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# **Union Pacific 4014**



Union Pacific 4014, also known as the "Big Boy", is a steam locomotive owned and operated by the Union Pacific (UP) as part of their heritage fleet. It is a four-cylinder simple articulated 4-8-8-4 "Big Boy" type built in 1941 by the American Locomotive Company (ALCO) of Schenectady, New York. No. 4014 is the only operating Big Boy of the eight that remain in existence.

The locomotive operated in revenue service until 1959, when it was donated to the Railway and Locomotive Historical Society in late 1961 and thereafter displayed in Fairplex at the RailGiants Train Museum in Pomona, California. In 2013, UP re-acquired the locomotive and launched a restoration project at their Steam Shop in Cheyenne, Wyoming.

In May 2019, No. 4014 was operated for the first time after sitting dormant for almost six decades. It ran its first excursion, double-headed with Union Pacific 844, three days later on May 4, 2019. Now part of the Union Pacific's heritage fleet, it now operates in excursion service, in addition to hauling revenue freight during ferry moves.

**Design:** The Big Boy class was developed by Union Pacific (UP) and the American Locomotive Company (ALCO) to handle the 1.14% eastbound ruling grade of the Wasatch Range.UP determined that its goals for the new class could be achieved by making several changes to the existing 4-6-6-4 Challenger design by enlarging the firebox to about 235 by 96 inches (5.97 m  $\times$  2.44 m) (about 155 sq ft or 14.4 m2), lengthening the boiler, adding four driving wheels and reducing the diameter of the driving wheels from 69 to 68 in (1,753 to 1,727 mm).

The Big Boy was articulated like the Mallet locomotive design, although without compounding. It was designed for stability at 80 miles per hour (130 km/h), allowing for a wide margin of reliability and safety, as steam locomotives normally operated well below that speed in freight service. Peak horsepower was reached around 35 mph (56 km/h); optimal tractive effort was reached around 10 mph (16 km/h). It is longer than two city buses and weighs more than a Boeing 747.

Revenue Service and Retirement: ALCO built No. 4014 in November 1941 and delivered it the following month to Union Pacific, where it was placed in revenue service. No. 4014 was part of the first group of 20 Big Boys, classified as 4884-1. Designed to haul 3,600-short -ton (3,214-long-ton; 3,266 t) trains over Utah's Wasatch Range, No. 4014 and the 24 other Big Boys routinely pulled trains of up to 4,200 short tons (3,750 long tons; 3,810 t). No. 4014's last routine repairs took place in 1956.

No. 4014 completed its final revenue run on July 21, 1959, just hours before the last revenue run by any Big Boy. It had traveled 1,031,205 miles (1,659,564 km) during its twenty years of revenue service. Union Pacific retired No. 4014 on December 7, 1961. All of the Big Boys were retired by 1962, their duties assumed by diesel locomotives and gas turbine-electric locomotives (GTELs).

That same year, Union Pacific donated No. 4014 to the Southern California chapter of the Railway and Locomotive Historical Society in Pomona, California, where it became one of the eight Big Boys preserved around the United States.

Ownership Transfer: In late 2012, Union Pacific officials announced that they would obtain a Big Boy locomotive, restore it to operating condition, and use it in excursion service. On July 23, 2013, the Southern California chapter of the Railway and Locomotive Historical Society agreed to transfer ownership of No. 4014 back to Union Pacific.

On November 14, 2013, No. 4014 began its journey to the UP Steam Shop in Cheyenne. It was pulled from its display site at the museum, on temporary track, to the adjacent parking lot. On January 26, 2014,

No. 4014 was pulled from the Los Angeles County Fairplex to the Covina station on Metrolink trackage by No. 1996, an SD70ACe diesel locomotive painted in Southern Pacific colors. It presently arrived at UP's West Colton Yard in Bloomington, California, where it sat on display until April 28, when it began its journey to Cheyenne.

After arriving at the Steam Shop's roundhouse on May 8, No. 4014 sat largely idle for two years while the UP steam crew worked to overhaul No. 844. The Steam Shop also used the time to expand and upgrade its facilities to accommodate a Big Boy. Restoration (2016–2019): In August 2016, a month after No. 844's repairs and inspection were complete,

The UP officials announced that restoration work on No. 4014 had begun under Heritage Fleet Operations director Ed Dickens. By early 2017, the locomotive had been completely disassembled. Some new parts were fabricated, including the rod brasses, top boiler check valve and lubricator check valves.

The driving wheels were sent to be repaired by the Strasburg Rail Road in Strasburg, Pennsylvania, for crankpin and axle work and installing new tires. The work included one major alteration: converting the coal-burning locomotive to run on No. 5 fuel oil. This was done by replacing the firebox grates with a fire pan and an oil burner.

This made No. 4014 the first Big Boy to undergo a coal-to-oil conversion since No. 4005, which ran on oil from 1946 until it was converted back to coal in 1948 due to uneven heating in its large, single-burner firebox. No. 4014's old firebox grates were saved and sent for the restoration of Milwaukee Road No. 261.

In March 2018, it was reported that the process of putting the locomotive back together had begun; ten months later, the locomotive's restoration was nearly finished.

**Excursion Service:** Upon the completion of the restoration, No. 4014 joined the railroad's never-retired No. 844 in excursion service. No. 4014 also became the world's largest operational steam locomotive, displacing (and later replacing) No. 3985, which was in poor mechanical condition.


In May 2019, No. 4014 made its first excursion run amid the celebrations marking 150 years since the completion of the First Transcontinental Railroad. Following its May 4 christening at the Cheyenne Depot Museum, No. 4014 — double-headed along with No. 844 — traveled to Ogden, Utah. No. 4014 subsequently made two tours on its own, with the first taking it through the Midwestern United States, including a brief stop at the Lake Superior Railroad Museum, from July 8 to August 8; and the second taking it through the Southwestern United States from September 27 to November 26.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, UP announced in March 2020 that it would cancel that year's steam operations, including by Nos. 4014 and 844. No. 4014 resumed operations in August and September 2021 with scheduled stops in Fort Worth and Houston, Texas; New Orleans, Louisiana; St. Louis, Missouri; and Denver, Colorado

In December 2018, Union Pacific asked the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) to exempt UP Nos. 4014, 844, and 3985 from federal Positive Train Control (PTC) requirements; in February 2019, the FRA officials responded that such waivers were not needed. On February 6, 2019, No. 4014's boiler passed a hydrostatic test.

The locomotive was successfully test fired on April 9. Around 9 p.m. on May 1, 2019, it moved under its own power for the first time in more than 59 years. The following evening, the locomotive made its first test run, from Cheyenne to Nunn, Colorado. Incidents: On May 16, 2019, No. 4014 partially derailed for unknown reasons. Two axles from one set of drive wheels fell into the gauge while entering the yard at Rawlins, Wyoming; the derailed drive wheels were returned to the rails within three hours.

At the funeral for his friend, the pastor tells the family and friends:


"I was blessed to know him, and to be with him at the moment of his death. As a matter of fact, I have his last thoughts with me, written by his own hand."

The tractor had been moved into its garage. The barn was properly locked tight. Even the animals were calm and had plenty of feed. All was well.


The farmer then understood the meaning of the young man's words.

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
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

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# KITT - The Complete Guide to the Knight Rider Car



"Knight Rider" premiered on NBC in 1982 and would stay on the air for four seasons. The show made David Hasselhoff an international superstar, and it also made a star out of its premiere car, the KITT. Hasselhoff's character, Michael Knight, was the series protagonist and drove KITT, the Knight Rider Trans Am, while fighting crime. One of the show's big twists was that the KITT was enabled with artificial intelligence (AI) and could speak. The 1982 series by famed showrunner Glen A. Larson was a hit, generating high merchandise sales and reaching U.S. syndication in 1986. If you're a fan of the show or just love TV automotive history, you should know all about the legendary KITT.

# What Kind of Car Was KITT?

Due to its many abilities and ridiculously fast speeds, people sometimes ask if KITT is a real car. While the car couldn't top out at over 200 miles per hour (mph), and many of its added features were aided by TV magic, it was based on a real vehicle. The KITT from the original series was a 1982 Pontiac Trans Am. This car was a two-door coupe, featuring a rear-wheel drive and front engine. In the show, the KITT's engine had a turbojet with customized afterburners. The vehicle could be set to autopilot, and the transmission featured an eight-speed microprocessor turbo drive.

# What Was the Car's Name in "Knight Rider"?

KITT's full name is the Knight Industries Two Thousand. Among fans of the show, however, the car is mainly referred to as the KITT rather than its full name.

# **How Did the Pontiac Trans Am Become the KITT?**

When "Knight Rider" was in development, the show's creators homed in on the Pontiac Trans Am to be its primary car. However, Pontiac's promotion manager, Jim Graham, thought the show sounded corny and didn't want the car to be associated with it. This aversion to placing the Trans Am in the show wasn't shared by everyone at Pontiac. The president of Pontiac's West Coast public relations agency, Eric Dahlquist, was a major fan of the idea of the show using the car. Many others at Pontiac were on board with placing the car in the show to generate attention and raise Pontiac's decreasing sales.

Dahlquist even got the new Pontiac general manager, Bill 12 Hoglund, on his side. Hoglund said he wouldn't go

against Graham's decision, but if Dahlquist could figure out how to get the car into the show, he would sign off on any paperwork. With Hoglund in his corner, Dahlquist got the cars to come out of dealer allocations with a bit of wheeling and dealing involved to secure the original three Trans Ams used by the show. Dahlquist also contacted the show's staff to design a modified version of the Trans Am to get the desired look for the series. They planned to change the look of the car's nose so it could feature a red light. Doing this would make it look like the Cylon Warrior from Larson's previous "Battlestar Galactica" series.

# **Initial Setbacks in Producing the KITT**

There were a few delays in producing the new Pontiac Trans Ams needed for the show. The automakers also had issues with getting the cars into the showrunners' hands. The vehicles weren't included in the company's budgets for promotional programming. They couldn't be delivered through the Pontiac dealer, either, meaning it wasn't certain how the cars would get to the set of "Knight Rider." Finally, Dahlquist got a call at his agency from an unidentified speaker. This caller told him to be at the Pacific Motor Transport lot by 4 p.m. — this was a transportation company owned by General Motors (GM). The cryptic caller informed Dahlquist that the three black Trans Ams would be waiting for him with the keys left in them. Dahlquist would never find out who made the call, but the person wasn't lying. The cars were there, and Dahlquist was able to use them in the show.

# **Shaping the KITT's Design**

With the Trans Ams in the show's hands, the staff of "Knight Rider" would begin further modifications on the vehicles to give them a futuristic look. Working off detailed renderings from John Schinella, Pontiac's design chief, the staff modified the cars' interiors and exteriors to create the KITT's signature appearance. Besides making exterior changes that fit the Cylon Warrior look, they also modified the interiors with new buttons, screens and digital readouts. The cars also received fiberglass coverings over the dashboards. The decision to allow "Knight Rider" to use the Trans Am ended up being an excellent move by Pontiac. The show was a huge success and put the Trans Am in front of millions of viewers. In addition

to the TV show's popularity, the car also gained notoriety due to the high merchandise sales the series generated. It's almost unthinkable now to imagine the KITT as any car but the Trans Am.

# Who Voiced KITT the Car?

Since the Knight Rider Trans AM could think and talk, the show needed an actor to provide the voiceover. William Daniels turned out to be the man for the job and even influenced how the car was characterized. While the show's producers wanted the automobile's voice to be more robotic, Daniels eventually convinced them to let him make the vehicle more human-like, with a brighter and more amusing voice. One interesting tidbit from the show was that Daniels and Hasselhoff didn't meet each other until a Christmas party held when the series was already a hit. Since Daniels only gave the KITT's voiceover, he didn't have to be in the same room as Hasselhoff during filming. Daniels also chose not to have his name appear in the show's opening and closing credits during its time on air. He did not want to be credited because he wanted audience members to get the sense that the car had a mind of its own. Despite Daniels' desire to stay relatively anonymous, he quickly became recognized by fans that he was the Knight Rider car voice.

# What Could the KITT Car Do?

The KITT car had numerous features that prepared it for almost any situation. As a sentient car, it would use its voice synthesizer to communicate with others. A primary part of the KITT was its Knight 2000 microprocessor. This microprocessor was essentially the car's brain, making it self-aware and able to think for itself.

Some other primary KITT features included:

Molecular bonded shell: The KITT's molecular bonded shell gave it incredibly tough armor that protected it from explosive devices and firearms. The car could only sustain damage from rockets and heavy artillery. However, the shell would still be intact after blasts, with this heavyduty weaponry only damaging the internal components. The bonded shell even covered the tires, allowing the car to drive over explosives and shield others from blasts. It also protected Knight and the car from electricity and fire. **Pyroclastic lamination:** With its pyroclastic lamination, the KITT could withstand high temperatures. Its thermalresistant coating allowed it and Knight to survive temperatures as high as 800 degrees Fahrenheit.

Electronic jamming system: The car's electronic jamming system incorporated a microwave ignition sensor, an electronic field disrupter and an electromagnetic field generator. This system allowed the automobile to control other electronic machines. The KITT primarily utilized it to disable vehicles that were trying to escape. It also used the system to break electronic locks, scramble security cameras and cheat at slot machines.

Turbo boost: The car's turbo boost capabilities enabled it DATA MASTER: Steven Burdick to accelerate quickly and reach impressive speeds.

The turbo boost system ran on undercarriage rocket motors that could fire backward or forward. Besides giving the car a speed boost, the turbo system also made it possible for the vehicle to jump 40 feet into the air and push or pull heavy objects.

**Silent mode:** Whenever the KITT needed some stealth, it could activate silent mode. In this mode, the engine noise would be kept to a minimum, allowing the car to sneak up on enemies and stay hidden.

Flame throwers, tear gas and flares: When the car needed to get aggressive, it had a few options at its disposal. It had a flamethrower placed under the bumpers to shoot flames at enemies. It also had tear gas it could launch for offensive or defensive purposes. Additionally, its magnesium flares helped misdirect incoming heat-seeking missiles.

Passive laser restraint system: When Knight and other passengers were placed in harm's way by sudden stops and impacts, the passive laser restraint system protected them from the shock.

**Chemical analyzer:** Who needs a CSI-like lab when your car has a chemical analyzer built into it? The KITT's analyzer could scan fingerprints, break down the chemical properties of various substances and evaluate ballistic information from bullets. This analyzer also had exterior sensors to examine chemical properties outside the car. Surveillance mode: In surveillance mode, the car could monitor and trace telephone communications and radio transmissions. This ability helped the KITT track people and find out where they were. This feature also enabled the KITT to hack into computer systems, uploading and downloading information. Additionally, the KITT could figure out the structural schematics of buildings and keep Knight aware of any dangers when sneaking around an

Manual override: The KITT had a built-in function that allowed the driver to override the AI and lock it out from controlling the vehicle. This manual override feature let Knight control the automobile entirely on his own, stopping the KITT from activating its auto cruise. Understandably, the KITT wasn't always too happy about this function, often vocally protesting whenever Knight switched it

**Grappling hook:** The KITT famously had a grappling hook and winch for times when the car needed to get creative. The grappling hook was often placed behind the taillights and underneath the front bumper. The grappling hook and winch gave the car even more opportunities for awesome stunts.

**Seat ejection system:** When Knight needed to get out of the car fast and reach rooftops or fire escapes quickly, the seat ejection system was there to help. The car featured two front ejection seats that could propel Knight out of the vehicle and high into the air.

Dehydration – A Silent Signal for Help

Dehydration can lead into self-neglect or caregiver neglect. It is important to keep hydrated now that summer is here. Dehydration can happen often in long-term care settings, and older adults have a tendency to feel less thirsty, less quickly than younger persons. A resident may be dehydrated if they:

- Drink less than six cups of liquids per day
- Have a dry mouth, cracked lips or sunken eyes
- Suffer from dark urine, frequent vomiting, diarrhea or fever
- Need help drinking from a cup or glass, or have trouble swallowing liquids
- Act confused or extremely tired.

Studies show that residents who live in long-term care facilities are at greater risk of becoming dehydrated than those living in the community. It is thought that some residents may drink less as to not have to ask for assistance to use the bathroom or get out of the bed. Dehydration can cause increased risk of urinary tract infections, coronary events and death. Certain medications can also decrease thirst. After checking swallowing precautions for the resident, follow these steps (when appropriate) to ensure that they stay hydrated and prevention of neglect:

- Encourage the resident to take a drink every time you see them.
- Offer ice chips frequently.
- Offer sips of liquid between bites of food.
- Confirm a pitcher and cup are nearby and light enough for resident to lift themselves.
- Offer assistance as needed if resident cannot drink without help.
- Be sure to alert staff to any behaviors that may signal a resident is dehydrated.
- Encourage milk, decaffeinated tea or juice instead of caffeinated drinks like soda and coffee. (Remember: caffeinated drinks do not count as much toward fluid intake.)

We encourage everyone to check on their neighbors and loved ones during the extreme hot weather. During this pandemic, there have been several families who have taken their loved one home. If you or someone you know is interested in doing so, there is a program available to assist in transitioning residents back out into the community, it is called Living Choice. # **Air Fryer Coconut Shrimp**

# **Ingredients:**

1/2 cup all-purpose flour 1 1/2 teaspoons ground black pepper 2 large eggs 2/3 cup unsweetened flaked coconut 1/3 cup panko bread crumbs 12 ounces uncooked medium shrimp (peeled and deveined) Cooking spray 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt, divided 1/4 cup honey



1/4 cup lime juice 1 serrano chile, thinly sliced 2 teaspoons chopped fresh cilantro

# **Directions:**

**Step 1:** Stir together flour and pepper in shallow dish. Lightly beat eggs in a second shallow dish. Hold each shrimp by the tail, dredge in flour mixture, and shake off excess. Then dip floured shrimp in egg, and allow any excess to drip off. Finally, dredge in coconut mixture, pressing to adhere. Place on a plate. Coat shrimp well with cooking spray.

**Step 2:** Preheat air fryer to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C). Place 1/2 the shrimp in the air fryer and cook about 3 minutes. Turn shrimp over and continue cooking until golden, and about 3 minutes more. Season with 1/4 teaspoon salt. Repeat with remaining shrimp.



# The Twister Movie Museum Wakita, Oklahoma



Calling anything in Wakita a "landmark" might be pushing things a little bit, especially in a town with only a 350 population, but just about any movie buff will recognize the town's water tower.

Wakita was, of course, the small Oklahoma town at the center of the Hollywood blockbuster Twister. The thenmayor came up with the idea to create a Twister Movie Museum. While small, the museum has an impressive amount of memorabilia from the 1996 film including "Dorothy" (the tornado probe) and several thousand photos. The museum's curator is super friendly and will always greet you with a warm welcome.

You may be interested to learn that Wakita has an interesting history when it comes to tornadoes. The town was named after a local Cherokee Chief Wakita (pronounced Wok-ih-taw) of local notoriety. As legend records it, Chief Wakita's tribe cast a spell to protect the area from tornadoes for at least 100 years.

Wakita was founded on September 16, 1893, and the post office opened on November 14. When Oklahoma became a state in 1907 the population was 388.

On May 10, 2010, a tornado outbreak occurred in Grant County and there were numerous tornadoes that caused damage near Wakita. However, the town itself was not destroyed.



Foyil, Oklahoma is a small town located on Route 66 in Rogers County about 10 miles northeast of Claremore. For most of the 1800s, this area belonged to the Cherokee on Foyil, as it did many communities in Oklahoma. By Nation. In 1970 the town's population stood at 164, and was established and Alfred Foyil became the first postmaster. The town was named for him.

By 1898 the town had a drugstore and a furniture store, and by 1905 a bank was added. In 1910, the town was incorporated, at which time it boasted about 150 residents. The next year, the town was recorded as having a hotel, a bank, two blacksmiths, a barber, a carpenter, three general In the year 2000, the town's population stood at 234 and stores, two doctors, a drugstore, a lumberyard, a hardware store, a lawyer, a school system with nine teachers, and a newspaper called the Foyil Leader

By 1920, the town boasted 109 residents and in 1926 Route 66 came through the community, boosting traffic and visitors.

In 1928 Foyil native Andy Payne won a transcontinental foot race called the "Bunion Derby". A member of the Cherokee tribe, he was raised in Foyil and loved running. The race was part of a plan by Charles C. Pyle to promote Route 66. The event began in Los Angeles, California on March 24, 1928, and ended on May 26, 1928, in New York, a distance of 3,423.5 miles. Only one well acquainted with it from rooming at a boarding house in four of the original runners made it to the Madison Square Garden's finish line, In fact, of the 275 who entered the race, half of them had dropped out by the fourth

Crossing the finish line 84 days after the race began, Payne's total running time was 573 hours, 4 minutes, 34 seconds, at an average speed of six miles per hour. After he won the footrace and received the \$25,000 prize, he used the money to pay off the mortgage on his father's farm. An Andy Payne statue commemorating the race can tures Galloway's eleven-sided "Fiddle House" that previbe seen in a park located between Route 66 and Andy Payne Boulevard.

Foyil's main street, the original alignment of Route 66, was renamed Andy Payne Boulevard, where visitors can still drive on an original stretch of pinkish Portland Cement concrete.

By 1930, Foyil had grown to 184 people, but the Great Depression and the Dust Bowl of the 1930s took its toll

In 1946 the town had two gas stations, two general stores, and a grocery store, but Claremore served as the nearest his Guide Book to Highway 66, described the town: "Pop. 170; gas; small garages; groceries; no cafes or courts. A small hamlet serving the farms and cattle ranches of the region"

In 1962, Route 66 was realligned a short distance to the west, killing some of the businesses on Andy Payne Boulevard.

Area businesses continued to cater to local farmers and in 1980 it had increased to 191 before dropping to 86 in

In 1999 the nearby folk art of Nathan Edward Galloway, which includes a 90-foot-tall, concrete totem pole, was listed in the National Register of Historic Places as Totem Pole Park.

increased to 344 by 2010, 47% increase.

While in Foyil be sure to check out Annie's Diner at 12015 S. Poplar Street. This site, built in the 1970s long served as the Top Hat Dairy Bar. Also see the restored Route 66 Texaco Station at 12243 South Andy Payne Blvd. This station began operations in 1926 and continued to service customers until 1963. The station began and ended as a Texaco Filling Station making it one of the oldest Texaco stations still standing on Route 66. Foyil native Andrew Hartley Payne ran past the Filling Station on his way to winning the Great Transcontinental Footrace of 1928. Singer/Actor Gene Autry was across the street while working as a relief telegraph operator for the Frisco Railroad. The station is being restored by Kean Isaacs.

A great side attraction can be seen just four miles east of Foyil on Highway 28A. Ed Galloway's Totem Pole Park, features the world's largest concrete totem pole. At 90 feet, the totem pole towers over the park in a vivid array of folk art colors. The park also feaously housed hundreds of hand-carved fiddles and today serves as a small museum. Throughout the park are numerous colorful totems that display a variety of Indian Folk Art. This is a definite side trip worth the taking.


