Be Thankful: Science says gratitude is good for your health



Researchers are finding that gratitude doesn't just make you feel like a better person, it's actually good for your health.

If you need one more reason to be thankful, here it is.

More and more researchers are finding that gratitude doesn't just make you feel like a better person, it's actually good for your health. "Clinical trials indicate that the practice of gratitude can have dramatic and lasting effects in a person's life," said Robert A. Emmons, professor of psychology at UC Davis. "It can lower blood pressure, improve immune function and facilitate more efficient sleep."

One recent study from the University of California San Diego's School of Medicine found that people who were more grateful actually had better heart health, specifically less inflammation and healthier heart rhythms. "They showed a better well-being, a less depressed mood, less fatigue and they slept better," said the study's author, Paul J. Mills. "When I am more grateful, I feel more connected with myself and with my environment. That's the opposite of what stress does."

Another study found that gratitude can boost your immune system. Researchers at the universities of Utah and Kentucky observed that stressed-out law students who characterized themselves as optimistic actually had more disease-fighting cells in their bodies. But Emmons said there's even more evidence. People who keep a gratitude journal have a reduced dietary fat intake — as much as 25% lower. Stress hormones like cortisol are 23% lower in grateful people. And having a daily gratitude practice could actually reduce the effects of aging to the brain.

Being thankful has such a profound effect because of the feelings that go along with it, Emmons said. "Gratitude works because, as a way of perceiving and interpreting life, it recruits other positive emotions that have direct physical benefits, most likely through the immune system or endocrine system."

Research shows that when we think about what we appreciate, the parasympathetic or calming part of the nervous system is triggered and that can have protective benefits on the body, including decreasing cortisol levels and perhaps increasing oxytocin, the bonding hormone involved in relationships that make us feel so good.

But if you're still not feeling the love, experts say gratitude is something you can learn.

"Some people may not be grateful by nature but it is a habit you can get accustomed to," said Dr. Norman Rosenthal, a psychiatrist and author of "Winter Blues."

"One very good way is being aware of comparing up. It's a formula for unhappiness because you can always find a person who is more advantaged than you are."

Mills says all you have to do is think about being grateful and you'll become more grateful.

A good way to do that is by journaling.

"Some people say they don't have anything to be grateful for," Mills said. "If you take such a person to find one little thing to be grateful for and focus on that, you find over time that the feeling of gratitude can transform the way they see their lives."

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

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
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
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'Such a goosebump moment': Parents adopt their son's best friend



52 friends and family members lined the courtroom on adoption day.

When Rita Marlow and Seth Lentchner of Bensalem, Pennsylvania, heard there was a child in need on their son's soccer team, they didn't think twice about offering a helping hand. Now, that boy is their son.

"We are still a little in shock," Rita Marlow told TODAY Parents. "We keep saying, 'It's for real?"

Marlow and Lentchner met Nate, now 16, for the first time about nine years ago when he played soccer with their son, Zachary. The young boys forged a close bond and the families became familiar with one another.

"As the years went on, we found out the family's struggles," Marlow explained. "We would pick Nate up on Friday, (and) he would hang out for the weekend. As they got older, we saw him a lot more and he spent a lot more time at our house."

During a soccer tournament in 2016, Marlow and Lentchner received news that would change their lives.

"We got a phone call that Nate had been removed from his home and they wanted to know if we could keep him connected to soccer," Marlow explained.

Just a few days later, Nate's case manager asked whether the family would consider becoming foster parents.

"This wasn't something we had ever considered," Marlow told TODAY. "They said the reason they were asking is that Nate asked to come live at our house."

Marlow said the first person she asked was her son, Zach.

"I said, 'Zach, Nate needs our help, but you're going to have to share a room," Marlow explained. "He said, 'Absolutely. We need to help Nate."

Marlow said she was initially a little nervous about how the family would make financial ends meet, but fellow soccer moms, family members and friends donated everything from gift cards to bunk beds.

"I was so worried, because we didn't want to fail him," Marlow said. "But everybody immediately stepped up — and that's why I sound so cliché about saying 'our village' — just to make sure this kid was going to succeed. That's how it's always been for five years. We provided the roof, but along the way, so many people have been here."

At 13, after being in Marlow's care for about a year and a half, Nate decided he wanted to stay with the family for good.

"He decided our home was where he wanted to be," Marlow said. "We had started the adoption process and then all of a sudden we stopped and it went back to being reunited (with his birth mother). Every time that happened, it was kind of defeating. (It felt like) he was never going to get what he wanted. He just wanted that piece of paper that said he was going to be adopted."

Finally, in November 2020, the family received a call from Nate's case manager.

"They said, 'It's happening," Marlow explained. "It was the best Thanksgiving ever."

On July 13, 2021, after 1,758 days — or nearly five years — of foster care, Nate officially became Marlow and Lentchner's son. But the excitement didn't end there.

"Initially we were told six people could be in court," Marlow said, adding that among their own family — which includes siblings JT, Kari and Cameron — they were going to have to choose who could attend. "But we got a phone

call the Thursday before saying there was no limit, so Seth had extended the invitation to the soccer family to come out."

The family didn't expect to see 52 supportive adults and kids in matching blue shirts fill the Bucks County courtroom for the hearing.

"We started filing in and I'm facing the judge and with every single person that walked in, his smile just kept getting bigger and bigger," Marlow explained. "It was such a goosebump moment to see all these people who have supported Nate be there on that day."

When it was time for Nate to speak to the judge, Marlow said she could tell the 16-year-old was beginning to feel nervous.



"Zach put his hand on Nate's shoulder, looked at the judge and said, 'Nate is a great student, a great soccer player and a great friend," Marlow said. "I was so afraid we were going to get in trouble, because initially they said only the three of us could talk."

Marlow said the judge simply replied, "Now that's a real brother."

At home, Nedra McCormac, whose son plays soccer with Nate, had rallied friends and community members for one last surprise.

"Our goal was to just decorate their front yard," McCormac told TODAY Parents. "I reached out to a few people and it went from a few people to 120 people in this group."

A combination of generous donations from community members and businesses allowed McCormac not only to decorate the yard, but to present Nate with more than \$1,000 worth of gifts cards.

"There are lots of memories from how it all began to becoming the family they are today," McCormac said.

Added Marlow, "Everybody being there to share in this joy ... it's almost like they have all been through this with us."

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Lifeboat Volunteers Rushed From Crew Member's Wedding to Rescue Six People in 7 Minutes



Lifeboat volunteers in the UK rushed from their crew member's wedding to rescue six people—and took just seven minutes to get from venue to boat.

The lifesavers were lined up the aisle creating an arch for newlyweds Ashley Witcombe, a shorecrew volunteer, and his wife Cheryl.

Moments later their pagers went off, and they raced to rescue a group stranded on a small beach near Ilfracombe in Devon.

Wedding photographer 39-year-old Becky Payne said, "They'd literally just got married.

"We went outside and just after we took a couple of pictures they had to run. It was pretty exciting."

Royal National Lifeboat Institution lifeboatman Leigh Hanks said, "We hope the pagers didn't disrupt Ashley and Cheryl's special day too much, although I'm sure it's something they're both used to.

"It's not the first time the pagers have gone off at a crew wedding, and I'm sure it won't be the last."

Leigh added that the conditions for the rescue were "challenging" but the crew rescued all three adults and three children, who got stranded on a paddleboarding trip in the southwest of England.

The group were uninjured and taken back to the shore following the rescue on October 28.

Later in the afternoon, the lifeboat crew drove past the seaside wedding venue again while on a training exercise—and were pictured giving a wave to the newlywed couple. Here at GNN, we're so glad the day worked out for everyone.

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10 FESTIVE FACTS YOU DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT CHRISTMAS



1. Christmas day isn't Christ's birthday

There is no mention of December 25th anywhere in the Bible, in fact there is no mention of when Jesus was born at all. There was much debate amongst early Christians and it wasn't until the fourth century AD in the Roman Empire that Jesus' birthday was celebrated on December 25th. The most popular theory as to why this date was settled on is that it was borrowed from pagan traditions that already occurred on that day.



2. Boxing Day is actually about boxes

Multiple theories abound as to how this bank holiday received its name, the most popular theory suggests it was traditionally a day when servants had the day off to visit their families. Their employees would send them home with "Christmas boxes" containing money, gifts or food to thank them for their reliable service throughout the past year.



3. Christmas trees have pagan roots

During the time of the winter solstice, pagan homes would be decorated with evergreen branches in the hope of scaring away evil spirits and to remind the occupants that spring was just around the corner. This tradition survived the conversion to Christianity and during the 16th Century in Germany devout Christians began bringing Christmas trees into their homes. The practice was made fashionable in the UK during the mid 19th Century, when popular Queen Victoria, German Prince Albert and their children were drawn in The Illustrated London News standing around the main Christmas tree at Windsor Castle.



4. Xmas doesn't take Christ out of Christmas

In fact "X" comes from the Greek letter "chi" which happens to be the first letter of the Greek word for Christ (Χριστός), and Greek was the original language of the New Testament. The word was simply created as an abbreviation and was first used in the mid 1500s.



5. Santa doesn't wear red because of Coca-Cola

Contrary to popular belief, Father Christmas's red coat was not the creation of a clever Coca-Cola advertising campaign. Before the company had even been invented, St Nick was being depicted in multiple books and illustrations wearing a scarlet coat. From the 1930's onwards Coca-Cola did, however, help shape the image of Santa as a jolly old man.



6. Turkeys replaced peacocks on the Christmas table

Before turkeys were brought into this country over 500 years ago people used to eat geese, boars' head and even peacocks during the festive season! Henry VIII was the first English king to enjoy a turkey on Christmas Day and the bird was still regarded as a luxury up until the 1950s, with many choosing goose instead. Thanks to the invention of the fridge and the ability of the large turkey to feed a whole family, it soon took top spot on many Christmas tables.



7. Mince pies did originally contain meat

Medieval people during the 16th century believed that if you ate a mince pie every day from Christmas to Twelfth Night (5th January), you'd have happiness for the next 12 months. These pies were known as Christmas Pyes, and contained anything from rabbit to mutton, pigeon to pheasant! They were larger than their modern creations and made into an oval shape, which was said to represent Jesus' crib.



8. Rudolph was created by an advertising copywriter

The red-nosed reindeer was created in 1939 by Robert L.May, an advertising copywriter for Montgomery Ward department store based in Chicago. Every year the store would give away free colouring books as holiday gifts to the children who visited the store Father Christmas. Rudolph's story sold 2.4 million copies in its first year of publication. The famous song was released in 1949 becoming one of the best-selling songs of all time.



9. A crackling log fire is the reason we pull Christmas crackers

During the late 1840s, a London sweet maker named Tom Smith sat by a crackling log fire and imagined how fun it would be if his wrapped sweets made the same sound when opened. A short time later, 'Cosaques', a log shaped sweet package with a surprise crackle element inside, were put on the market. The public came to know them as crackers and by the early 20th century, hats, jokes and various trinkets had replaced the sweets inside them. Soon they were adopted as a traditional festive custom and the rest they say is history.



10. Mistletoe has been revered for thousands of years

From the Ancient Greeks to Norse mythology, mistletoe has been a symbolic herb for centuries. Many customs have linked it to love, fertility and new life. In some way these beliefs eventually led to the custom of kissing under the mistletoe during the Christmas period. This tradition became increasingly popular in Victorian England, when men would look to steal a kiss from any woman seen lingering beneath a sprig of mistletoe. A refusal was seen as bad luck.



Heroic Dog Gets Award for Saving Over 100 Koalas From Australia's Bushfires



An intrepid 6-year-old dog helped rescue over 100 injured koalas from the Australian bush fires in 2019–2020.

Now, the Australian Koolie named Bear has been named a hero, winning an award from the International Fund for Animal Welfare (IFAW).

Bear was trained in Australia at the University of the Sunshine Coast, where their Detection Dogs for Conservation team taught the former rescue dog to use his heightened sense of smell to hunt out the injured koalas among the ashes.

Research Fellow Dr Romane Cristescu, who leads the USC team, said Bear received "extra pats and extra play" after he was honored via video during the IFAW Animal Action Awards event in London's House of Lords.

She said Bear's sense of smell, along with his enthusiasm for play, made him ideal for research projects such as recognizing the scent of koala fur in the bush.

IFAW, which sponsors Bear, said the dog had been "a ray of hope" as he searched burned habitat to help the USC/IFAW team and their partners to rescue over 100 koalas.

His heroics earned him worldwide renown via his Instagram page, BearTheKoalaDog.

Previously, he had found himself in an animal shelter after his former owners gave him up due to behavior issues caused by his "boundless energy and obsessive enthusiasm for play."

Dr Cristescu, an ecologist and former veterinarian, said the USC/ IFAW koala detection dog is continuing to contribute to wildlife rescues and research with the team's other canine colleagues.

"Bear and our team are studying the effects of the 2019-20 bushfires on koala health and habitat density in collaboration with IFAW," she said.

In addition, Bear has an ongoing day job of locating koalas for welfare rescue missions, in collaboration with local rescue groups.

"He is always happy to give a paw to find koalas as part of the Detection Dogs for Conservation's other research activities."
