Divers often befriend their local wolffish because these deep sea monsters are the opposite of aggressive -- they're very affectionate!



"I helped her eat all her candy!"



A high school teacher in Alabama took a student to lunch after learning the teen had no one to support him at his graduation ceremony and has raised more than \$5,000 for his future.



Dominique Moore teaches at Bessemer City High School, which held its graduation ceremony on Thursday.

While cleaning up after the festivities ended, he noticed one of his graduates was still there, alone.

"I know his moods and I knew he wasn't himself," Moore said. "I asked him, 'Where are your people?' and he was like, 'Nobody's here'.'

Moore told him, "I expect big things from you and it's going to be okay."

Moore learned the student didn't have a ride home, so he offered him a ride and asked him if he wanted to grab lunch.

Moore said he fought back tears the entire lunch at Cheesecake Factory.

"Man, I couldn't imagine graduating high school and my folks not being there," he said, adding that he did not ask for details about why his family was not there.

"I didn't care," Moore said. "At that moment, I just wanted to celebrate him. It was an amazing time."

Moore posted about the incident on Facebook, something he normally doesn't do, because the situation did not sit well with him.

"These situations are common to me and I handle them

on my own," he said. "You don't always have to show everybody or tell everybody when you do something but this one just didn't sit well with me. I don't know what it was."

In the Facebook post, Moore added his Cash App – \$mooredaeducator – in case anyone wanted to be a "blessing" to the teen.

As of June 19, more than \$5,000 had poured in.

Moore, who has been driving the teen to and from his new job, hopes to use the money to gift him his own car.

Moore even helped him open up a checking account.

"He is out done at the out pour of support you all are showing," Moore wrote in a follow-up post. "I let him read every comment and post you all posted!!!! I told him ain't no crying in my whip lil homie!!!!! For real I was about to, can't Let them see me like that."

Moore added that college is in the future, but housing and transportation is of more importance right now.

"We take people and life for granted," Moore concluded. "Even though we have bad, in this moment it shows that mankind is good."

She Was Laid Off. So, She Became The 'Lasagna Lady' Serving Thousands Of Free Meals To Those In Need

What started out as a silly comment on a social media site about lasagna has turned into a community truly paying it forward.

After Michelle Brenner was furloughed from her job at a menswear store in Gig Harbor, Wash, she decided to make herself a huge pan of lasagna. Then she got on her community Facebook



page and wrote that frozen, store-bought lasagna could not compare to the real Italian homemade deal.

She followed up with an offer: "If any of you want some fresh homemade, no calorie counting lasagna, please let me know and I will gladly prepare it."

Brenner set aside her \$1,200 stimulus check to buy ingredients, and the requests began to trickle in. First from a retired neighbor, then an out-of-work friend. Soon, many people started showing up, including strangers.

Nearly three months and more than 1,000 pans later, Brenner is still at it. About eight hours a day, seven days a week, she helps feed people in her community from hospital workers and first responders to single parents struggling without paychecks.

"The world as we know it is falling apart, but my two little hands are capable of making a difference," she said. "I can't change the world, but I can make lasagna."

To help pay for ingredients, Brenner launched an online fundraiser that quickly reached her \$10,000 goal.

To date, people have contributed more than \$22,000.

"This is nothing less than a blessing, miracle and true journey," she wrote in an update. "My goal which has now changed is to raise a total of \$20,000 which will provide over 1,000 made fresh daily, homemade lasagna meals to the families of this great community and the essential workers who are leading our community to a better place.

To date some of the essential workers who have enjoyed some homemade lasagna include, law enforcement, fire departments, medical staff, grocery retailers, military, senior homes etc. We truly have made a difference and I am sure we will continue to do so! It is with great pleasure that I hope you will continue to join me on this great journey and be apart of something so great at a time that we are all so uncertain. When the Dog Days of Summer arrive, it's time to do those memorable summer time activities, that help us to keep our cool. They include:



A School Librarian Is Using Drones To Deliver Books To Kids All Summer

A middle-school librarian in Virginia has found a way to ensure kids can still rent books during a time when libraries are closed to the public.

She's delivering them by drone.



Kelly Passek was one of the first customers of a drone delivery service launched in Christiansburg, Va., last year by Wing. After seeing how quickly her household items were delivered, she petitioned the company to take on library books, too.

She asked the school's superintendent, Mark Miear, who was "immediately on board."

"Montgomery County Public Schools will be the first public school system in the world to use Wing to deliver library books to our students," Passek said. "We are thrilled for this opportunity to have a really unique way to deliver resources to our students and do it practically on demand."

Passek coordinates the delivery process with Wing. Students can request to take out library books using an online form. Passek then packs the books up in special delivery boxes, then drops them off at Wing, which handles the deliveries.

"Our libraries are essential and unique parts of our community and it is extremely important for our students to continue to have access to the resources that are here in our libraries in order to guarantee their success," Passek said.

Now, students in Montgomery County can choose from the library's more than 150,000 titles, and have their

books delivered right to their front yard.







Worn on both wrists, the intelligent device is expected to retail for £89 (\$112) with the patent currently pending.

It uses position-sending technology algorithms to distinguish between predicted face touching and other hand motions. A vibration on the device then alerts the user to hand gestures that are dangerously near the face.

"We came up with the concept a few years ago when my family was repeatedly catching cold and flu viruses from traveling in and out of London and I could see how easy it was to pick up germs—especially from using public transport," said Max.

"It was only when the World Health Organization began urging people to avoid touching their eyes, nose and face to stop the spread of the virus from contaminated surfaces, did I realize that it could make a real difference in slowing the transmission of coronavirus."

Max, who is from Bristol, launched a £60,000 (\$75,000) crowdfunding campaign on Kickstarter earlier this week to further his project and turn the prototype into a public reality.

"The main priority of this project is not to make money, but to get it onto the wrists of those it can help keep safe," he added. "Any profits made from early sales via the crowdfunding site will be reinvested into providing free devices to organizations that help people such as NHS staff and nursing homes.

"I believe that this device can make a real difference in the fight against coronavirus and I'm determined to do all that I can to bring it to market.

"I really hope that the general public can see the potential and are inspired to get behind the campaign to fund the next stage of the development.

Available in a choice of two colors, VybPro is rechargeable, splash-resistant, and made from waterproof silicon. It can also easily be turned off when eating and drinking.
