1889 Territorial Schoolhouse (Oklahoma's Earliest One-Room Schoolhouse)



SCHOOLHOUSE HISTORY

On a summer day in 1889, Jennie Forster marched into Brown's Lumber Company and ordered enough lumber, on credit, to build a schoolhouse for the new village of Edmond, Oklahoma Territory. The Ladies School Aid Society, consisting of 15 Women, had been formed and the ladies were determined to have a proper school for the local children.

Jennie (Mrs. George) Forster was the President of the Society. Among the other members were Mrs. L.G. Wahl, Mrs. C.A. Dake, Mrs. Frank Kiedrowski, Mrs. E.W. Erisman, and many others.

The women set to work immediately to earn the money to pay back the lumber bill. They badgered their hus-



bands, as well as the other town merchants and citizens. Mrs. Forster joked that in later years she was sure the businessmen "felt like running out the back door when they saw me entering the front door."

1889 SCHOOLHOUSE RESTORATION, 2007 OK-LAHOMA CENTENNIAL PROJECT

Edmond's 1889 Territorial Schoolhouse is the earliest one-room schoolhouse in the Oklahoma Territory. This formative schoolhouse helped to shape and create the beginnings of Higher Education in the region and led the way to other educational facilities.

The 1889 Territorial Schoolhouse on 124 E. Second Street is possibly the last remaining original 1889 structure in Edmond. The Historical Schoolhouse was restored as an Oklahoma Centennial Project by the Edmond Historic Preservation Trust. The Schoolhouse reopened to public on April 15th, 2007. The first class of students to visit the historic site on the first Schoolhouse Field Trip was in the fall of 2008.



Many people drove past the historic site when it was the boarded-up Sander's Camera Shop, not realizing they were seeing and passing by the historic building. This special restoration project was carried out due to the efforts of the local Trust, Local Historian Lucille Warrick and a group of Passionate Citizens.

Major restoration uncovered the original blackboards buried underneath Saner's Camera Shop interior walls. Years of hard work and dedication by the Edmond Historic Preservation Trust have brought the Schoolhouse back to its original function and appearance. The Schoolhouse is open to the public on Saturdays from 1:00-4:00 pm and by appointment at 1(405) 715-1889.

Representatives from the Edmond Historic Preservation Trust, Owners of the Schoolhouse, Provide tours to the General Public on these days.

David Pilkey

David Pilkey, who is also known by the pen name, Sue Denim was born on 4th March, 1966 is a very famous and renowned American writer and illustrator of children's literature. He is most popular for being both the author and illustrator of the Captain Un-



derpants book series. He occasionally also uses the pen names of George Beard and Harold Hutchins.

Pilkey resides with his wife, Sayuri near Seattle, Washington. His father's name was David Pilkey and mother's name was Barbara. He also has one older sister whose name is Cindy. While Pilkey was in elementary school in Elyria, Ohio, he was diagnosed with and suffers from dyslexia and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder. He was therefore chided for his behaviour in school several times and consequently took to sitting at a desk in the school hall, where he fantasized and created the character of Captain Underpants. Pilkey gave his book, World War Won for entry in a national competition for student authors and won the prize in his age bracket. As a result of the award, the book was published in 1987.

The peculiar spelling of his name came when he was employed briefly at Pizza Hut, when the "e" was removed from his nametag. Although, it is spelled as Dav; it is still pronounced as Dave.

When he relocated to Washington, he met Sayuri, a professional musician and also the owner of his favourite Japanese restaurant. They started dating in February of 2005 and got married in a private ceremony later that year.

Pilkey took a sabbatical from writing for a couple of years, in order to care for his father who became severely ill. However in March 2010, he signed a deal with Scholastic in order to come out with four new books. The first book, which was essentially a graphic novel, The Adventures of Ook and Gluk, Kung-Fu Cavemen from the Future came out on 10th August, 2010. The second book, which was another graphic novel, of which there was immense anticipation for 9 years, "Super Diaper Baby 2: Invasion of the Potty Snatchers", came out on 28th June, 2011.Dav Pilkey is regarded as one of the most popular writers, especially for children in elementary school. He is also considered to be a skilled artist.

Come to a complete stop before crossing the street; walk bikes across the street

Stay alert and avoid distracted riding

Make sure your child always wears a properly fitted helmet and bright clothing

Bus Riders

Teach your children school bus safety rules and practice with them.

Go to the bus stop with your child to teach them the proper way to get on and off the bus

Teach your children to stand 6 feet (or three giant steps) away from the curb



teach him or her to walk on the side of the road until they are 10 feet ahead of the bus; your child and the bus driver should always be able to see each other

Driving Your Child to School

Stay alert and avoid distracted driving.

Obey school zone speed limits and follow your school's drop-off procedure

Make eye contact with children who are crossing the street

Never pass a bus loading or unloading children The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them to safely enter and exit the bus

Teen Drivers

Car crashes are the No. 1 cause of death for teens. Fortunately, there is something we can do.

Teens crash because they are inexperienced; practice with new drivers every week, before and after they get their license

Set a good example; drive the way you want your teen to drive

Sign the New Driver Deal, an agreement that helps define expectations for parents and teens

School Safety

Many School-related injuries are completely preventable. Follow these steps to ensure your child's safety at school.

Backpacks

Choose a backpack for your child carefully; it should have ergonomically designed features to enhance safety and comfort.

Ask your children to use both straps when wearing their backpack to evenly distribute the weight on their shoulders

Don't overstuff a backpack; it should weigh no more than 5% to 10% of your child's body weight

Rolling backpacks should be used cautiously since they can create a trip hazard in crowded school hallways

Playgrounds and Sports

To reduce strangulation hazards on playgrounds, have your child leave necklaces and jackets with drawstrings at home

A few bumps and bruises can be expected when your child plays sports, but head injuries should never be ignored



Sir Edward Dyer, 'My Mind to Me a Kingdom Is'.

'My mind to me a kingdom is' is a poem that has been popular with readers ever since it was published in 1588 in William Byrd's Psalmes, Sonets, & Songs. Yet the authorship of 'My mind to me a kingdom is' is by no means certain. Who wrote it? First, here's the poem, which expresses the sentiment that one's own mind contains a whole world, and, indeed – as Emily Dickinson would later also express – more than the world, since the only limit on it is the limit of our own imagination, or what we I neither seek by bribes to please, are able to conceive of.

My mind to me a kingdom is; Such present joys therein I find, That it excels all other bliss That earth affords or grows by kind:

Though much I want that most would have, Yet still my mind forbids to crave. No princely pomp, no wealthy store, No force to win the victory,

No wily wit to salve a sore, No shape to feed a loving eye; To none of these I yield as thrall; For why? my mind doth serve for all.

I see how plenty surfeits oft, And hasty climbers soon do fall; I see that those which are aloft Mishap doth threaten most of all:

They get with toil, they keep with fear: Such cares my mind could never bear. Content I live, this is my stay; I seek no more than may suffice;

I press to bear no haughty sway; Look, what I lack my mind supplies. Lo, thus I triumph like a king, Content with that my mind doth bring.

Some have too much, yet still do crave; I little have, and seek no more. They are but poor, though much they have, And I am rich with little store;

They poor, I rich; they beg, I give; They lack, I leave; they pine, I live. I laugh not at another's loss, I grudge not at another's gain;

No worldly waves my mind can toss; My state at one doth still remain: I fear no foe, I fawn no friend; I loathe not life, nor dread my end.

Some weigh their pleasure by their lust, Their wisdom by their rage of will; Their treasure is their only trust, A cloaked craft their store of skill;

But all the pleasure that I find Is to maintain a quiet mind. My wealth is health and perfect ease, My conscience clear my chief defence;

Nor by deceit to breed offence: Thus do I live; thus will I die; Would all did so as well as I!

The gist of 'My Mind to Me a Kingdom Is' – that one's mind is a powerful source of happiness to oneself – was a popular Renaissance one, and this poem was popular. The sentiment itself is far older, and can be traced back to classical Latin poetry.

To paraphrase the general meaning of the poem: 'My mind is an endless source of happiness to me, comparable in its size and scope to a whole kingdom. And yet my mind does not encourage me to desire things which are beyond my reach; it has enough for me, but no more. I am contented with my lot, and don't desire more than what I have. After all, those who slave away to get more than they have, then have to guard jealously what they have kept. As a result of this attitude, I neither hate life, nor fear death:

I am level-headed about both. Whereas others judge their character by their material goods, I simply judge myself by the quality of my mind. Such peace of mind is the only "wealth" I require.

Since the nineteenth century, Edward Dyer (1543-1607) has always been acknowledged as the author of 'My Mind to Me a Kingdom Is', until this was questioned in the late twentieth century by Steven W. May. Did Dyer actually write it? May puts forward some evidence – including an attribution in one of the early manuscripts of the poem – that it was Edward de Vere, Seventeenth Earl of Oxford (1550-1604) who wrote 'My Mind to Me a Kingdom Is', rather than Dyer. The Earl of Oxford is better-known for being the subject of a conspiracy theory which sees him as the 'true' author of Shakespeare's plays, and for an embarrassing incident involving a fart in the company of Queen Elizabeth I. We will perhaps never know for sure which of the two men wrote the poem, but we have the poem, which is the most important thing. Its message may have enjoyed its zenith of popularity during the Elizabethan era, but the poem's emphasis on maintaining a levelheaded attitude to things, where one is happy with one's lot, still speaks to us over four centuries later.

The Cement Mixer Space Capsule of Winganon



Along a lonely stretch of road between the small villages of Talala and Winganon in the US state of Oklahoma, lies what appears to be an abandoned space capsule. The letterings 'NASA' and 'United States of America' along with the flag is clearly visible on its side. However, it doesn't take long to realize that the fallen spacecraft is actually a cement mixer.

The landmark came into being by a happy accident when a concrete-filled cement mixer truck, which was on its way to help build the bridge over Oologah Lake, rolled over here in 1959. By the time a tow truck arrived to haul the cement truck away, all of the cement had hardened inside the mixer. Unable to handle the extra weight, the crew decided to haul only the truck and come back for the detached mixer later, which never happened. Eventually the locals discovered the relic, and the mixer became an easy target for anyone with spray paint.

For the last fifty years, graffiti artists have poured untold gallons of paint over the mixer, sending messages to their friends, or just showing. In September 2011, local artists Barry and Heather Thomas decided to turn it into a space capsule to celebrate the fifth anniversary of their wedding. The couple attached canning lids, garden hose, broken reflectors and other household items to the mixer to make the transformation look as real as possible. Before the latest incarnation the mixer was painted in a patriotic starsand-stripes motif.



The Winganon Space Capsule is now a popular attraction. People driving along Winganon Road get down from their cars to pose near it and take pictures.

Heather Thomas hopes the new paint job would discourage kids to paint it over with graffiti. It has definitely survived, till now, although the thrusters at the bottom are gone.

Another First Oklahoma Oil Well



Drilled in 1889 and completed a year later near oil seeps at Chelsea in Indian Territory, the story behind the another first Oklahoma oil well is not as well known as the Bartlesville gusher seven years later.

Under President Andrew Jackson, Congress enacted the Indian Removal Act of 1830, forcibly relocating native American tribes westward to what would later become known as Indian Territory.

Land west of Arkansas, "remote from white settlements," seemed a good place to send them at the time, explained a 1900 report by the American Geographical Society of New York (Vol. 32). "It was intended to settle them there for all time, whereby they could live to themselves, according to their own pleasure, with selfgovernment, under the protection of the general Government."


Title and deed gave ownership of the land to the Choctaw, Chickasaw, Seminole, Creek, and Cherokee where they could establish their own tribal governments under the Department of the Interior, Bureau of Indian Affairs.

However, westward growth and legislation such as the Dawes Act (1887) and Curtis Act (1898) ultimately stripped tribal governments of their authority and reduced the territory from about 150 million acres to 78 million acres — as America's search for petroleum reached into Indian Territory.

The United States Oil and Gas Company completed an oil well near Chelsea in 1890. Although the well produced less than a barrel of oil a day, it was seven years earlier than the historic Indian Territory gusher at Bartlesville, about 35 miles northwest.

In 1882, Edward Byrd, a Cherokee by marriage, found oil seeps southwest of Chelsea in Indian Territory.

Two years later, the Cherokee Nation passed a law authorizing organization of a company "for the purpose of finding petroleum, or rock oil, and thus increasing the revenue of the Cherokee Nation."



Leases were limited to Cherokee citizens.

Byrd organized the United States Oil and Gas Company in 1887 with William B. Linn of Pennsylvania and a contingent of Kansas investors (William Woodman, Finley Ross, Oak Daeson, and Martin Hellar).

Byrd's exploration company secured a 100,000-acre lease from the Cherokee Nation west of Chelsea, between the St. Louis and San Francisco Railway and the Verdigris River. The lease covered portions of presentday Rogers and Nowata counties in Oklahoma.

In 1890, United States Oil and Gas completed its first well on Spencer Creek, within yards of Byrd's old oil seep, using basic technologies for "making hole." This Indian Territory well produced oil seven years before the Bartlesville well – but just half a barrel of oil a day from 36 feet deep. Ten more marginal wells followed, and by the last quarter of 1891, the company reported a total of "twelve barrels of oil pumped."

With little production and no large commercial market nearby, Byrd's venture shut down. He then organized a group of Cherokee citizens into the Hugh B.

Henry and Company and secured additional leases covering thousands of acres for United States Oil and Gas.

John B. Phillips, an experienced independent oil producer from Butler, Pennsylvania, formed Cherokee Oil and Gas Company to take over United States Oil and Gas properties. But under federal law, the leases had to be approved by the Department of the Interior, which reduced the size from more than 100,000 acres to 12,000 acres. Cherokee Oil and Gas also bought the 11 shallow, marginal wells of United States Oil and Gas wells for "twenty-five cents on the dollar."

Cherokee Oil and Gas drilled deeper wells and found high-grade oil in two wells (1,450 feet deep and 1,320 feet deep) before a boiler explosion shut both wells down. Other small producing wells followed as the company continued drilling.

Meanwhile, another Indian Territory company explored near Bartlesville oil seeps, about 40 miles west. On April 15, 1897, the Cudahy Oil Company "shot" with nitroglycerin the company's Nellie Johnstone No. 1 well after finding signs of oil in March. This oilfield discovery well beagn producing up to 75 barrels of oil a day from 1,320 feet deep.


Despite the production, Cudahy Oil was confronted with a lack of infrastructure for moving oil to markets. With no storage tanks, pipelines or railroads available, the Nellie Johnstone No. 1 was capped for two years.

In 1898, Congress passed the Curtis Act, "for the Protection of the People of Indian Territory." The new law, amending the Dawes Act of 1887, is described by the Oklahoma Historical Society as "the culmination of legislation designed to strip tribal governments of their authority and give it to Congress and/or the federal government."

In Indian Territory oilfields, operations were brought to a standstill because of difficulties with titles, according to the U.S. Geological Survey. "The title of the oil and minerals remains in trust with the United States Government under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior, who must ratify every lease to make it valid."

The legislation also stipulated, "the amount of 640 acres can only be acquired by a single individual or company."

However, both the Cherokee Oil and Gas Company and the Cudahy Oil Company had leased more than 300,000 acres from the Cherokee Nation before the Curtis act. Congressional hearings and litigation followed.



An 1890 marginal producing well at Chelsea could be considered Oklahoma's first petroleum production. In 1902, the Superior Court of the District of Columbia upheld "the power of the Secretary of the Interior to lease Cherokee oil lands," in litigation over a lease of 12,000 acres held by the Cherokee Oil and Gas Company.


Cudahy Oil prospects were profoundly affected as well. In 1904, the Los Angeles Herald reported on the pending merger of Cherokee Oil and Gas Company with Cudahy Oil Company to form a new combined enterprise, the Cudahy Pipe Line and Refining Company. The merger never took place, although the combined assets reportedly amounted to 137 producing wells on the Cherokee Oil and Gas property and 87 producing wells on Cudahy leases for a total production of 2,100 barrels of oil a day.

"The producers are rather chary about signing up with the Cudahy concern," noted the Weekly Examiner of Bartlesville in 1905. "An effort is being made to sell stock to the producers, but it is said the latter are not falling over each other in an effort to get on the independent band wagon."

With the Curtis Act having cleared the last impediment to statehood, Oklahoma became the 46th state on November 16, 1907. Cherokee Oil and Gas Company continued to operate, but by 1918 had been reduced to owning half-interest in 375 oil wells at Chelsea. On March 31, 1919, the Cherokee-Warren Oil and Gas Company incorporated and took over the remaining assets of the wildcat venture that had drilled Oklahoma's other first oil well almost 40 years earlier.

Although the 1890 marginal oil producer at Chelsea could be called Oklahoma's first, records show that in the Choctaw Nation, a well was completed by Dr. H.W. Faucett and Choctaw Oil and Refining Company in 1888. This well reached 1,400 feet deep, where it also found non-commercial quantities of oil. The "Old Faucett Well" was abandoned after the doctor fell ill and died later that year.




He Kept an Eye on Me

Saturn



Saturn is the sixth planet from the Sun and the second largest planet in our solar system. Adorned with a dazzling system of icy rings, Saturn is unique among the planets. It is not the only planet to have rings, but none are as spectacular or as complex as Saturn's. Like fellow gas giant Jupiter, Saturn is a massive ball made mostly of hydrogen and helium. Surrounded by more than 60 known moons, Saturn is home to some of the most fascinating landscapes in our solar system. From the jets of water that spray from Enceladus to the methane lakes on smoggy Titan, the Saturn system is a rich source of scientific discovery and still holds many mysteries. The farthest planet from Earth discovered by the unaided human eye, Saturn has been known since ancient times. The planet is named for the Roman god of agriculture and wealth, who was also the father of Jupiter.

Size and Distance

With a radius of 36,183.7 miles (58,232 kilometers), Saturn is 9 times wider than Earth. If Earth were the size of a nickel, Saturn would be about as big as a volleyball.

From an average distance of 886 million miles (1.4 billion kilometers), Saturn is 9.5 astronomical units away from the Sun. One astronomical unit (abbreviated as AU), is the distance from the Sun to Earth. From this distance, it takes sunlight 80 minutes to travel from the Sun to Saturn.

Orbit and Rotation

Saturn has the second-shortest day in the solar system. One day on Saturn takes only 10.7 hours (the time it takes for Saturn to rotate or spin around once), and Saturn makes a complete orbit around the Sun (a year in Saturnian time) in about 29.4 Earth years (10,756 Earth days). Its axis is tilted by 26.73 degrees with respect to its orbit around the Sun, which is similar to Earth's 23.5 degree tilt. This means that, like Earth, Saturn experiences seasons.

Structure

Like Jupiter, Saturn is made mostly of hydrogen and helium. At Saturn's center is a dense core of metals like iron and nickel surrounded by rocky material and other compounds solidified by the intense pressure and heat. It is enveloped by liquid metallic hydrogen inside a layer of liquid hydrogen—similar to Jupiter's core but considerably smaller.

It's hard to imagine, but Saturn is the only planet in our solar system whose average density is less than water. The giant gas planet could float in a bathtub if such a colossal thing existed.

Formation

Saturn took shape when the rest of the solar system formed about 4.5 billion years ago, when gravity pulled swirling gas and dust in to become this gas giant. About 4 billion years ago, Saturn settled into its current position in the outer solar system, where it is the sixth planet from the Sun. Like Jupiter, Saturn is mostly made of hydrogen and helium, the same two main components that make up the Sun.

Surface

As a gas giant, Saturn doesn't have a true surface. The planet is mostly swirling gases and liquids deeper down. While a spacecraft would have nowhere to land on Saturn, it wouldn't be able to fly through unscathed either. The extreme pressures and temperatures deep inside the planet crush, melt and vaporize spacecraft trying to fly into the planet.

Atmosphere

Saturn is blanketed with clouds that appear as faint stripes, jet streams and storms. The planet is many different shades of yellow, brown and grey.

Winds in the upper atmosphere reach 1,600 feet per second (500 meters per second) in the equatorial region. In contrast, the strongest hurricane-force winds on Earth top out at about 360 feet per second (110 meters per second). And the pressure—the same kind you feel

when you dive deep underwater—is so powerful it squeezes gas into liquid.

Saturn's north pole has an interesting atmospheric feature—a six-sided jet stream. This hexagon-shaped pattern was first noticed in images from the Voyager I spacecraft and has been more closely observed by the Cassini spacecraft since. Spanning about 20,000 miles (30,000 kilometers) across, the hexagon is a wavy jet stream of 200-mile-per-hour winds (about 322 kilometers per hour) with a massive, rotating storm at the center. There is no weather feature like it anywhere else in the solar system.

Magnetosphere

Saturn's magnetic field is smaller than Jupiter's but still 578 times as powerful as Earth's. Saturn, the rings, and many of the satellites lie totally within Saturn's enormous magnetosphere, the region of space in which the behavior of electrically charged particles is influenced more by Saturn's magnetic field than by the solar wind. Aurorae occur when charged particles spiral into a planet's atmosphere along magnetic field lines. On Earth, these charged particles come from the solar wind. Cassini showed that at least some of Saturn's aurorae are like Jupiter's and are largely unaffected by the solar wind. Instead, these aurorae are caused by a combination of particles ejected from Saturn's moons and Saturn's magnetic field's rapid rotation rate. But these "non-solar-originating" aurorae are not completely understood yet.

Rings

Saturn's rings are thought to be pieces of comets, asteroids or shattered moons that broke up before they reached the planet, torn apart by Saturn's powerful gravity. They are made of billions of small chunks of ice and rock coated with another material such as dust. The ring particles mostly range from tiny, dust-sized icy grains to chunks as big as a house. A few particles are as large as mountains. The rings would look mostly white if you looked at them from the cloud tops of Saturn, and inter-

estingly, each ring orbits at a different speed around the planet. Saturn's ring system extends up to 175,000 miles (282,000 kilometers) from the planet, yet the vertical height is typically about 30 feet (10 meters) in the main rings. Named alphabetically in the order they were discovered, the rings are relatively close to each other, with the exception of a gap measuring 2,920 miles (4,700 kilometers) wide called the Cassini Division that separates Rings A and B. The main rings are A, B and C. Rings D, E, F and G are fainter and more recently discovered. Starting at Saturn and moving outward, there is the D ring, C ring, B ring, Cassini Division, A ring, F ring, G ring, and finally, the E ring. Much farther out, there is the very faint Phoebe ring in the orbit of Saturn's moon Phoebe.

Moons

Saturn is home to a vast array of intriguing and unique worlds. From the haze-shrouded surface of Titan to crater-riddled Phoebe, each of Saturn's moons tells another piece of the story surrounding the Saturn system. Currently Saturn has 53 confirmed moons with 29 additional provisional moons awaiting confirmation.

Potential for Life

Saturn's environment is not conducive to life as we know it. The temperatures, pressures and materials that characterize this planet are most likely too extreme and volatile for organisms to adapt to.

While planet Saturn is an unlikely place for living things to take hold, the same is not true of some of its many moons. Satellites like Enceladus and Titan, home to internal oceans, could possibly support life.

5 FACTS ABOUT ELDER ABUSE

- 3. Finances are at the highest risk the most common form of abuse is financial exploitation and extortion.
- 4. 9 out of 10 elder abusers are relatives In around 90% of elder abuse and neglect incidents, the perpetrator is a family member.
- 5. Many go unreported Only one of every six instances of elder abuse is reported.

WHY WORLD ELDER ABUSE AWARENESS DAY IS IMPORTANT

- 1. Older Americans may be unable to advocate for themselves Many seniors are not in a place to stand up for themselves, whether it's because they're physically frail or because they're scared of speaking up and fear of repercussions. It's crucial for all of us to be on the lookout for signs of elder abuse, and to speak up if something seems wrong.
- 2. Seniors deserve our respect and our attention In so many cultures, elders are revered and rightfully so. Their experiences, memories, and perspective on life are valued for the lessons that younger folks can learn. If older people aren't encouraged to pass along the skills and wisdom they have accumulated during their lives, then the culture as whole suffers. 

Dependence Day

9 Things You Didn't Know About Flip-Flops

1) Flip-Flops By Any Other Name...

Although flip-flops have been around for a lot longer, the name wasn't assigned to this style of footwear until the 1960s. The term flip-flop was used to describe the clapping sound that is produced with the shoe slaps against the heel when you are walking. They could have easily been called slappies or cluckers or snap-snaps, but the term flip-flop stuck.

2) There is a National Flip-Flop Day

Yes, National Flip-Flop Day is a thing. It is held on the third Friday in June every year since it was created in 2007. On this day, everyone is encouraged to wear their flip-flops and share pics of their favorite footwear on social media sites, using the hashtag #NationalFlipFlopDay. You may even find some retail locations getting in on the action by hosting in-store sales on flip-flops.

3) Flip-Flops: The Footwear Our Ancestors Wore

The flip-flop is one of the oldest forms of footwear. Murals in Egypt depict ancient Egyptians wearing flip-flops as far back as 4,000 B.C. These Egyptian flip-flops were made with papyrus and reeds. Early African flip-flops were crafted from animal hides, Indian flip-flops were wooden and in China and Japan, the footwear was made using rice straw.

4) Between the Toes

Today's flip-flops are worn with the strap between the first and second toes, but that wasn't always the case. Many early cultures, including the Romans and the Mesopotamians, wore their flip-flops with the strap between the second and third toes. We can thank the ancient Greeks for showing us that the most comfortable way to wear flip-flops is with the strap between the first and second toes. The flip-flops of ancient Greece were more closely aligned with modern flip-flops than any of the footwear that came before.

5) Flip-Flops in the Post-War Era

U.S. soldiers returning home from deployments in Japan during World War II brought back pairs of Japanese zori, a type of flip-flop made with rice straw. These became wildly popular in the United States. By the 1950s, U.S. manufacturers were making their own version of the Japanese zori, using rubber instead of rice straw. Soon, people could buy flip-flops in any color imaginable and the style of footwear became a fashion trend of the 1950s and 1960s.

6) Flip-Flop-in-Chief

In 2011, then-president Barack Obama became the first U.S. president to be photographed wearing flip-flops. This was, most likely, the first time the people of the United States saw a president's toes.

While the media had a field day condemning the president for his casual footwear, University of Pennsylvania's Kathleen Hall Jamieson had the perfect retort when she said, "If you were born in Hawaii, if you grew up in Hawaii, if you vacation in Hawaii and you don't wear flipflops, then there is something seriously wrong with you."

7) Flip-Flops are Big Business

Americans love their flip-flops. Last year alone, they spent more than \$2.5 billion on just this one variety of footwear, making flip-flops the best selling sandal in the country.

8) Flip-Flops for a Cause

Although Gucci and Crystalishious make costly flip-flops for discerning customers, the most expensive flip-flop on the market is produced by the eco-friendly company, Chipkos. Their uniquely-shaped, square flip-flop with hand-painted 18-karat gold designs, sell for whopping \$18,000 a pair. These shoes are part of the footwear company's Stand for Square Feet campaign. Money from the purchase of these flip flops goes toward the protection of 100,000 square feet of endangered rainforest habitat in Costa Rica. The flip-flops even come with their own clear display case for those who want to show off their footwear instead of wearing them out to walk the dog.


9) Sing the Song of the Flip-Flops

Flip flops can occasionally be found in the lyrics of songs, but only one song (so far) have mentioned America's favorite footwear in the title of the song. Country artist Kenny Chesney included the song, "Flip Flop Summer" on his ninth album, the 2005 The Road and the Radio album. Among the lyrics of this tune is the chorus that says, "It's gonna be another flip-flop summer, kick off your shoes and call up your lover." Elsewhere in the song, Chesney sings "We're going to take us a long vacation, mix us up some strong libations. No worries, just good vibrations, and lazy days in style. It's a flip-flop summer, it's a flip-flop summer."

Creative Back-to-School Hacks to Get Your Year off to a Running Start

Spell Out a New Routine for Them

One of the hardest parts of heading back to school is getting a new schedule down pat. Each year brings its own

rhythm with it, and it takes some practice before you get in the groove. To make the transition easier, spell out exactly what's expected of your child in the morning and when they come home with a routine chart. Knowing their responsibilities will help them take to their new routine faster.



Color-Code the Clock

Visual learners will love this analog clock. With it, they can color-code the time allotted for certain activities. (In

this example, you'd have to explain that you're only looking to the "big hand" to see which activity time it is.) If the clock face doesn't take to marker, colored transparency sheets might be better. Timers help, too!



Lay Out the Week

While digital, shared calendars are still the best way to keep track of everyone's schedule, it's also helpful if the

whole family can see the week's biggest events at a glance. You can quickly whip together a color-coded weekly schedule with index cards and some clothespins. That way, the whole family will stay on the same page.



Designate a Place for Teacher Correspondence

You don't want permission slips, progress reports, or other messages between you and your child's teacher to enter

the black hole of the bottom of the backpack. Choose a place for him to put anything you need to read or sign, and another for anything you need him to give to his teacher. This mom took a plastic envelope, punched a hole in it, and attached it to her kids' backpack with a carabiner so it wouldn't get lost.



Make Your Own Cubbies

If floor space is too limited for bins, go vertical and make your own cubbies for backpacks, jackets, and shoes. This designer made hers starting with IKEA's Billy bookcases.



Make Assembly-Line Lunches

If the goal is to move them on to making lunches on their own, make it easy for them with a pantry shelf ded-

icated to the non-perishable lunch ingredients. They just have to move down the line of labeled bins, picking out what they want for the day. Keep plastic bags on the shelf, so they can easily grab a handful of cereal or granola, too. (You can also take a shelf in the fridge and do the same thing.) Bonus: This system also works for after-school snacks.



Plan Out a Week's Worth of Outfits

This will help save you some time in the morning, when you're really feeling the crunch. If you designate a place to put the week's outfits, like this smart (and cute!) labeled hanging organizer, it'll be a lot easier to hand of the task of outfit planning to your child, since she'll know exactly where to put everything. (It's probably more fun for her than it is for you, anyway.)



Make a Back-of-the-Door Checklist

Running out the door, it's easy to forget something important, like a lunch bag. Keep a list of important items posted on the back of the door so that kids can do one last check before they run for the bus. You might even want one for yourself, if you want to go beyond the typical phone/wallet/keys rundown.



Make the Schedule the Lock Screen

For older kids, this is a good way to keep track of where he needs to be until he gets his schedule memorized. By taking a picture of his phone and making it the lock screen, he won't look lost—he'll just look like he's checking the time.


