Joseph Priestley and the Discovery of Oxygen



Some 2,500 years ago, the ancient Greeks identified air — along with earth, fire and water — as one of the four elemental components of creation. That notion may seem charmingly primitive now. But it made excellent sense at the time, and there was so little reason to dispute it that the idea persisted until the late 18th century. It might have endured even longer had it not been for a free-thinking English chemist and maverick theologian named Joseph Priestley.

Priestley (1733-1804) was hugely productive in research and widely notorious in philosophy. He invented carbonated water and the rubber eraser, identified a dozen key chemical compounds, and wrote an important early paper about electricity. His unorthodox religious writings and his support for the American and French revolutions so enraged his countrymen that he was forced to flee England in 1794. He set-

tled in Pennsylvania, where he continued his research until his death.

The world recalls Priestley best as the man who discovered oxygen, the active ingredient in our planet's atmosphere. In the process, he helped dethrone an idea that dominated science for 23 uninterrupted centuries: Few concepts "have laid firmer hold upon the mind," he wrote, than that air "is a simple elementary substance, indestructible and unalterable."

In a series of experiments culminating in 1774, Priestley found that "air is not an elementary substance, but a composition," or mixture, of gases. Among them was the colorless and highly reactive gas he called "dephlogisticated air," to which the great French chemist Antoine Lavoisier would soon give the name "oxygen."

It is hard to overstate the importance of Priestley's revelation. Scientists now recognize 92 naturally occurring elements-including nitrogen and oxygen, the main components of air. They comprise 78 and 21 percent of the atmosphere, respectively.

On August 1, 1774, he conducted his most famous experiment. Using a 12-inch-wide glass "burning lens," he focused sunlight on a lump of reddish mercuric oxide in an inverted glass container placed in a pool of mercury. The gas emitted, he found, was "five or six times as good as common air." In succeeding tests, it caused a flame to burn intensely and kept a mouse alive about four times as long as a similar quantity of air.

Priestley called his discovery "dephlogisticated air" on the theory that it supported combustion so well because it had no phlogiston in it, and hence could absorb the maximum amount during burning. (The year before, Swedish apothecary Carl Wilhelm Scheele isolated the same gas and observed a similar reaction. Scheele called his material "fire air." But his findings were not published until 1777.)

Whatever the gas was called, its effects were remarkable. "The feeling of it in my lungs," Priestley wrote, "was not sensibly different from that of common air, but I fancied that my breast felt peculiarly light and easy for some time afterwards. Who can tell but that in time, this pure air may become a fashionable article in luxury. Hitherto only two mice and myself have had the privilege of breathing it."





13 Interesting Facts About Giant Pandas

When we think of giant pandas, we think of lovely black and white bears. They are cute and have many fans all over the world. But do you really know pandas? The following are 13 fascinating facts to help you know more about them.

Lynne Buddin, a three-time traveler with China Highlights, is a panda lover who knows pandas first hand, and is the main contributor below...



1. A giant panda is much bigger than your teddy bear.

Giant panda looks cuddly and cute when you search photos on the internet. But it's much bigger than you think. An adult panda weight more than 45 kilos (100 pounds), and can be about 1.5 meters (5 feet) long!


2. Giant pandas are good at climbing trees and can also swim.

Giant pandas can't stand and do kung fu moves like Po in Kungfu Panda. But they are good tree climbers. They can climb trees from 7 months old. Giant pandas are bears, and like other bears, they can swim.


3. Pandas go from pink to white and black (or brown).

Pandas are born looking like baby badgers — fur-less, pink, and blind. The iconic black and white colour comes later, after about three weeks. Not all giant pandas are black and white! A few are brown and white, but these are very rare.











4. Pandas have so many fans because they look cute.

"The looks of a teddy bear" are what makes pandas so popular. Pandas appeal to our "cuteness receptors" because they have large, front-facing eyes, and are extremely furry, so we therefore think of them as cuddly and cute. This was the subject of a recent BBC1 study by scientist Gordon Buchanan, and this is why almost all of us like pandas.

5. Pandas are "lazy" — eating and sleeping make their day.

As about all a panda does all day is eat and sleep, you are best to get up early for a visit to a panda park, so you see them when they are active. One reason for pandas being rare is that breeding is not high on their list of priorities. And with only a one-day window a year for a female to conceive naturally, it is hardly surprising that pandas are an endangered species.



Giant pandas' diets are 99% bamboo.

6. An adult can eat 12–38 kilos of bamboo per day!

A 45-kilo adult (and pandas can reach 150 kg in captivity) spends as long as 14 hours eating. And it can eat 12 to 38 kilos of bamboo a day. Pandas' favorite food is bamboo shoots. If you do the Panda Keeper Tour, which I can personally recommend, you too can eat bamboo, although what you eat will be cooked for you first.

7. A panda Can Poop 28 Kilos per day!

Pandas can poop as much as 28 kilos/day. In the past the undigested bamboo pieces in the poop were made into picture frames and bookmarks



— no, apparently they did not smell! Panda's poop points in their direction of travel, so they can be easily tracked in the wild. Unfortunately, historically this led to them being more endangered, but now it aids researchers.

8. Pandas have carnivorous teeth, but they eat bamboo and fruit.

Since giant predators like sabre-tooth tigers are no longer around, pandas didn't need to be as fast, and turned into vegetarian specialists to



avoid becoming extinct themselves. We all know them as eating only bamboo, but they like some fruit too, and can eat meat. One panda park we visited had a photo of a panda devouring a vulture. Although they still have sharp teeth and the digestive tract of carnivores, they don't have the energy to chase anything, so their prey would virtually have to land in their lap, or be injured and too slow to escape.

9. You can see panda babies in August.

Pandas are usually born in August, because the panda's mating months are March to May and gestation is 3 to 5 months. Females mainly produce two offspring, but only the stronger



one survives in the wild. In the research bases in Chengdu, the other twin is hand-reared, and swapped regularly with the mother so she can raise two cubs each pregnancy. Some of the money you pay in entrance fees funds this successful project.

10. Prehistoric pandas lived up to 2 million years ago.

Fossils of pandas have been dated between 1 and 2 million years old. Once pandas were widely distributed across the whole of China. Now they only live in the wild in remote areas of China's Tibetan foothills.

11. Pandas have 6 toes to grasp bamboo.

Pandas have a 6th "digit" on the heels of their fore-paws. With their extra "thumbs" they can manoeuvre the bamboo into fat cigar shapes for efficient eating.



12. Strange behavior! Pandas like to lick copper and iron.

"Pandas are said to have a predilection for copper and iron. They really seem to enjoy licking every scrap of food from their metal bowls, even turning the bowl in their two dexterous paws. An ancient reputation as a licker and eater of copper and iron came from a liking for dishes or cooking pots in dwellings of Chinese peasants."

Imagine you were living in a remote mountain dwelling, and the first time you see a giant panda, with claws and teeth as big as your fingers, is when it has come to your house to eat... You'd probably be terrified and let it lick your pots!

Another strange behaviour, but with a modern twist, we witnessed, is them enjoying "fruit lollipops" — fruit frozen in a metal dish of water to cool them down in

13. The only panda in the West — Chi Chi in London


Panda Chi Chi in the 1960s in London Zoo Chi Chi the giant panda lived in London Zoo from 1958 to 1972. She was bought for £12,000 (now pandas are rented for up to a million dollars a year!). I remember going to see this panda as a child. That's probably when




my love for them started. That, and a panda teddy that was as big as me! Once the most famous panda was the one on the WWF logo (still World Wildlife Fund in the US and Canada, or World Wide Fund for Nature elsewhere), which you may not know was designed after Chi Chi, the only panda in the West in 1966, when the logo was founded. All giant panda cubs born in captivity to foreign zoos, when lent out, are the property of the Chinese Government and have to be returned.

Visiting Doctor Rescues Drowning Boy At Hotel Pool

A New York doctor who was in the "right place at the right time" revived a 3-year-old boy who was drowning at a hotel pool in New Jersey, police said.



Dr. John Blundell was staying at the Courtyard by Marriott in Montvale when he witnessed an unresponsive boy pulled from the hotel's pool.

Dr. Blundell performed CPR and revived the child prior to first responders arriving, Montvale Police Chief Joseph Sanfilippo said.

A Montvale officer was less than a minute away when he was dispatched to the hotel. The officer administered oxygen to the boy.

The child was rushed to Valley Hospital in Ridgewood, where he was treated and released.

"[It is] incredibly fortunate that the doctor... was in the right place at the right time," Sanfilippo said.

Ryan Reynolds is hoping a "no questions asked" monetary reward will inspire a thief to return a teddy bear that contained a final voice message from a woman's mother who recently passed away.

Vancouver resident Mara Soriano says she was unloading a uHaul truck while moving into the city's west end on Friday when a black Herschel backpack she had placed beside the truck was picked up and stolen.



While the backpack

contained several important and expensive items - including passports and an iPad pro - the most treasured item now missing is "a super sentimental" Build-A-Bear.

The bear contained a final message Soriano's mother recorded shortly before she passed away from cancer last year.



The message says: "I love you, I' m proud of you, I'll always be with you."

"It was the last thing I have of hers," Soriano said. "I can replace everything else, but not that."

A reporter for CBC in Vancouver came across the social media post by Soriano and shared her story to Twitter

with a photo of the missing bear.

"If you see this missing bear in the west end please email Deborah.Goble@cbc.ca . It was in a herschel back pack when stolen along with an iPad. Mara, the owner says it has her mom's voice inside saying, 'I love you I'm proud of you, I'll always be with you. Her mom died last year."

Reynolds, who was born in Vancouver, retweeted the post, commenting, "\$5,000 to anyone who returns this bear to Mara. Zero questions asked. I think we all need this bear to come home."

Soriano told Vancouver is Awesome she is "absolutely floored by the attention" her story is receiving. "I'm just overwhelmed and completely in shock. There have been so many negative news articles from Vancouver lately and seeing everyone come together so positively like this after such a devastating situation is so heartwarming and brings us so much hope we'll get Mamabear back."

Kali: After jokingly threatening my little 6-year-old boy with sticks and coal for Christmas, he told me "We'll, I can still use those for something." I love his optimism.


Michelle: "Why do they call them waiters when we are the ones who wait?"

Felicia: Right after my 2nd child my first son would go around telling people he had heartburn!


Lori: Oh my, way too many to pick just one. The one thing he's said to me the most since he was 2 is "your old and warm!" This is usually when he's snuggling with me.

6 weird things that have happened in August through history

When was oxygen discovered? How did King William II die? And when was the first Guinness World Book of Records published? As the eighth month gets under way, we look back at some of the strangest and most surprising things that have happened in August through history

1 - 2 August 1100: King William II is killed by an arrow in mysterious circumstances

While hunting in the New Forest in 1100, William II (Rufus) was shot and killed by an arrow fired by nobleman Walter Tirel. The incident was at the time recorded as an accident. However, it has since been suggested that it could have been an assassination.

According to chronicler Orderic Vitalis, before the hunting party set off the king was presented with a letter from the Abbot of Gloucester, warning William II of a vision that a monk had had of the king's death. However, the king dismissed the letter and began the hunt.

During the hunt, nobleman Walter Tirel took a shot at a stag, yet the arrow missed and hit the king in the chest. Tirel fled the scene almost immediately to France. Learning of the king's death, William's brother, Henry, rode to Winchester to proclaim himself king. It is possible that Henry had planned for his brother's murder in order to gain the throne, yet this is disputed among scholars.

2 - 1 August 1774: Joseph Priestley discovers oxygen

While employed as the tutor of the children of William Petty, 2nd Earl of Shelburne, British minister and chemist Joseph Priestley discovered the gas oxygen.

After experimenting with different 'airs', Priestley conducted an experiment that would make his scientific

work famous. By using what was referred to as a 'burning lens', he placed a lump of mercuric oxide in a glass container and focused some sunlight onto the compound. A colourless gas was emitted and a candle began to burn. To begin with, Priestley called this 'dephlogisticated air', before further tests confirmed the discovery of oxygen.

3 - 31 August 1897: Thomas Edison secures a patent for his kinetograph

After first developing it in the early 1890s, Thomas Edison secured a patent for the kinetograph, a camera that could record film footage. His camera was based on work completed by French still-photograph pioneers Joseph Nicéphore Niépce and Louis Daguerre, but unlike previous cameras Edison used celluloid film in the kinetograph. After building a small film studio in 1893, Edison was able to capture footage and create films. One of his first was of three of his employees acting as blacksmiths.

In 1897 Edison sued American Mutoscope and Biograph Pictures, after he claimed the company had transgressed on the patent for his kinetograph.

4 - 20 August 1911: The first telegram is sent around the world in just 16.5 minutes

The first telegram was sent from the New York Times office in order to discover how long it would take for a message to cross the world by telegraph cable. The message, which travelled more than 28,000 miles, simply read "This message sent around the world".

After being transferred by 16 operators across the globe, including those in San Francisco, Saigon and the Azores, the reply to the message was received by the New York Times office just 16.5 minutes after being

sent. This made the telegram the fastest message to be sent by a commercial cablegram since the Commercial Cable Company first launched the Pacific cable in 1900.

5 - 21 August 1911: The Mona Lisa is stolen in France

Leonardo da Vinci's famous painting was stolen from the Louvre in Paris on this day in 1911. Italian handyman Vincenzo Peruggia decided to steal the 16thcentury painting after being employed by the Louvre to construct protective glass cases for some of the museum's most famous works, which included the Mona Lisa.

After spending the night in a closet, Peruggia was able to remove the painting with ease, hide it under his clothes and leave the building – he was let out by a plumber after finding the doors were locked.

The painting was not reported missing until 24 hours later. After this, the newspapers were filled with stories about the stolen masterpiece. It was not until two years later, December 1913, that the painting was finally recovered. Peruggia received a seven-month jail sentence.

6 - 27 August 1955: The Guinness Book of World Records is published

The first edition of The Guinness Book of Records was published on 27 August 1955, and printed 50,000 copies in its first year. By Christmas 1955 the book had become a bestseller in the United Kingdom.

Sir Hugh Beaver, the managing director of the Guinness Brewery, first came up with the idea of the book of records in the early 1950s following an argument at a shooting party about the fastest game bird in Europe.

Twins Norris and Ross McWhirter were invited by Beaver to research and write the book, which took 13-and-a-half straight weeks to write. The first edition of the records was drafted and then published in 1955.

But shrugs it off knowing it's me she's dealing with (I've caused similar problems like this before), takes my second book and puts it on her desk, and makes me read my part.

Now my friend that sat two chairs down from me was also reading Artemis at the same time as me and with a quick look to him he knew exactly what I was planning. He took it out and passed it over without hesitation. I opened to a random spot and just pretended like I was

reading. (At this point it was just to mess with my teacher.)

So skip forward again and my teacher sees me with the book again and says, "How many of those do you have?" I gave my smartmouth remark as "enough." She took away that book, too. But now at this point I was out of books, and the rest of my class knew it. But the teacher didn't know I was out. So she continued with her lesson and another friend of mine took two of her books and switched out two of the Artemis books on her desk to make them look like they were still there.

He passed the books slowly around the room, one at a time, until they were back to me. Then I took one out, opened to a random spot and just kept it open, waiting to get caught. I silently signaled to a few people in class and they started laughing. The teacher looked at what they were laughing at and saw me with yet another book. From Pizza to Fresh Vegetables, When You're in The Bronx, You're Going to Get Fed By This Generous Community

You will not go hungry in the Bronx. New York City's northernmost borough is home to 1.4 million people—and it's the most racially diverse place in the country, according to the U.S. Census. But if there's one thing that brings people together, it's pizza—and pizza was the unifier for families in Riverdale, who started bringing hundreds of the famous pies to strangers throughout New York's quarantine.

In early March, Aliza Abrams Konig pre-ordered 30 pizzas for a party set to celebrate the Jewish holiday Purim at her synagogue. They've always gotten a good turnout, and Konig expected the same this year. Then COVID-19 hit. New Rochelle, a neighboring town, saw one of the first cases reported in the city, where more than 20,000 people would die of the disease over the next few months. As soon as it became clear what was happening, the whole community quarantined, trying to limit spread. The Purim party was canceled.

But Konig picked up the 30 pizzas from the Cafeccino Bakery anyway, and she and seven volunteers delivered them to quarantined congregants.

"The families, especially the children, appreciated seeing our faces," Konig told Reader's Digest.

From that cancelled party, the Pizza Brigade was born. Volunteers kept up the pizza deliveries, at no charge to the families, once a week until their quarantine was over. In total, they fed more than 100 families. And not just pizza. The brigade, in partnership with bakery owner Lukasz Babiuch, started weekly deliveries of challah, the bread many Jews eat every week on the Sabbath.
