01 On the Calendar

The name September comes from the Latin *septem*, meaning seven, since it was the seventh month



of the Roman calendar, which began with March. There are 30 days in the month of September, which starts on the same day of the week as December each year but does not end on the same day of the week as any other month in the year.

02 Birth Month

September has three birth flowers: the forget-me-not, the morning glory, and the aster. Forget-



me-nots represent love and memories, asters represent love as well, and the morning glory represents unrequited love. The birthstone for the month is the sapphire.

3 Holidays

September has several United States and international holidays.



Labor Day is

the most well known holiday in September. It is observed every year on the first Monday in September.

Native American Day is always celebrated on the 4th Friday of September.

Grandparent's Day is observed in the United States on the first Sunday after Labor Day.

Constitution Day, celebrating the ratification of the governing document of the United States, is observed on the 17th.

The autumn equinox, which is the traditional transition from summer into fall, takes place on or around September 22nd, depending on the year.

05 Historical Events

September 2, 1666: The Great Fire of London was started, completely destroying the old city located within the ancient Roman Walls. It was believed to have started in a bakery and took three days to put out.



September 1, 1715: Louis XIV, known as the Sun King, died at the age of 76, after ruling France since the age of five. He was succeeded by Louis XV and Louis XVI, who was executed during the French Revolution in 1789, thus ending the reign of monarchical rule in France.

September 5, 1774: The 1st Continental Congress was called to order. Comprised of delegates from all 13 American colonies, it served as the governing body during the American Revolution, from 1774 to 1789. Two years later, on September 9, it changed the name of the United Colonies to the United States.

September 22, 1862: President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, which ended slavery in the territories held by the Confederacy, effective January 1, 1863. In spite of the ruling, the Civil War would not end for another year and a half after that.

September 14, 1901: President William McKinley was shot on September 6, 1901 while attending the Buffalo Pan-American Exposition in New York. He passed away eight days later.

September 1, 1939: In the early morning hours of this day, Hitler invaded Poland, starting World War II in Europe. Der Führer called the move a "defensive" retaliation against the persecution of Germans in Poland.

September 5th, 1961: President John F. Kennedy signed a hijacking bill, making air piracy a federal crime. Punishment ranged from a \$10,000 fine to 20 years in prison; if a deadly weapon was used, the perpe-

trator(s) could receive life in prison or even death.

September 8, 1974: President Gerald Ford gave an unconditional pardon to former president Richard M. Nixon, for his role in the infamous "Watergate" fiasco.

September 9, 2006: Typhoon Ketsana hit the Philippines, China, Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and Thailand, resulting in 750 fatalities and over \$1.09 billion in damages.

06 9/11

On Tuesday morning, September 11, 2001, members of the Islamic terrorist group al-Qaeda hijacked four airliners as part of a series of coordinated attacks against targets in the United States. The Twin Towers in New York City were hit by one plane each, American Airlines Flight 11 and Flight 175, while American Airlines Flight 77 was crashed into the Pentagon in Washington, D.C. The fourth plane, United Airlines Flight 93, is thought to have been headed for the White House, but passengers overtook the hijackers and the plane crashed into a field in rural Pennsylvania.



More than 3,000 people lost their lives during what the deadliest terror attack on U.S. soil to date. Property and infrastructure damage amounted to over \$10 billion. The attack is thought to have been ordered by Osama bin Laden, who was finally located and killed in Pakistan by U.S. Navy SEAL Team Six in May 2011. The 9/11 Memorial Museum occupies the sites where the Twin Towers once stood.

BENNINGTON BATTLE DAY

The Battle of Bennington was a battle of the American Revolutionary War, part of the Saratoga campaign, that took place on August 16, 1777, in Walloomsac, New York, about 10 miles (16 km) from its namesake Bennington, Vermont.

A rebel force of 2,000 men, primarily New Hampshire and Massachusetts militiamen, led by General John Stark, and reinforced by Vermont militiamen led by Colonel Seth Warner and members of the Green Mountain Boys, decisively defeated a detachment of General John Burgoyne's army led by Lieutenant Colonel Friedrich Baum, and supported by additional men under Lieutenant Colonel Heinrich von Breymann.

Today, we celebrate the brave men that fought for freedom and unity in this brave little state we call Vermont!



Bennington Battle Day is a public holiday in Vermont, where it is a day off for the general population, and schools and most businesses are closed.

What Do People Do?

For many citizens in Vermont, Bennington Battle Day is a time to remember the Battle of Bennington, a battle that led to the turning point in the Revolutionary War in the 18th century. Each year, locals and visitors gather to observe the Bennington Battle Day celebrations in Bennington, Vermont.

Visitors and locals alike can ride an elevator to the top of the Bennington Monument for panoramic views of the valleys and the hills of Vermont, Massachusetts and New York. The stone monument, which is about 306 feet (about 93.3 meters) above the streets of Bennington, marks the site of a critical supply depot during the Revolutionary War.

Public Life

Bennington Battle Day is a state holiday so state government offices are closed in Vermont. Many state historic sites in Vermont are open and free to the public on August 16. Transit services, such as the Green Mountain Express bus service, operate during this holiday. However people planning to use transit services on this

day can check with local transit service providers in Vermont prior to travelling on this day.

Background

During the Revolutionary War in North America, Colonel Seth Warner and 350 of his Green Mountain Boys, a group of soldiers from Vermont, played a vital role in defeating the British forces that came to capture the American supply depot at Bennington, a town in southern Vermont near the New York border.


The anniversary of the fighting that took place along the Walloomsac River on August 16, 1777, is a legal holiday in Vermont, and a tower that is about 306 feet (about 93.3 meters) high has been erected in town of old Bennington, about two miles (about 3.2 kilometers) west of Bennington proper. A statue of Seth Warner stands nearby. Across the state border in New York's Rensselaer County, the Bennington Battlefield State Park includes the site where the heaviest fighting took place.

The Battle of Bennington is credited by many historians as the first victory for the United States. It was the first of a string of victories that finally forced the surrender of the British, and gave what is now known as the United States of America its heritage of independence and freedom.

Symbols

One of the most memorable icons in Vermont is a monument that towers at about 306 feet (about 93.3 meters) and symbolizes Bennington Battle Day. The limestone monument was recently vandalized with red spray paint graffiti. Local officials say it was most likely the first time the obelisk was vandalized since it was built in 1889.

Americans Are Crediting the COVID Crisis for Helping Them Become More Financially Responsible

Growing their own vegetables, switching to one-ply toilet paper and eating lots of leftovers—these are just a few ways people are pinching pennies during the COVID-19 pandemic, according to this new survey. Interestingly, over half of Americans polled credit the COVID-19 pandemic with finally teaching them how to be smart with their money.

In fact, a similar survey from two years ago shows that the number of US adults who feel very smart with their money has actually risen from just 42% in 2018 to 51% in 2020.

Another two in three participants said the pandemic has turned them into a frugal person.

The polls of 2,000 Americans, both conducted by OnePoll on behalf of Slickdeals, looked into how the pandemic has changed people's mindsets about their money and how they define being "cheap" versus being "frugal."

The latest survey was meant to mirror the one run in 2018 as a means of comparing just how much the results have changed over the course of two years and a global pandemic.

Tipping the minimum (15–20%) regardless of service was found to be by people in 2020 be "cheap;" however, skimping on the tip in 2018 was voted to be an act of frugality. Perhaps this can be explained by a shift in gratitude towards frontline workers?

Declining to be part of rounds at the bar was considered cheap by respondents, as was calculating your share of the group bill down to the cent.

Other cheap actions? Still using very outdated electronics, re-gifting, and diluting soap containers with water.

Conversely, purchasing clothes at a secondhand store was found to be "frugal," as was buying off-brand food products, buying no-name electronics, and always seeking out deals or coupons when going shopping.

Participants also considered tracking their electricity and heating usage at home to keep the utility bills down to be frugal behavior.

According to the survey, the average American be-

comes a frugal person at the age of 31, with one in four saying they became thriftier when they were even younger. Two in three Americans also said they consider being called frugal a compliment.

"The coronavirus pandemic has impacted the financial situations of many people, and brought new focus to the importance of prioritizing spending," said Josh Meyers, CEO of Slickdeals. "We see a shift toward smarter spending with 65% of respondents indicating that the pandemic has transformed them into a frugal person, and 67% reporting that being called frugal is actually a compliment."

The survey also found that being financially conscious can be important on the dating scene.

Two-thirds of those polled said they actually think using a coupon on a first date is completely acceptable. In fact, 45% said they'd happily use a coupon on a first date.

Three in four say that the more they age, the more desirable it is for a romantic prospect having a smart financial mindset.

Ghosts of the Little Theatre Tulsa, Oklahoma

The Tulsa Little Theatre, located in an unassuming brick building at 15th and Delaware Streets in Tulsa, Oklahoma, is not only steeped in history but is also said to be home to several unearthly guests.



Built in 1932 by the Tulsa Little Theatre group, in an extremely plain art nouveau design, the first show produced in their new building was the Cradle Song.

In the beginning, the Little Theatre troupe had no permanent location when it started offering productions in 1922.

However, they were undeterred, maintaining that “the show must go on,” in any place they could find – large canvas tents, movie theaters and even at the American Legion, before they finally found built their permanent home at 15th and Delaware.

Workshops were held in the storage room of Palace Cloisters, which later became the location of the Ritz Theater. By 1925, the Little Theatre group numbered over 300 members and began to perform at the Alhambra Theater at 15th and Peoria. In 1929, the Little Theatre purchased the property at 15th and Delaware, which would be its home for the next 60 years. East Lynne, the first production at their new location was performed in a tent.

Despite the depression, the Tulsa Little Theatre continued its performances and in 1932 completed its permanent building. During the 1930s and '40s, the Delaware Playhouse, as it became known, was the epicenter of Tulsa's arts and entertainment scene. Over the years, the theater hosted hundreds of plays and entertainment events as it went through multiple directors and saw actors come and go.

In 1965, the theatre suffered a fire after its third performance of *The Women*, resulting in the destruction of stage props, furniture, and costumes. Just a year later, the theatre suffered yet another blaze during the production of *South Pacific*. Though the fire destroyed much of the upstairs property, the theatre persevered.

In 1974, the troupe changed its name to Theatre Tulsa, Inc. but remained in the art nouveau location. More than a decade later, in 1989, the group had outgrown their

building and moved to the Tulsa Performing Arts Center, where it continues to be the resident company of the facility.

For the next two years, the old theatre building sat vacant until it finally sold. Over the next decade, the aging building changed hands several times and was utilized for several purposes, including a church, a nightclub, and a recording studio.

By 2004, the 10,000 square-foot building had fallen into serious disrepair and suffered from criminal neglect. It was at this time that attorney; Bryce A. Hill was looking for a midtown location for his law office. Though the site was ideal, near the historic Cherry Street district, Hill and his wife, Sunshine, thought long and hard before purchasing the dilapidated property.

When they did, the old building smelled of decay was filled with trash, and water seeped from the walls, floors, and ceilings.

For the next 14 months, the Hills renovated the building, restoring much of it to its original 1932 façade and revamping the front portion of the building to utilize as offices.

In addition to having a renovated new look and a brand

new owner, the old theatre still retains a part of its past – most notably a couple of spirits that are said to have been hanging around the building for years.



Near the curtains on the old stage, a strange ball of light has often been seen bobbing around. Others on stage have reported seeing something standing behind them before mysteriously vanishing. Yet even more report having been touched by unseen hands and hearing strange noises coming from backstage when no one is there.

According to the legend, a one-time play director during the theatre's heydays, died during a performance. Are these the signs of a director who has not yet finished his productions? Others allege that the spirit of a little girl is also said to lurk within the confines of the historic theatre. Employees of the law office also tell a number of odd occurrences within the building, including supplies that go missing and lights that turn on and off of their own accord.

The theatre portion of the building can be rented for events and performances.

Taco Bell Employee Saves Man's Life In Drive-Thru

A Taco Bell employee in Clarksville, TN, is being hailed a hero for saving a customer's life after he passed out in the drive-thru.

Last Wednesday, Sonja Frazier, who usually works the night shift, came in early to work to help the general manager.



About 40 minutes into the shift, Frazier and her coworkers noticed the drive-thru line had come to a complete halt.

"We were seeing cars and hearing the bell go off, but nobody was coming through the drive-thru," said Frazier. "One of my managers looked on the camera and saw a car was parked the wrong way. It looked like it'd rolled into the drive-thru line and was blocking it."

One of her co-workers, Jonathan, went outside to investigate and saw a man leaned over in the driver seat of a van.

"When I got to the back door and saw it, Jonathan yelled, 'He's passed out!' and I yelled to another employee to call the ambulance," Frazier said. "We opened the door, and he was blue. I told Jonathan to park the car, and we both pulled him out and put him on the ground. I said to put him on his left side. His hands and fingertips were blue. I found a pulse, but it was real vague. Anissa came out with the 911 dispatcher (on the phone), and they asked if anyone knew CPR."

Frazier, 37, has worked at Taco Bell for about 14 years. But she previously worked as a home healthcare worker for six years and had taken multiple first-aid courses for certification.

Frazier immediately flipped him over and began performing CPR while talking to the man and telling him everything was going to be okay. After approximately 11 minutes of CPR, first responders arrived at the scene and took over.

"I saw him grab one of their arms when they were lifting him up in the stretcher and that was when I knew

he would be okay," Frazier said.

"I don't look at myself as a hero. This is what I was supposed to do. It doesn't matter who he was or what skin color he had. I knew I was there to save his life. But it really was overwhelming emotionally. After I just smoked a cigarette and cried."

Interesting facts about August



August is the time to reap what you've sown, quite literally even, as most summer vegetables are ready to be harvested.

It goes without saying, that August then is a time to celebrate a good harvest, and a good summer!

It is the last full month of summer, and by the time it is through, most students will have returned to school.

It's also a great time of the year in the southern hemisphere, as winter is finally starting to wrap up, and spring begins to knock on the door.

Like every other month of the year, august has plenty to show for itself.

Let's take a look at the origins of August, the traditions we celebrate during it, as well as some fun little facts to bring it all together!

- August was once the sixth month of the year. In the original ten-month Roman calendar, the month went by the name of Sextilis, meaning "the sixth month" in Latin. It wasn't until around 700BC that August was rudely shoved back in the order of months when January and February were added to the beginning of the year by King Numa Pompilius.

- August has also changed its number of days multiple times. In the ten-month Roman calendar, the months all had either 30 or 31 days, totaling 304 days in the year. Not only did Pompilius add January and February to the calendar, but he also reduced the number of days in August down to 29. It wasn't until Julius Caesar introduced the Julian calendar that it was left with 31 days, and it's stayed the same ever since!

- Another year, another change! After so many changes you'd think the month would have had enough, but no – in 8 BC the month was named Augustus, in honor of the Roman emperor Augustus.

- August is also a little bit unique, most of the time at least. In a standard year, there is no other month that begins on the same day of the week as August. In a

leap year however, August begins on the same day of the week as February.

- Many countries in Europe see August as a holiday period. So much so in fact, that you'll find major European cities such as Paris almost completely empty of locals. Don't get your hopes up too much though, these cities are still packed full of tourists at this time of year!

- In the northern hemisphere, August is considered to be the last month of summer. In the southern hemisphere, it's the opposite of course, so it's the last of the winter months!

- Back in the days of the Anglo-Saxons the month was called Weod Monath. Its translation of "weed month" is quite literal – in this month weeds and other plants grow the fastest in the northern hemisphere.

- On the 1st of August Lammas day is celebrated as the first day of harvest in the UK. Traditionally it was the day in which harvested wheat would be baked into bread and given to the church. The bread was used as the Communion bread for a special mass to celebrate the beginning of the harvest. This tradition ended when Henry VIII broke away from the Catholic Church.

- On the 6th of August 1762 the first-ever sandwich was created, at least with such a name. It was named after the Earl of Sandwich when he requested a dish involving meat between two pieces of bread. As the story goes, he requested it as he was in the middle of a gambling game and didn't want to interrupt it.

- Those born in August are brought into this world under one of two star signs. If you were born before the 22nd of August, you're considered to be a Leo. If you're born on the 23rd or later, you're a Virgo. Leos are said to be very proud people who display great leadership. Virgos, on the other hand, are analytical and hardworking people, while still being kind and loyal.

- August was a big month for the U.S. Civil Rights Movement. It was on the 28th of August 1963 that Martin Luther King Jr gave his famous "I have a dream" speech to 250,000 people on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington D.C. Considered to be one of the most iconic speeches in the history of the US, King's speech called for the end of racial discrimination and for equal rights to all.

- August also has two birth flowers – the vibrant multi-colored gladiolus and the deep crimson poppy. The gladiolus flower is said to represent generosity, strength of character, and deep sincerity. The poppy flower couldn't be more different though, as it is a sign of im-

agination, eternal sleep, and oblivion!

- There are some pretty fascinating holidays spread throughout August which are celebrated in different parts of the world. On the 1st of August we have World Scout Scarf Day, as well as the Official Birthday and Coronation of the King of Tonga (try saying that in one go!). August 5th is National Underwear Day (US), August 11th is Mountain Day (Japan), August 16th is National Rum Day (US) and August 20th is World Mosquito Day. What a month!

- Unlike most other months, August has just one birthstone – peridot. One of the lesser-known gems, peridots come in shades from grass-green to a more earthy olive hue. They're quite a unique gem, really, and quite rare as they can only be found from two very different sources – they can be formed deep in the earth and expelled to the surface along with lava, and they can be found in meteorites! It is claimed that peridots have healing powers and can protect the bearer from evil.

- August was a fateful month for the ancient Roman city of Pompeii. On the 24th of August 79AD, Mount Vesuvius erupted near the city. The mountain spewed out great clouds of ash, smoke, and pumice, which rained down on Pompeii's citizens. Unfortunately for Pompeii, that wasn't the end of it either – next came molten lava, which buried the remaining residents 7 feet (2.1 m) deep!

- August has quite a number of varied month-long holidays around the world. To name just a few, August is American Adventures Month, Get Ready for Kindergarten Month, as well as being the Month of Philippine Language!

- The US also has some pretty delicious sounding observances for the month relating to food! In August the US celebrates National Goat Cheese Month, National Panini Month, Peach Month and Sandwich Month.

- As there are only 12 months in the year, there are of course many incredibly famous and important people who have been born in August. Some of the more influential include Barack Obama, Usain Bolt, Sean Connery, Jennifer Lawrence, and Whitney Houston.

- August is apparently a relatively common name for

boys in Sweden. In 2014 it was reported to be the 55th most common name for newborn baby boys. Ironically, only 22 percent of Swedish boys named August were actually born in August!

- Rock music lost a living legend on the 16th of August 1977 when Elvis Presley left the world behind. The King of Rock's health had been going downhill for some time, but his death was a shock to the world.

Where did the name come from?

August was named in honor of Augustus Caesar and originated with the Roman calendar. It has 31 days because Augustus wanted as many days as Julius Caesar's month of July had.

A familiar flower

August's flower is the gladiolus. The flower was discovered in Africa, but now is grown locally. It's a tradition dating back to 1938.

'Dog days' a misleading term

The month of August often is referred to as the "dog days of summer" but not because of pet pooches. It has to do with the star Sirius, also known as the dog star, which rose at the same time as sunrise during the month of August in ancient Roman times.

A pair of birthstones

The birthstones for August are the peridot and the sardonyx.

So, there you have it, that's August in a nutshell! No matter where you are in the world, August is a pretty wonderful time the year.

She believes that a good design is the one having a functional aesthetics. She loves to experiment with typography and iPhone.



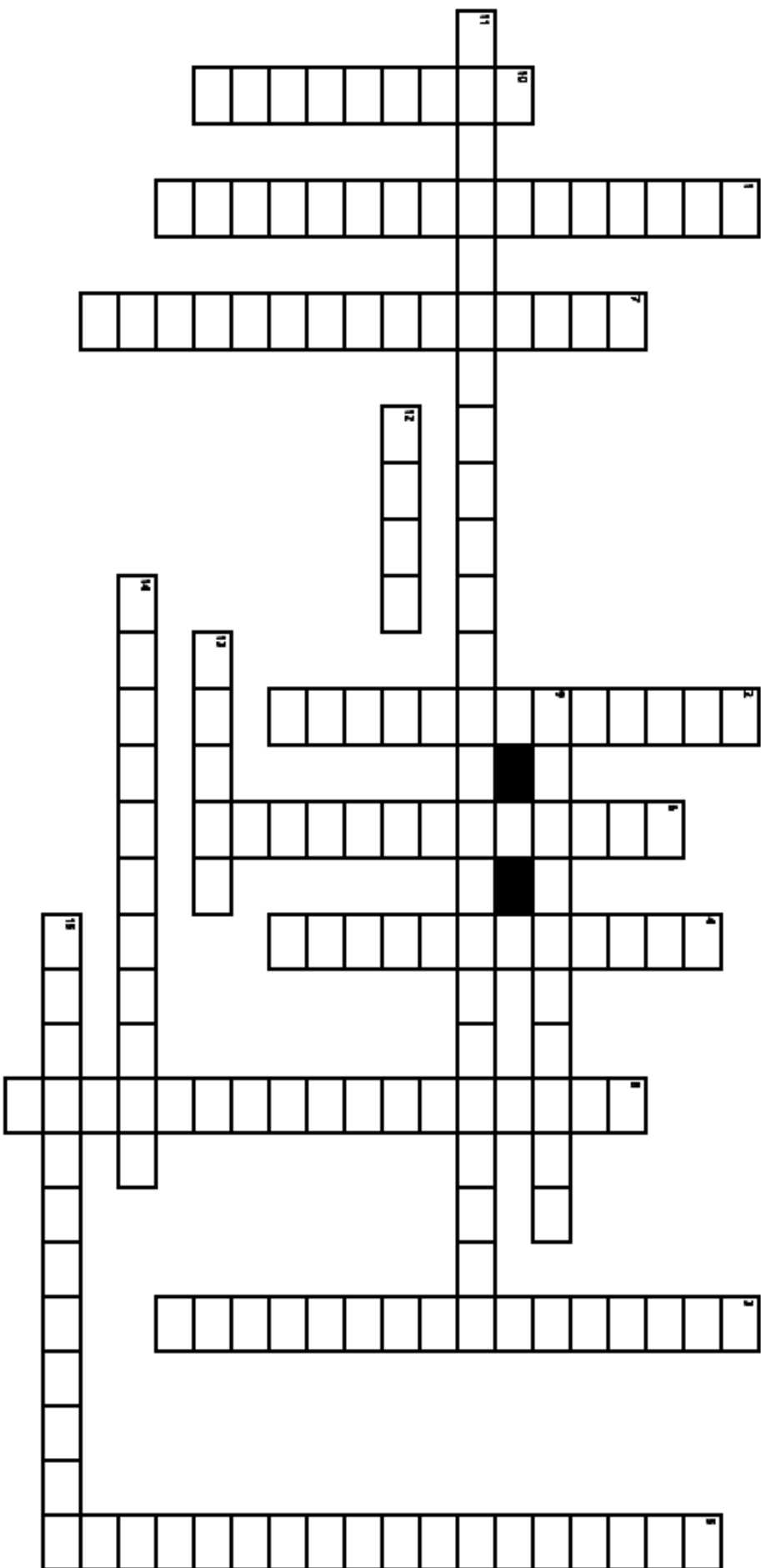

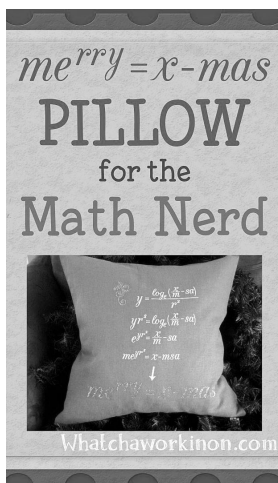

8 Silly Events in History

Before John, Paul, George and Ringo hit the big time, they auditioned for Decca Records on 1st January 1962. They played 15 songs in an hour including popular covers and some of their own compositions.



Decca Records were less than impressed and promptly rejected the band, saying "The Beatles have no future in show business". Well, we all know what happened after that! Decca's rejection is widely considered to be one of the biggest mistakes in the history of the music industry. Awkward!

2. Spaghetti harvest

Did you know that spaghetti grows on trees? No? Well, back in 1957 the BBC broadcast the first pictures of the spaghetti harvest in



Italy. At the time, not many people in the UK would have known how pasta was produced and when the news broadcaster showed footage of spaghetti strands being plucked from blossoming trees, it was a revelation.

It was a while before the audience realised that they were watching the news on the 1st of April. This story has since become one of the most infamous April Fool's jokes of all time.

3. Fire destroys patent

But not just any patent: the first patent for the fire hydrant was burnt in fire. Now that's what we call irony! The inventor of the fire hydrant will never be known, as the only copy of the patent ended up being the fuel for the fire at the U.S Patent Office in the 19th Century. Hundreds of records were destroyed in the fire, but none as ironic as this one.



4. Alien invasion

There was mass panic about an alien invasion back in 1938 but don't worry, no little green men actually land-

ed on Earth. An adaptation of H.G. Wells' novel 'The War of the Worlds' was broadcast on the radio as a Halloween special, but listeners thought they were hearing breaking news about an alien invasion.



The audience couldn't even check if the news was trending on Twitter in those days, so word of the alien attack spread from person to person. Even though there had been a notice about the fictional show at the start, those listeners who tuned in half-way through had no idea that the news bulletins about the Martians were fake.

5. Spoof album

The Masked Marauders album was created as a hoax by the editor of Rolling Stone magazine back in the late 60s. With the ability to write anything he wanted in the magazine, Greil Marcus wrote a funny review of a fictional album, insisting that Bob Dylan, Mick Jagger and three of the Beatles had formed a supergroup.



When readers started asking how they could buy the album, Rolling Stone magazine hired an unknown band to recreate some of the spoof tracks. The fake album sold over 100,000 copies!

6. Boat hoax

There were many rivalries in the Royal Navy back in the early 20th century and the fleet captains were always playing tricks on each other. Horace de Vere Cole sent a hoax telegram to the commander of battleship HMS Dreadnought, telling them to prepare for a royal inspection.



Cole gathered together a group of friends, including the famous writer Virginia Woolf and two of the commander's cousins, and dressed them up as Abyssinian royal family. This elaborate practical joke worked, and the group were entertained on the ship for hours without the commander recognising his own family.

7. Time for a break

Even though London's Big Ben is currently out of action while being restored, there have been occasions in

the famous clock's past when time stood still. Back in 1949, the time fell behind by four minutes. No, the clock hadn't run out of battery; it stopped ticking when a flock of birds perched on the minute hand.



The mini murmuration of starlings settled down to roost and the weight of the birds held the minute hand still. Four and a half minutes passed before the birds took flight.

8. Walkie talkie melting cars

In more recent news, a building has been melting cars. No, it's not another April Fool's joke – this actually happened. When the London skyscraper nicknamed the 'walkie talkie' was under construction, the reflection from the windows began melting cars that were parked on the street.



In 2013, a Jaguar that was left outside the building for two hours ended up with a melted wing mirror, wonky badge and buckled panels. The damage was caused by the sun's rays being reflected by the curved shape of the building. The parking spaces outside have since been suspended so that no more vehicles melt like an ice cream on a hot day.

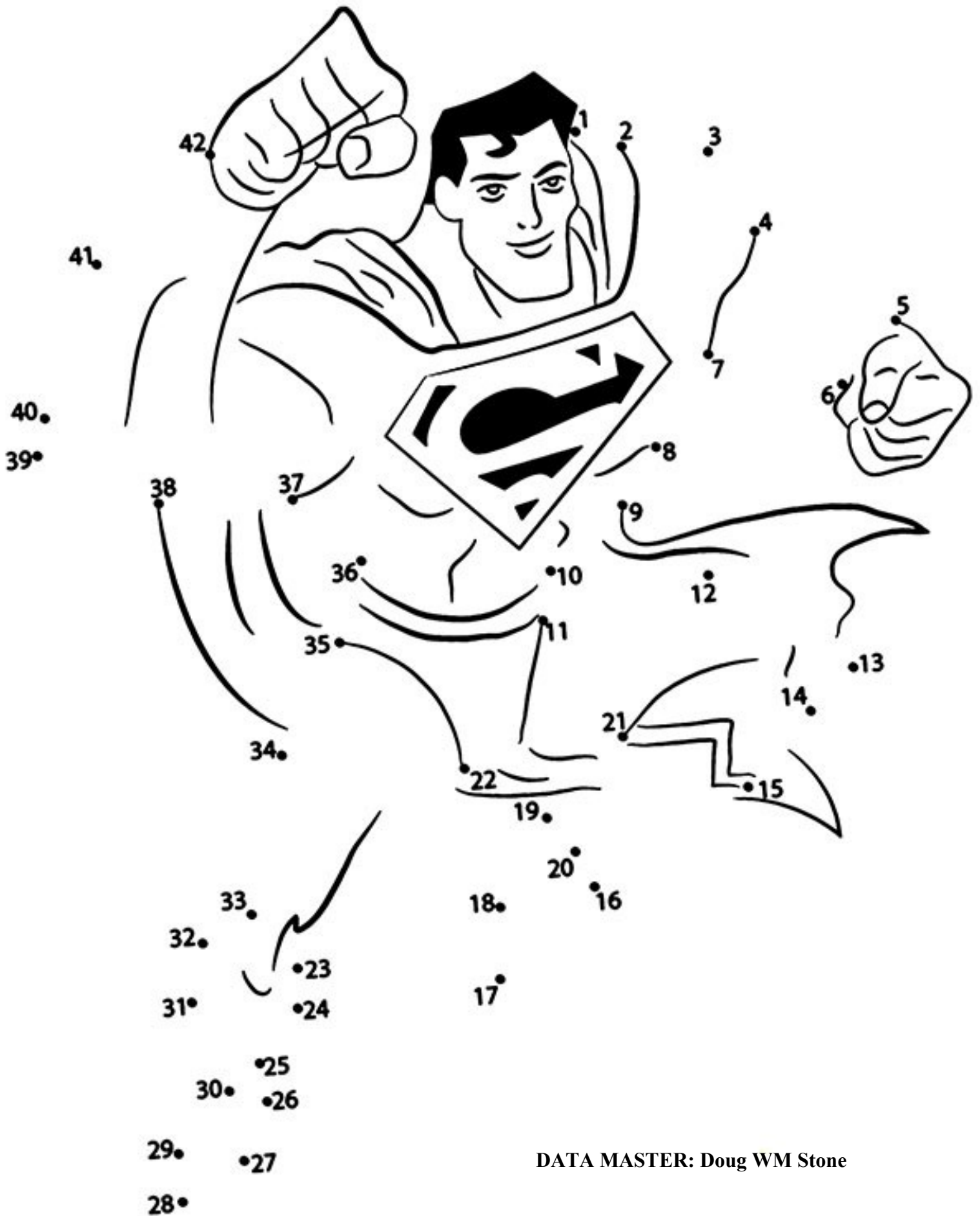
