Fun Facts About Friendship Day

Winnie the Pooh was named as the official Ambassador for Friendship to the World in 1997 by the United Nations.

There are other types of friendship celebrations during the year including February as friendship month as well as a new friend's week and an old friend's week.

Liechtenstein



If Liechtenstein didn't exist, someone would have invented it. A tiny mountain principality governed by an iron-willed monarch in the heart of 21st-century Europe, it certainly has novelty value. Only 25km long by 12km wide (at its broadest point) – just larger than Manhattan – Liechtenstein doesn't have an international airport, and access from Switzerland is by local bus. However, the country is a rich banking state and, we are told, the world's largest exporter of false teeth.

Liechtensteiners sing German lyrics to the tune of God Save the Queen in their national anthem and they sure hope the Lord preserves their royals. Head of state Prince Hans Adam II and his son, Crown Prince Alois, have constitutional powers unmatched in modern Europe but most locals accept this situation gladly, as their monarchs' business nous and, perhaps also, tourist appeal, help keep this landlocked sliver of a micronation extremely prosperous.

Most come to Liechtenstein just to say they've been, and tour buses disgorge daytrippers in search of souvenir passport stamps. If you're going to make the effort to come this way, however, it's pointless not to venture further, even briefly. With friendly locals and magnificent views, the place comes into its own away from soulless Vaduz.

In fact, the more you read about Fürstentum Liechtenstein (FL) the easier it is to see it as the model for Ruritania – the mythical kingdom conjured up in fiction as diverse as **The Prisoner of Zenda** and Evelyn Waugh's **Vile Bodies**.

History

Austrian prince Johann Adam Von Liechtenstein purchased the counties of Schellenberg (1699) and Vaduz (1712) from impoverished German nobles and gave them his name. Long a principality under the Holy Roman Empire, Liechtenstein gained independence in 1866. In 1923, it formed a customs union with Switzerland.

Even then, none of the ruling Liechtensteins had bothered to leave their Viennese palace to see their acquisitions. It wasn't until 1938, in the wake of the Anschluss (Nazi Germany's takeover of Austria) that Prince Franz Josef II became the first monarch to live in the principality, when he and his much-loved wife, Gina, began transforming a poor rural nation into today's rich banking state. Their son, Prince Hans Adam II, ascended the throne on the prince's death in 1989.

The Liechtenstein clan lost considerable territories and possessions (including various castles and palaces) in Poland and the then Czechoslovakia after WWII, when the authorities of those countries seized them. The family has been trying, unsuccessfully, to recover these possessions in international courts e ver since. The country's use of the Swiss franc encourages people to see it as a mere extension of its neighbour, but

Liechtenstein has very different foreign policies, having joined the UN and the European Economic Area (EEA) relatively early, in 1990 and 1995 respectively.

Known as a tax haven, the principality banned customers from banking money anonymously in 2000. However, it remains under pressure (mainly from the European Union) to introduce m ore reforms.

In 2003, Hans Adam won sweeping powers to dismiss the elected government, appoint judges and reject proposed laws. The following year, he handed the day-today running of the country to his s on Alois.

Orientation

Liechtenstein feels small because two-thirds is mountainous. A thin plain – the basin of the River Rhine separating Liechtenstein from Switzerland – runs down the country's western edge. The main north—south thoroughfare follows this.

The plain is wider and lower in the north, an area called Unterland (lowland), while the south is described as the Oberland (highland). The country's highest point is Grauspitz (2599m), on the southern border w ith Switzerland.

NATIONAL DOLLAR DAY



National Dollar Day on August 8th commemorates the day Congress established the U.S. monetary system in 1786.

In 1862, the United States printed its first dollar bill. Do you know whose face was printed there? It wasn't George Washington. The first dollar bill featured Salmon P. Chase, President Lincoln's Secretary of Treasury.

More Dollar Facts

Interestingly, the dollar bill in our pockets today hasn't been changed for more than 50 years. While the \$5, \$10, \$20, and \$50 earned redesigns in recent years, the single remains unchanged. Due to counterfeiting, redesigns keep the larger currencies ahead of counterfeiters. However, the single doesn't face attention the more significant notes see.

Above the right number 1 on the face side of the dollar, a tiny bird peeks out. Whether it's an owl, an eagle or another such bird is uncertain. Like other embedded items in the bill's design, it fuels many conspiracy theories.

Speaking of conspiracy theories, the pyramid on the back fuels a few. It's part of the Great Seal of the United States. However, the truth of the pyramid represents several things. You'll find 13 steps on the pyramid equaling the 13 original colonies. The unfinished top represents a young country growing and expanding. Finally, the Eye of Providence includes the Latin motto Annuit Coeptis, which means, "It is favorable to our undertakings."

The number 13 is represented on the dollar bill in several places. Do you know where else?

Opposite the pyramid is an eagle. The image represents both war and peace. In the eagle's left talon it holds arrows and in its right an olive branch. How many arrows do you think the eagle holds? If you guessed 13, you'd be right.

Above the eagle's head, there is a cloud with a constellation. How many stars are in the constellation? Again the number 13 is represented. The eagle includes a shield 13 stripes, too.

The Great Emu War

Simply Bored

Devil's Promenade & the Hornet Spook Light

Bobbing and bouncing along a dirt road in northeast Oklahoma is the Hornet Spook Light, a paranormal enigma for more than a century. Described most often as an orange ball of light, the orb travels from east to west along a four-mile gravel road, long called the Devil's Promenade by area locals.

The Spook Light, often referred to as the Joplin Spook Light or the Tri-State Spook Light is actually in Oklahoma near the small town of Quapaw. However, it is most often seen from the east, which is why it has been "attached" to the tiny hamlet of Hornet, Missouri and the larger better-known town of Joplin.

According to the legend, the spook light was first seen by Indians along the infamous Trail of Tears in 1836; however, the first "official" report occurred in 1881 in a publication called the Ozark Spook Light.

The ball of fire, described as varying from the size of a baseball to a basketball, dances and spins down the center of the road at high speeds, rising and hovering above the treetops, before it retreats and disappears. Others have said it sways from side to side, like a lantern being carried by some invisible force. In any event, the orange fire-like ball has reportedly been appearing nightly for well over a 100 years. According to locals, the best time to view the spook light is between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and midnight and tends to shy away from large groups and loud sounds.

Though many paranormal and scientific investigators have studied the light, including the Army Corps of Engineers, no one has been able to provide a conclusive answer as to the origin of the light.

Many explanations have been presented over the years including escaping natural gas, reflecting car lights and billboards, and will-o'-the-wisps, a luminescence created by rotting organic matter. However, all of these explanations all fall short of being conclusive.

As to the theory of escaping natural gas, which is common in marshy areas, the Hornet Light is seemingly not

affected by wind or by rain, and how would it selfignite? The idea that it might be a will-o'-the-wisp is discounted, as this biological phenomenon does not display the intensity of the ball of light seen along the Devil's Promenade. Explanations of headlights or billboards are easily discarded, as the light was seen years before automobiles or billboards were made, and before a road even existed in the area.

One possible explanation that is not as easily discounted, but not yet proven conclusive, is that the lights are electrical atmospheric charges. In areas where rocks, deep below the earth's surface, are shifting and grinding, an electrical charge can be created. This area, lying on a fault line running east from New Madrid, Missouri, westward to Oklahoma was the site of four earthquakes during the eighteenth century. These types of electrical fields are most commonly associated with earthquakes.



Other interesting legends also abound about the light that provides a more ghostly explanation. The oldest is the story of a Quapaw Indian maiden who fell in love with a young brave. However, her father would not allow her to marry the man as he did not

have a large enough dowry. The pair eloped but were soon pursued by a party of warriors. According to the legend, when the couple was close to being apprehended, they joined hands above the Spring River and leaped to their deaths. It was shortly after this event, that the light began to appear and was attributed to the spirits of the young lovers.

Another legend tells of a miner whose cabin was attacked by Indians while he was away. Upon his return, he found his wife and children missing and is said to continue looking for them along the old road, searching with his lantern.

Others say the Spook Light is the ghost of an Osage Indian chief who was decapitated in the area and continues to search for his lost head, with a lantern held high in his hand.

Sightings of the Spook Light are common, sometimes even reported to be seen inside vehicles. A few people, who have been walking along the road at night, have even claimed to have felt the heat of the ball as it passed near them.

Reportedly, the moving anomaly, growing brighter and dimmer, larger and smaller, can be seen approximately

12 miles southwest of Joplin, Missouri. To get to Devil's Promenade Road, take Interstate 44 west from Joplin but before you reach the Oklahoma border, take the next to the last Missouri exit onto Star Route 43. Traveling south for about four miles, you will reach a crossroads which is Devil's Promenade Road.

Reader's Story from Hornet, Missouri

I was doing some walking down memory lane this evening and came across your website about the old Hornet Spook Light. Your site seems to be one of the few that is updated, and I thought I would share my story of the Spook Light.

My dad was born in Seneca, near Hornet and Joplin. In fact, our family cemetery is in Hornet – generations of folks who lived and died on the prairie. It is a really amazing place. My dad is something of an adventurer, and I think he got that from his mom. She would tell us amazing and hilarious stories of cows jumping through the barn window, the wagon turning over and dumping everyone out on their way to church, and of surviving countless tornadoes in "tornado alley."

I remember my grandmother telling her story of the Spook Light. It seems that when she was in high school, it was common for buses to take tourists – and locals – to see the light.

The night she went they had a truly close encounter. It seems the light not only appeared, but actually came down the road toward their bus, rested on the hood, and then burst into a bright, blinding light and vanished. I don't know if she ever went again. I heard the story many times and she never changed or embellished it. She was in her 80's when she died about 15 years ago, so it was a very long time ago when she had her encounter.

My dad, as I said, is also an adventurer, and until I married, we would all vacation every year in that section of Missouri, visiting the family and exploring every little road and interesting spot on the map. I've explored countless deserted cabins and been through just about every little museum in the area. So, of course, one night we had to see the Spook Light.

I don't remember exactly how old I was, but I know I was in high school, so that would have been the late 70's, early 80's. It was late when we got there, and I only saw a few cars in the area. Dad parked and we waited. Yes, it showed up. I've read the explanations of the light...and some very reputable and determined people claim it's cars on the highway. What I saw was certainly NOT headlights. We watched a car drive down the road toward the light. The light was above the car as it passed under it – and the light was brighter and larger than the tail lights receding in the distance – so I don't see that headlights even farther away could appear that large, even if you could logically assume that the light was above the car, because the highway was higher than the road...I understand all of that.

What happened next convinced me that it was not headlights. The large light split into two smaller lights – and yes, looked like headlights. So, I assumed it was just that and was somewhat disappointed...until the lights moved into a vertical position, held that position for several seconds, then moved back to a horizontal location, joined, and vanished. If a car could have accomplished that feat, that meant it had somehow driven in a traditional way, then on its side, then righted itself and managed to blend its headlights into one bright light and vanish.

I wasn't a child – I was at least 16 years old. I know what I saw and I've never seen anything like it since. I have no explanation for it. I believe I saw the Spook Light. I don't believe it was an alien or ghost; I am convinced there is a logical scientific reason behind it. But whatever it is, it certainly wasn't headlights that night! Perhaps other sightings can be attributed to headlights, but not that summer night 30 years ago!

My dad wants to take my sister and our families back to the old family farm one more time – my daughter, niece and nephew have never been to Missouri. I'm planning to ask for an evening at the Spook Light. Maybe we'll get lucky and pass the mystery on to the next generation!

A Reader's Story About the Spooklight in Oklahoma

My name is Jackie and I grow up in Quapaw, Oklahoma, attending grade school and high school through the 10th grade before we moved. My father grew up with the light and I would have to say I saw the Spook Light at least 175 times or more during the time that I lived there in the 1960s.

There used to be an old bar near Spook Light Road where my dad would take us when we had company from out of town. We kids loved to go there, play pool, and listen to the old man who owned the bar tell us stories about the light. Often we would sit outside on the car to watch for the Spook Light. We had to be real quiet or it would not come out. As we watched, all of a sudden it would appear at the other end of the road. My dad would leave his lights out and try to creep up on it, but always, by the time we got near the light, it would suddenly be behind us.

It was a regular tradition that our family would attend the Indian pow-wows on every 4th of July holiday. On one of these occasions, after we left the pow-wow, we went to my Aunt's house, which was just right off Spook Light Road. As we were drying there about 10:00 p.m., a light came up behind us weaving back and forth across the road like a drunk. My mom insisted that we pull over and let the car pass; however, as soon as we did, the light took off across the land.

I have seen it with a big white light with a small green one below it, as well as it sometimes appearing as a red or yellow-orange colored orb. I believe, at one time Readers Digest came out with a story on it in the late 1950s or early 1960s. On another occasion my father took me and all our friends out into the country where we had such a bizarre experience, it would make you believe almost anything. At this place, there was a fence upon the land where an Indian and his wife were said to have been killed by a white man. According to the legend, the Indian stated before he died that he and his wife would always be around. At the fence, dad had us hold our hands out with a piece of bread over the fence. 13


Suddenly, we would feel something taking the bread from our hands. Even with a flashlight, you could see that one second it was there, and the next, the bread was gone. This was very scary to me at the time.

When I grew older, my dates always took me to Spook Light Road and along the way we would cross the Spring River Bridge, its wooden structure rocking side to side so badly, that I was frightened before we ever reached Spook Light Road. I always saw the light appear near Quapaw, Oklahoma.

I don't know if it is the same now like it was back then, so I will be making plans to go home to Quapaw, Oklahoma to see it again. My Aunt Mary, who was raised with me will go with me. It should be fun as we talk about our old stories and try to find the light again.

"I'll have the same," says the ostrich.


A short time later, the waitress returns with their order. "That will be \$6.40 please," and the man reaches into his pocket and pulls out the exact change for payment.



About half of America's states owe their names to Native American origin: Here's how each state got its name

You can practically glean the history of America in the names of all 50 states.

The story of the United States begins in the East and the South and is reflected in the origin of the names of the states. In the East and South, many states owe their monikers to our forebears from England, France, and Spain. These states include New York, Vermont, and Florida.

Another influence from the earliest time in our history is Native American culture, apparent in several state names. It is also apparent in many city names. There are a lot of obscure places with strange names that people have a hard time with – like these 50 town names most people will struggle to pronounce.



Native American place names figure prominently as we move westward, in states such as Arkansas, Oklahoma, Minnesota, and North and South Dakota. About half of America's states owe their names to Native American origin. Names with Spanish origins can be found in the West, including Colorado, New Mexico and California. Hawaii and Alaska's names are derived from words describing the lands in the language of the native people who inhabited those areas before the arrival of Europeans.

To compile a list of how the states got their names, 24/7 Tempo reviewed information from state websites and online resources.

Alabama

• Joined United States: Dec. 14, 1819 (22nd state to join)

Capital: MontgomeryPopulation: 4,888,949

•

The genesis of the Alabama name is believed to have come from a fusion of two Choctaw words, Alba and Amo. Alba means "vegetation," while Amo refers to "gatherer." The name "vegetation gatherers" would fit the Alabama Indians who cleared the land for farming.

Alaska

• Joined United States: Jan. 3, 1959 (49th state to join)

• Capital: Juneau

• **Population:** 738,068

The name "Alaska" comes from the Aleut word "Alyeska" which means "great land." The Aleuts are the indigenous people of the Aleutian Islands and western Alaska.

Arizona

• **Joined United States:** Feb. 14, 1912 (48th state to join)

Capital: PhoenixPopulation: 7,123,898

It is not clear how Arizona got its name. Historian James H. McClintock believes the name was derived from a Native American place name that sounded like Aleh-zon or Ali-Shonak, which meant "small spring" or "place of the small spring," according to the Southern Arizona Guide.

Arkansas

• Joined United States: June 15, 1836 (25th state to ioin)

Capital: Little RockPopulation: 3,020,327

The word "Arkansas" came from the Quapaw Native Americans. The Quapaws were known as the "people who live downstream," or Ugakhopag. "The Native Americans who spoke Algonquian and lived in the Ohio Valley called the Quapaws Arkansas, which means "south wind."

California

• **Joined United States:** Sept. 9, 1850 (31st state to join)

• Capital: Sacramento

• **Population:** 39,776,830

Credit the Spanish conquistadors for naming California. The name of the nation's largest state comes from Califia, a legendary queen of the island paradise described in a Spanish romance novel from the early 16th century.

Colorado

• Joined United States: Aug. 1, 1876 (38th state to join)

• Capital: Denver

• **Population:** 5,818,049

Another state whose name owes it origins to the Spanish is Colorado. The state's name means "colored red" or "color rojo" in Spanish. It was used for the Colorado River because of the abundance of red sandstone soil in the region.

Connecticut

• Joined United States: Jan. 9, 1788 (5th state to join)

Capital: HartfordPopulation: 3,588,683

The Dutch were the first Europeans to reach Connecticut in 1614. But there were already Native Americans in what would become the Nutmeg State. The name "Connecticut" is derived from the Algonquian word "quinnehtukqut" that means "beside the long tidal river."

Delaware

• Joined United States: Dec. 7, 1787 (1st state to join)

• Capital: Dover • Population: 971,180

Delaware, the first state to ratify the Constitution, owes its name to explorer Samuel Argall, who named the Delaware River and Bay for Virginia Gov. Thomas West, Lord De La Warr. The state takes its name from the river and bay.

Florida

• Joined United States: March 3, 1845 (27th state to join)

• Capital: Tallahassee

• **Population:** 21,312,211

Famed Spanish explorer Ponce de Leon may not have found the fountain of youth, but he is credited with naming Florida, as the first European to reach it. The region was named by de Leon in 1513 and it comes from the Spanish word "florido," which means "full of flowers."

Georgia

• Joined United States: Jan. 2, 1788 (4th state to join)

• Capital: Atlanta

• **Population:** 10,545,138

Georgia, founded by James Oglethorpe, was named for King George II of England, who granted the colony its charter in 1732. The –ia suffix means "state of" and comes from the Greek language.

Hawaii

• **Joined United States:** Aug. 21, 1959 (50th state to join)

• Capital: Honolulu

• **Population:** 1,426,393

There are several theories of how America's youngest state got its name. One theory maintains that "Hawai'i" is derived from the word "owhyhee," which means homeland in native Hawaiian. Another theory postulates that the name comes from a combination of the words "Hawa" and "ii" and means a small or new homeland. Still another belief is that the name originates from the Polynesian Hawaii Loa, who discovered the islands, according to an ancient local legend.

Idaho

• Joined United States: July 3, 1890 (43rd state to join)

• Capital: Boise

• **Population:** 1,753,860

Idaho, a state made famous in a B-52s song, may sound like a Native American name, but the word is made up. "Idaho" was created by mining lobbyist George M. Willing, who insisted it was a Native American Shoshone expression meaning "gem of the mountains" for the area around Pike's Peak. By the time it was discovered the name was phoney, it was already being used.
